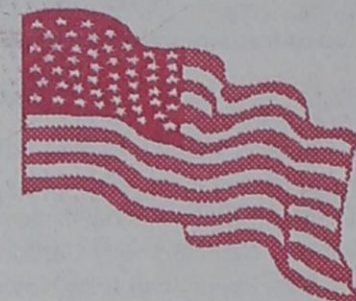

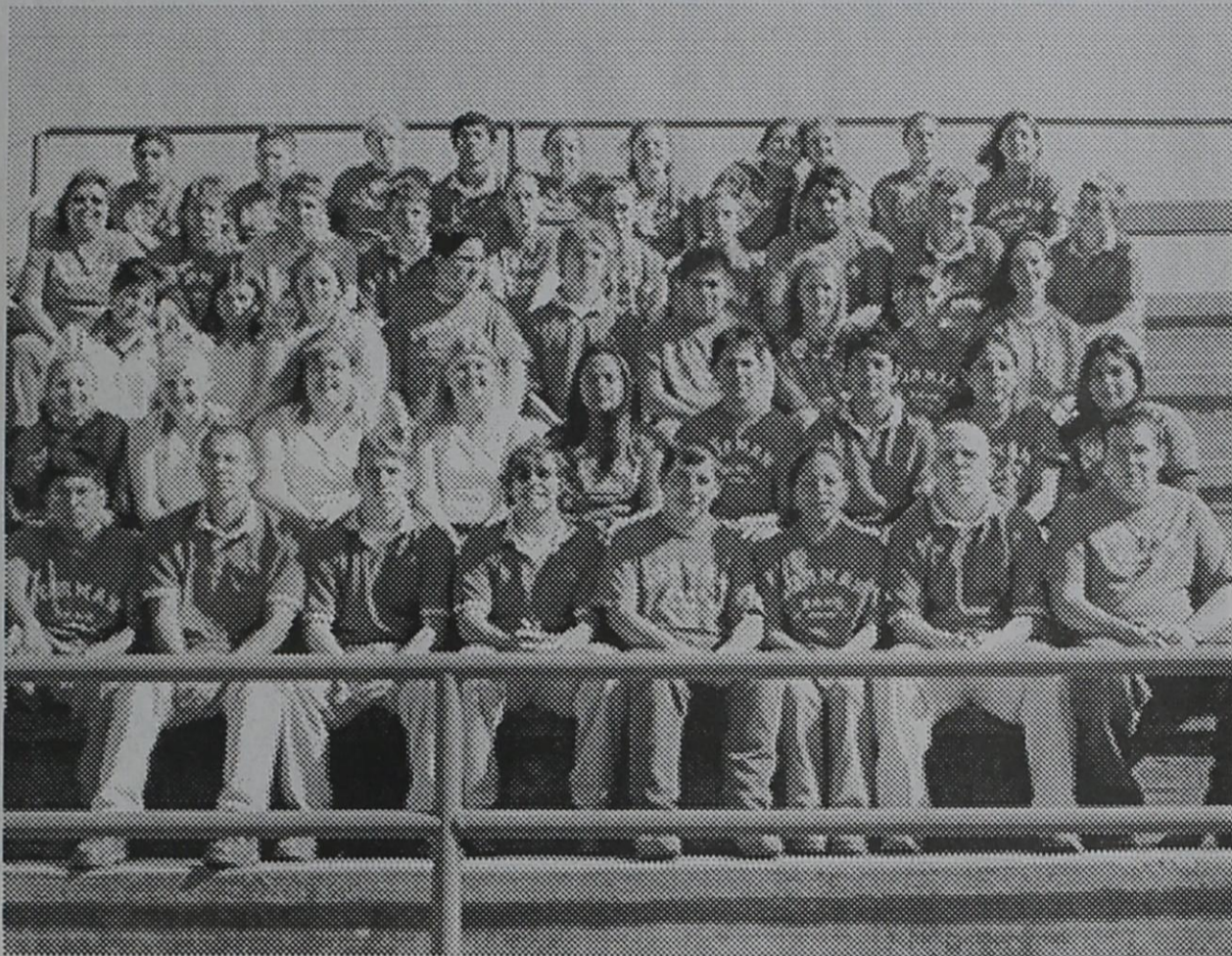

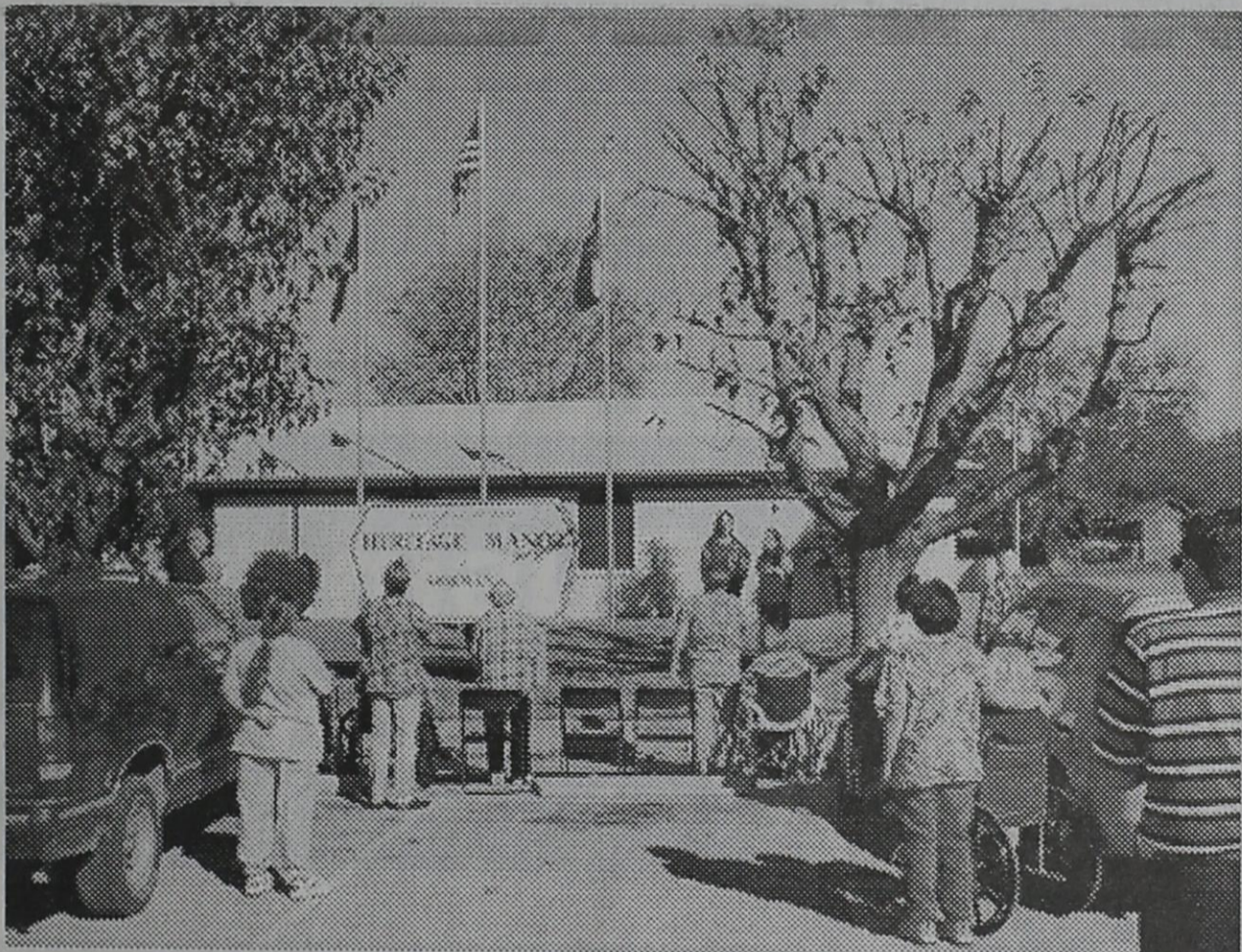
## Panther Band Receives Div. II Rating In Contest

## Panthers Edged By Bears 14-7 To End Great Season

The Panthers were edged 14-7 by the Baird Bears on Friday night in the Bears Den in a hard fought battle to end a very successful season and a 8-2 season record with a 4-2 district mark.

Gorman jumped out to a 7-0 lead in the first quarter on their second possession as they got the ball on their own 16 and went the distance in 6 plays with Rollo Torres getting the score on a beautiful 42 yard scamper up the middle with 2:32 left on the clock in the period. Jose Cruz added the point after on a kick to put Gorman up 7-0. The drive featured a 15 yard run by Josh Carruth and a 28 yard blast by Rollo Torres.

The Bears answered right back on the next possession going 61 yards in 9 plays with Zack Harmon breaking through the Big Red defense for 24 yards for the score with 10:27 left in the second period. The kick for point was good to knot the score at 7-7.

Midway through the second period the Bears got the ball on their own 36 and scored in just one big blast as Harmon caught the Big Red defense out of position and raced untouched up the middle for 80 yards with 7:52 left. The Bears had two penalties on the drive before the Harmon run. Again the kick for point was good and Baird led 14-7.

But the Panthers came right back and started a drive at their own 36 following a Bear fumble. The drive featured runs of 5 and 12 by Torres before Sawyer Wright broke free of the Bears defense and raced 31 yards for what Gorman fans thought was the tying score. However after a discussion on the score one referee had signaled a TD, but another said Wright had stepped out at the Baird 2. So the Panthers were set up first and goal at the 2, but couldn't get in for the score. This was a big factor in the outcome of the game.

Gorman had 2 more drives later but failed on a field goal and was held on downs as time was running out.

This loss kept the Panthers out of the playoffs.

Torres led the Panthers with 118 yards on 11 carries. Wright ran for 72 yards on 11 tries. Rodriguez had 27 on 8 tries. Josh Carruth got 21

on 7 and Tim Guerra ran once for 3.

The Big Red can be justly proud of this season as they did real well despite predictions to the contrary. So they can hold their heads up very high for their accomplishments.

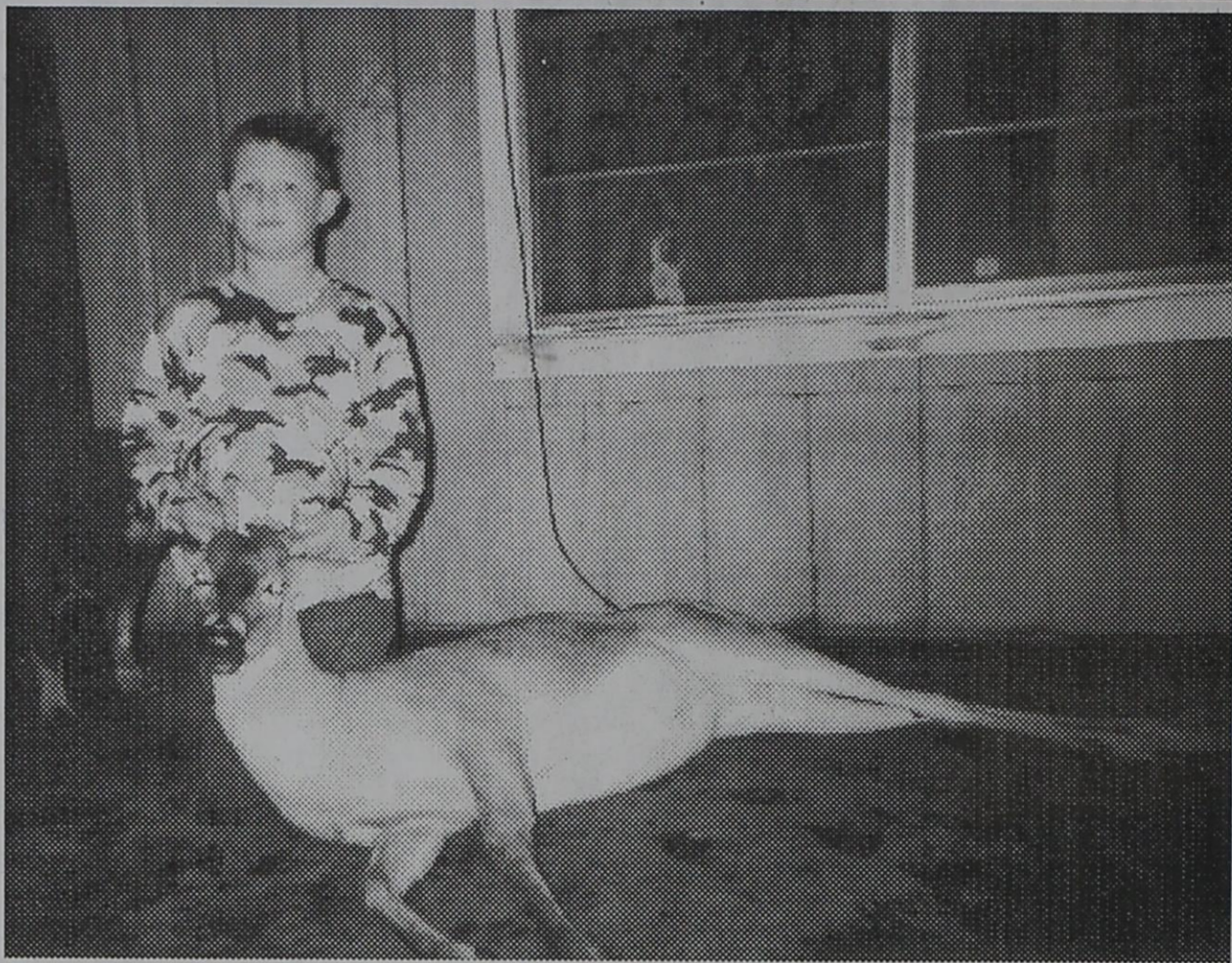
Rosa, you are my leader. You keep up the spirit of both the squad and the fans.

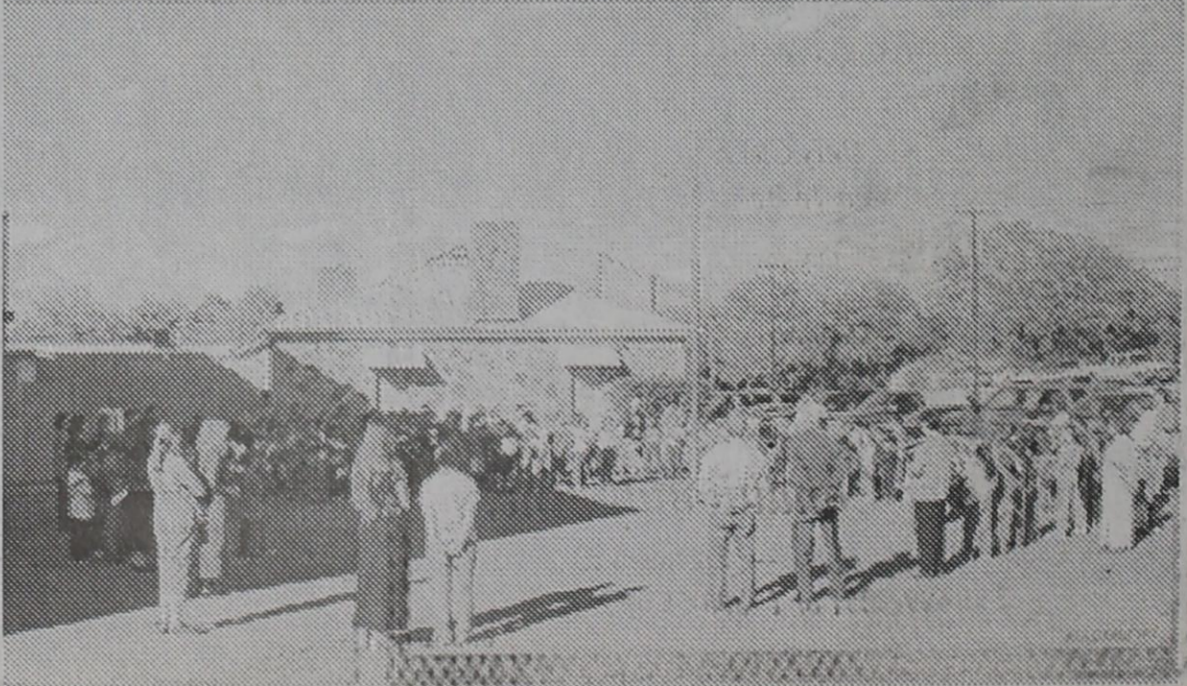
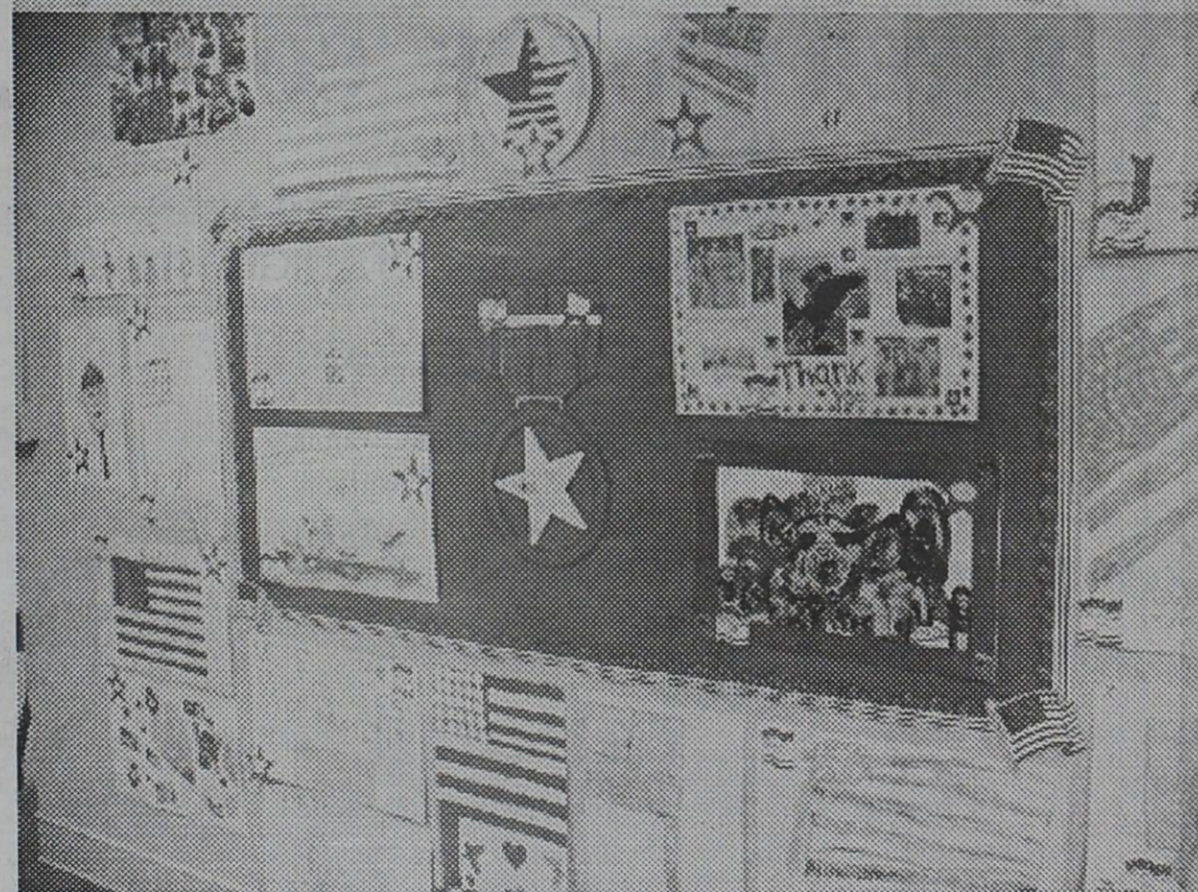
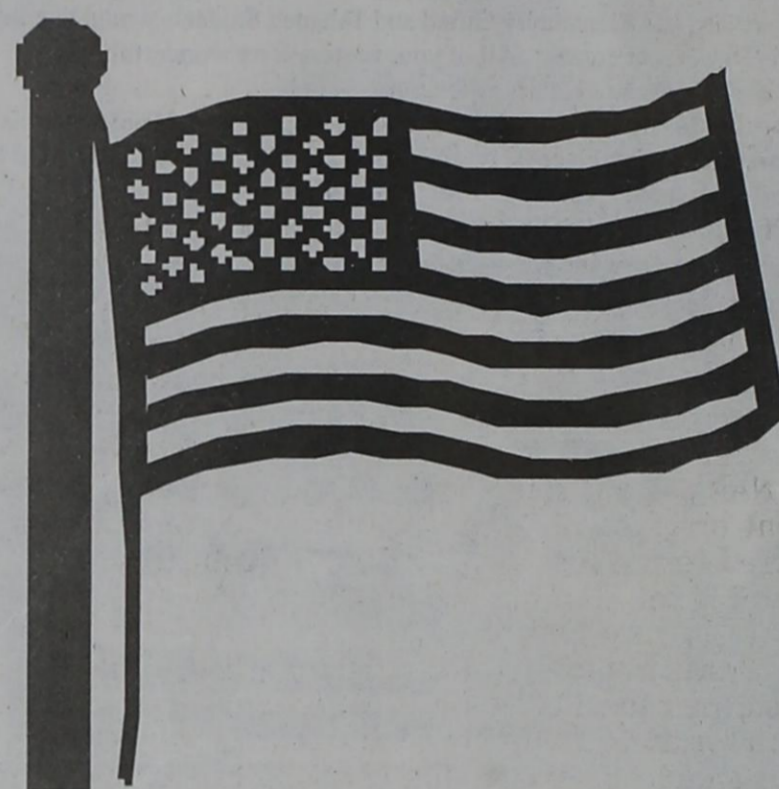
### A MEMORIAL TRIP TO GEORGIA AND TENNESSEE

# Comanche Cow Clinic To Focus on the Calf Market

The Comanche Cow Clinic is an annual educational event focusing on the needs of the cow/calf producer. Extension Livestock Committees in Brown and Comanche Counties have worked together this year to develop a program about the calf market, focusing on what the buyers want in a weaned calf. Every cow/calf producer today wants his calves to bring the market highs and the panel of experts lined up for the Comanche Cow Clinic will help producers better understand what it takes to bring those market highs and maybe more importantly how to avoid those market lows.

The Comanche Cow Clinic or CCC will be held on Tuesday, November 19, 2002 at 6:00 p.m. at the Comanche Livestock Exchange on Highway 377 next to Gore's AgriService Center in Comanche. The CCC will begin with a great barbecue meal followed by the program inside where the livestock auction takes place. To preregister producers can call the Brown County Extension Office at 915/646-0386 or the Comanche County Extension Office at 915/356-2539.

Individuals with disabilities who require an auxiliary aid, service or accommodation in order to participate in this program are encouraged to contact Texas Cooperative Extension in Comanche County at 915/356-2539 to determine how reasonable accommodations can be made.

The Comanche Cow Clinic will feature a panel of livestock experts who regularly buy cattle for major feeders. Dr. Steve Hammack, Extension Beef Cattle Specialist, will serve as moderator for the panel setting the stage for a discussion of premiums and discounts. Local ranchers will bring calves into the ring for an evaluation by the panel on what they think the calf will bring and why. This kind of evaluation will help cow/calf producers better understand what the market wants and how to breed towards those targets. The panel will include Frazier Clark from Comanche, Joe Paul McCullough from Comanche and Brent Wagner from Stephenville.

Sponsors for the Comanche Cow Clinic include Comanche Electric Cooperative, Comanche National Bank, Farmers and Merchants Bank, First National Bank, Gore's AgriService Center, UAP Southwest, Gorman Milling, Ag Texas Farm Credit Services, Farmers Milling Company of Graham, Inc., Comanche Ford New Holland, Federal Land Bank association, Merial, Shamrock Fertilizer, and The Feed Store.

Make plans now to enjoy this important educational program for livestock producers. Extension livestock committees plan programs such as this to better educate local producers and hopefully to bring added income back to the ranch.

# NAP Application Deadline Nears for Native Grass and Improved Pastures

David W. Martin, County Executive Director for the Eastland County farm Service Agency (FSA), reminds local farmers and ranchers that the application closing date to sign up for the Non-Insured Assistance Program (NAP) for native grass and improved pastures is December 1, 2002.


NAP covers crops damaged by severe weather that result in a loss of 50 percent or greater. Losses are generally determined by percentage of loss compared to the producer's actual yield history. Lost production eligible for payment is paid at 55 percent of crop value.

"Producers interested in obtaining crop insurance on perennial pastures should visit their local USDA Service Center as soon as possible to complete an application for their 2003 acres," said Martin. "Producers with acres in multiple counties should be aware that carrying capacities for pasture acres covered under NAP may vary by state and by county, so they need to check with their local FSA offices for details," he added.

NAP coverage is only available for crops where coverage is not available under the Federal Crop Insurance Program (FCIC). "For all native grass and improved pastures, producers must report acres and file notices of loss in a timely manner to insure eligibility. However, production evidence is not required for perennial pastures that are grazed only," said Martin.

The December 1, 2002 deadline to purchase NAP coverage also applies to persons who have an existing policy and want to renew their coverage for 2003.




