Reminder That It's Adopt-A-Highway Trash Pick Up Month

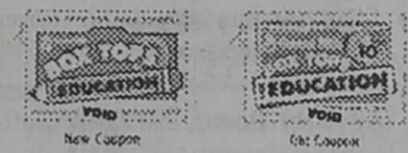

Panthers Outgun Buffaloes 20-7; Host May Tigers Friday

The Panthers fumbled three times in the first half but managed to hold the score to 0-0 at halftime. Both teams scored in the third period and then Gorman added 14 more in the final period for the 20-7 score.

The two teams fought on even terms with the Panthers moving into scoring position on two different drives before turning the ball over on fumbles.

Following the halftime activities in which both bands did outstanding routines the Big Red defense stopped the Buffaloes and forced a punt. The Panthers then took the ball on the Gorman 39 and scored in one big blast following a Buffaloes 5 yard penalty, Sawyer Wright broke loose and raced the distance with 9:13 left in the third. The run for 2 points failed and Gorman was up 6-0.

However, the Buffaloes came right back and got the ball on the 50 and ran through the Big Red Defense on runs of 5, 28, 1, 11 and 3 before Michael Allen ran it in from 2 yards out with 6:27 left in the third. The Buffs then kicked the point after and went up 7-6.

After exchanging possessions the Panthers got the ball on their own 32 and drove the distance in 8 plays with Josh Carruth getting the final yard on a keeper play with 10:50 left in the game. The drive featured runs of 4 and 8 by Torres, 13 and 6 by Rodriguez, a 13 yard pass to Jose Cruz, a 3 yard keeper by Carruth and a beautiful run of 23 by Wright to set the Panthers up at the 1. The pass try for 2 points failed and Gorman was up 12-7.

The Panthers had a good drive midway through the fourth period but the drive ended at the Buffalo 20. But following a strong defensive stand by the Big Red defense, the Panthers got the ball on the Buffalo 35 and scored in 3 plays with Rodriguez getting the final 23 on a great run with 1:01 left in the game. The drive featured a 4 yard run by Wright and a 4 yard by Carruth before the 23 yard run. Wright picked up a fumble on the point after try and ran it in to make the score 20-7.

The Big Red then held the Buffaloes and ran out the clock.

Wright led the Panthers with 98 yards on 9 tries. Torres had 66 on 14, and Rodriguez had 34 on 11 carries. Josh Carruth got 26 on 5 keepers.

This win gives the Panthers a 5-1 record and a 2-0 in District.

Gorman will host the May Tigers on Friday night in a District tilt and will need to continue their fine play to keep their winning ways going. They will have to correct the fumbling problems to get the victory May. So come on out and support your Panthers to victory.

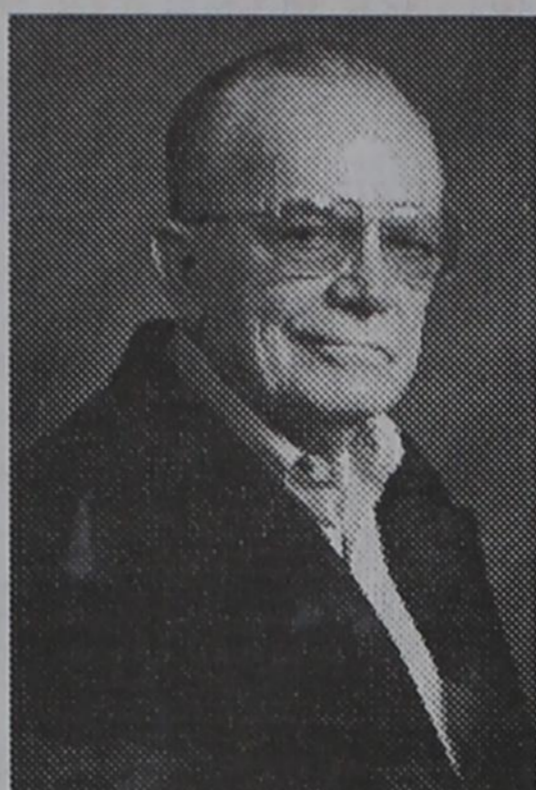
As a duty of office, the District Clerk shall report monthly includ-

Ten Free Trees-- Autumn Classics

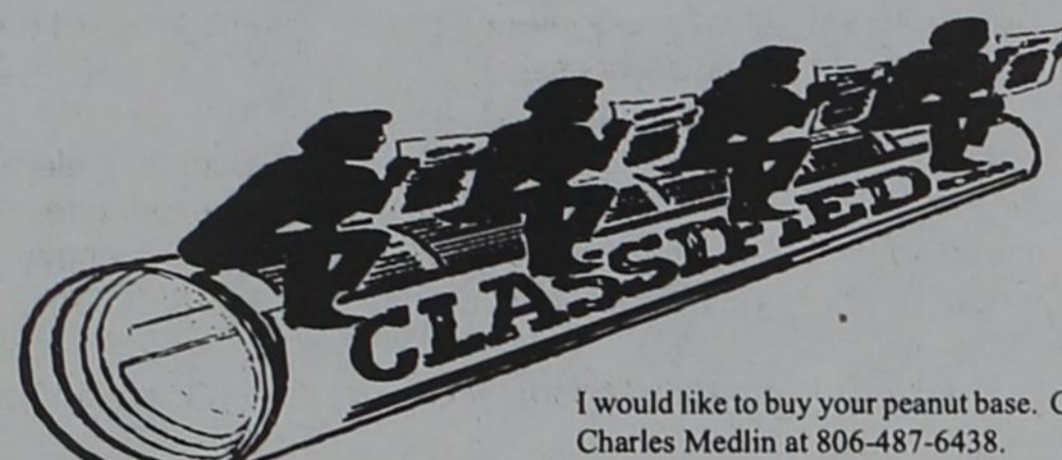
Ten free trees, autumn classics, will be given to each person who joins The national Arbor Day Foundation during October 2002.

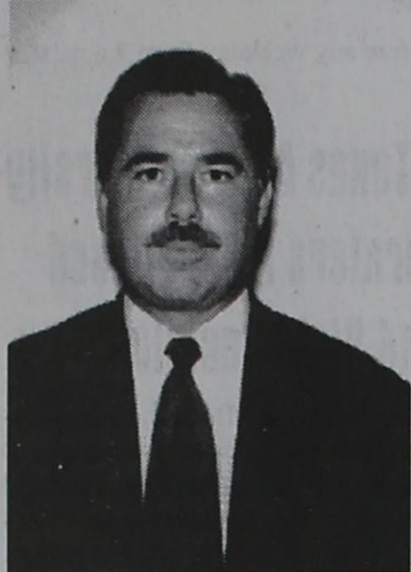

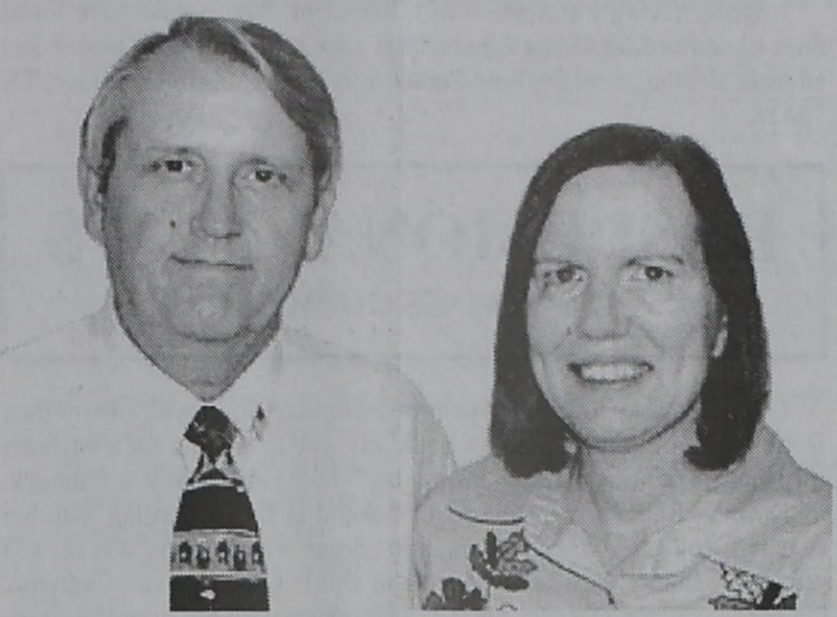

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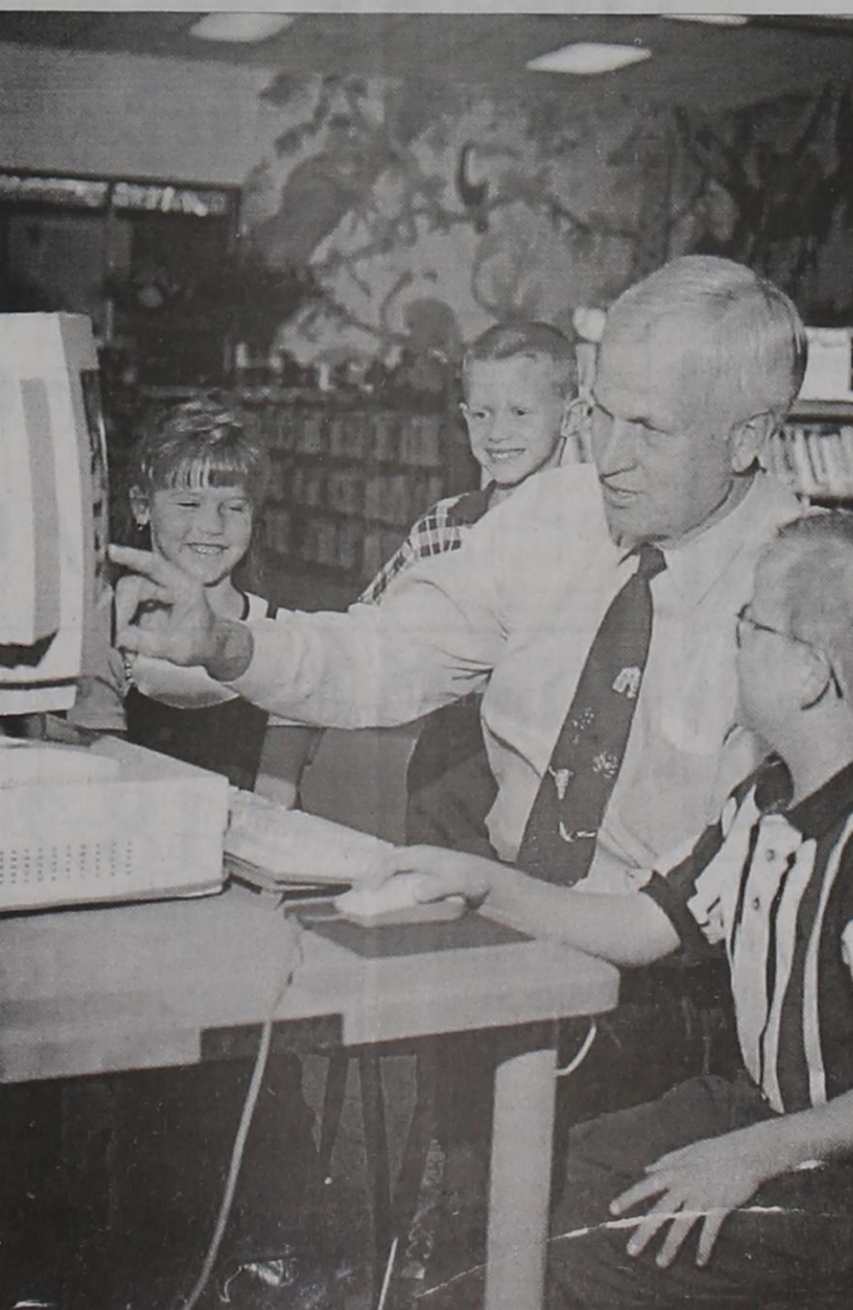

Farm Service Agency & Texas A&M University Offer Landowners & Operators A Web Based Tool For Making Base and Yield Decisions

Farm Service Agency (FSA) has launched the "Base and Yield Update Option Analyzer (BYA)," an interactive web-based tool for landowners and operators to use in evaluating and calculating base and yield options for direct and counter-cyclical payments. The web-based calculator can be found at <http://www.fsa.usda.gov/pas/farmbill/tools.asp>

"The 2002 Farm Bill affords producers the opportunity to update bases and yields allowing them to take advantage of yield improvements due to improved technology resulting in government payments that are more in line with actual production," said David W. Martin, County Executive Director in Eastland County.

According to Martin, base and yield data currently on file at USDA service centers has been frozen since 1985.

The new tool is based on software developed by Texas A&M University's agriculture Food and Policy Center (AFPC) in cooperation with the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) and FSA. The analysis program helps producers evaluate the economic consequences of selecting different base and yield options on a case-by-case basis for each of their respective operation. When using the analyzer program, producers will need to provide information including planted acres, yields and types of crops grown. The software will prompt producers to enter projected crop prices and various base and yield options that will be used to estimate six years of payments for each crop.

"Making changes to base and yield data is not a pencil and paper decision. Without the web-based tool, producers would be confronted with an impossible task," said Martin.

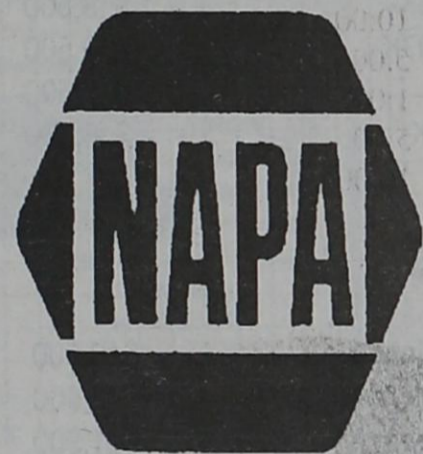
FSA recognizes that there are numerous on-line base and yield calculators available to producers, but the Texas A&M model is the only program that has been certified and adopted by FSA and is therefore the only version that FSA supports with confidence.

Martin emphasized, "The agency fully supports educated consumers making informed decisions about their operation and encourages producers to use any and all calculation tools available to them, but return to the FSA version when making final decisions."

Landowners interested in receiving direct and counter-cyclical payments may be signing up for the 2002 and 2003 crop years on October 1, 2002 and have until April 1, 2003 to make base and yield elections for the new farm program. If no election is made by April 1, 2003 deadline, the farm's bases will default to the 2002 base, plus oilseeds if applicable. This is especially important for those farms that did not participate in the 1996 farm program and whose records currently show no base acres.

"Although the decision to change existing base and yield data is ultimately that of the landowner and FSA or its employees cannot make those decisions for a producer, we will be more than willing to assist producers. We also encourage producers to work with and seek assistance from their local County Extension Agent," said Martin.
