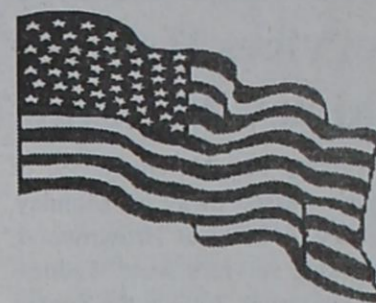

Signup Ends January 18 for Crop Disaster and Quality Loss Programs

The U.S. Department of Agriculture reminds producers that signup for the Crop Disaster Program and Quality Loss Program ends January 18, 2002.

Signup for the Crop Disaster Program began January 18, 2001. This program is available to producers who suffered crop losses in crop year 2000 due to natural disasters. Producers are eligible for compensation for 2000 crop losses directly attributed to adverse weather and related conditions.

Signup for the Quality Loss Program began August 13, 2001. The program compensates producers who suffered at least 20 percent loss in the quality of their crop due to weather-related disasters during the 2000 crop year.

Combined total payments issued for QLP and CDP are limited to \$80,000 per "person" (as defined by USDA regulations). Payments to producers for both programs began soon after the signups commenced.

Just wanted to drop a quick note to everyone that I contacted asking for love and prayers last October when we first found out my mom had lung cancer (adenocarcinoma). Originally the tumor had been the size of a fist, as of today Jan. 9, it is smaller than a ping pong ball. Her esophagus is clear and straight, and she only has two more sessions of the really strong chemo (translates into 6 weeks, which will be 6 weeks LESS than they had projected at the beginning). Her appetite is good and she has not missed a day of work! WONDERFUL, YES!! (But she only works two or three days a week, but still great!)

She will have a week or two of a less-potent chemo treatment with daily radiation for a brief time after her last session, and then she should be done! We (my family) want to thank all of you for your prayers and concern. I will keep you all posted! And truly, thank you all for asking about her and keeping us in your prayers.

Shake The Nation Campaign Needed More Than Ever

What to Know Head to Toe

Eyes

Diabetes can lead to vision loss or even blindness. To take good care of your eyes:



- Keep your blood sugar close to your goal.
- Bring high blood pressure down.
- Get a dilated eye exam by an eye doctor every year. Your eye doctor will use drops to enlarge your pupils to look inside your eyes.
- See your eye doctor if:
 - Your vision is blurry.
 - You see double. You see spots or floaters.
 - One or both eyes hurt.
 - You feel pressure in your eye.
 - You can't see things at the sides like you used to.
 - You have trouble reading.

Feet

Diabetes can harm the blood vessels and nerves in your feet. To keep your feet healthy:

- Keep your blood sugar close to your goal.
- Take off your shoes and socks and have your feet checked at least once a year—more often if you have any foot problems.
- Wash your feet every day. Dry them, even between toes.
- Check daily for cuts, blisters, redness, and swelling. If you cannot see the bottom of your feet, use a mirror or ask someone for help. If you find anything, contact your health care provider—no matter how small the problem.
- Never walk barefoot.
- Wear shoes that fit well. If you have lost feeling in your feet, ask your health care provider for advice on proper shoes.
- Break in new shoes slowly.
- Wear clean padded socks that fit well. Make sure the sock seams are in the right place.
- Cut your nails straight across and file the edges.
- Shake out your shoes before putting them on. A small pebble can lead to problems.
- Don't smoke.
