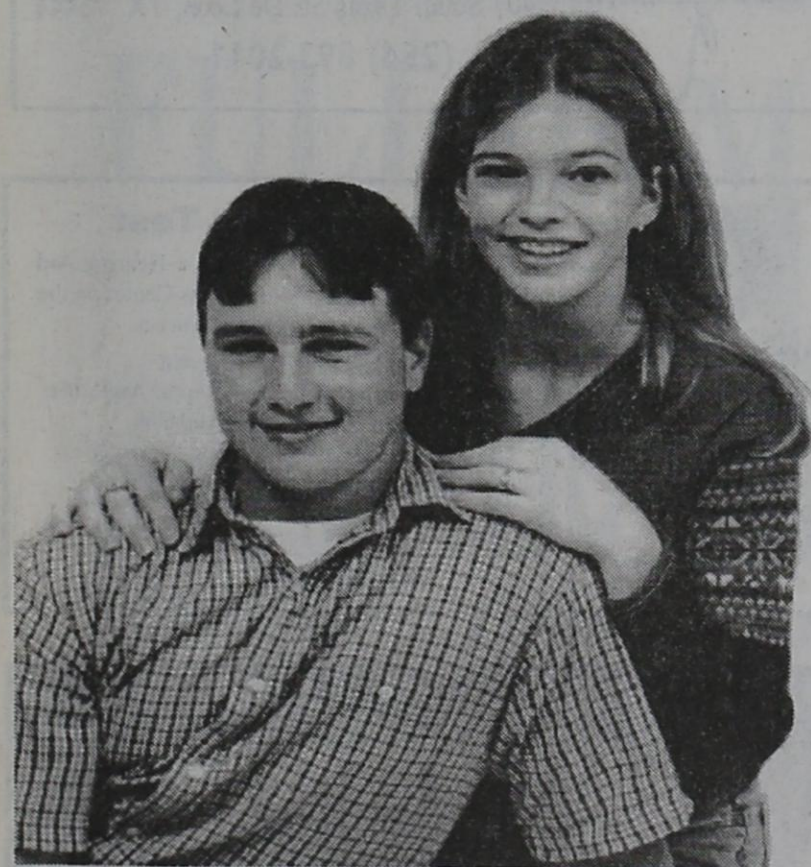
Kokomo Baptist Church To Hold Vacation Bible School

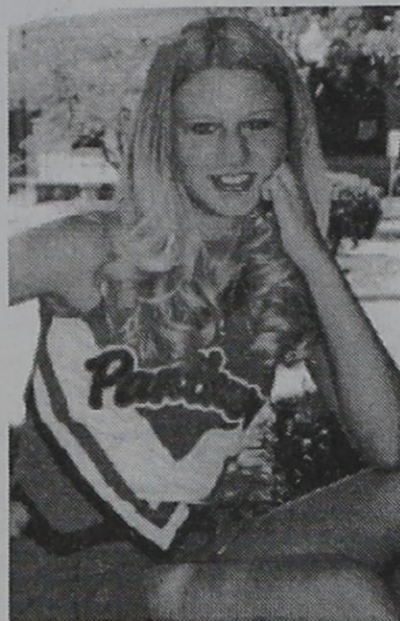

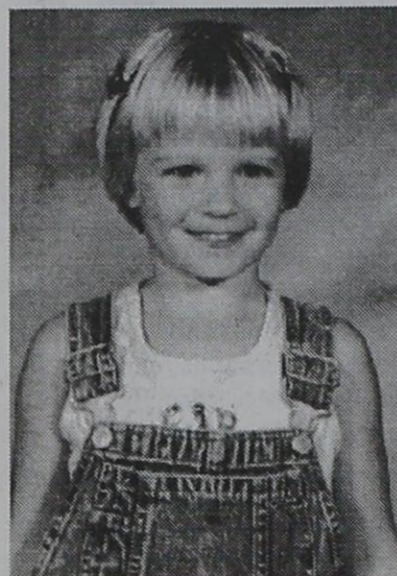
Ashlee's hobbies include watching moving with Keith, shopping, and anything athletic. Ashlee's favorite foods are pizza and fajitas.

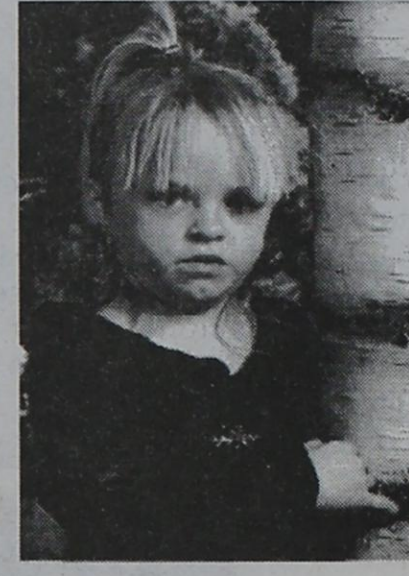
Lauren Spivey

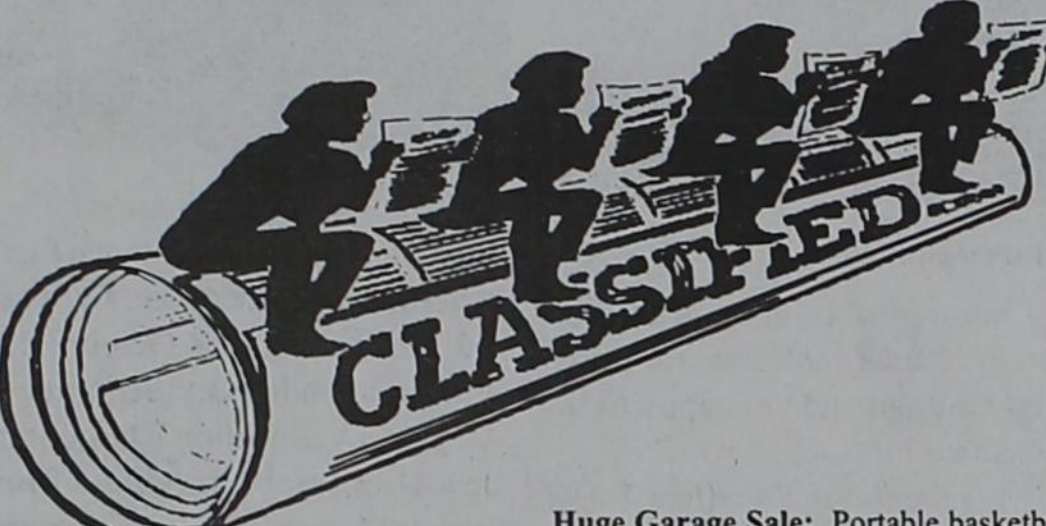

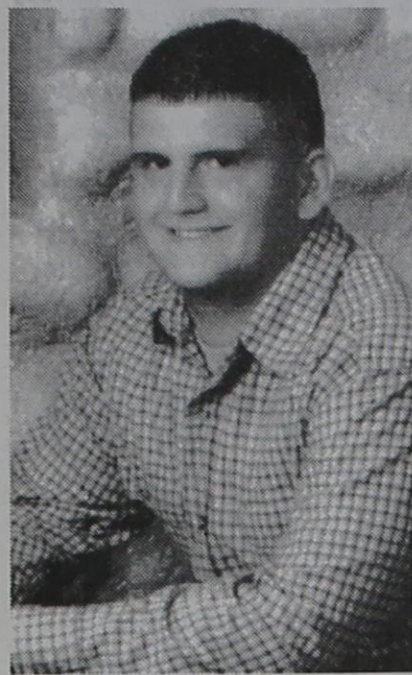

Congressman Stenholm Champions New Rural Strategic Development Program

WASHINGTON, DC — "The final farm bill features an innovative program that provides new incentives and resources for public and private sector officials to pursue regional economic development strategies," according to National Association of Development Organizations (NADO) President John Bruner. Championed by Congressman Charles Stenholm (D-TX), the \$100 million Rural Strategic Investment Program is part of the six-year farm bill rewrite signed by President Bush on May 13.

According to Bruner, "With the leadership and vision of Congressman Stenholm, the latest farm bill recognizes that rural communities across the country are faced with a complex set of needs and challenges. Whether a rural region is dependent on farming, tourism or manufacturing, they must plan for tomorrow or risk falling behind in today's global marketplace. The new rural development program will provide much needed resources for local officials to develop and implement strategies that stress economic diversification, innovation and partnerships."

"While most urban areas have reaped the benefits of federal capacity building programs for decades, the bulk of federal assistance to rural areas has been focused on maintaining the status quo through transfer payments to individuals," according to Bruner. "At the insistence of Congressman Stenholm and others, the new program fills one of the most pressing needs in rural America, and that is funding for comprehensive strategic planning and long-term capacity building. Without professional staff and local expertise, it is extremely difficult for smaller communities to build and sustain viable economies."

Under the program, the Secretary of Agriculture will establish a new National Board on Rural America with representatives from state and local government, private industry, community development groups and the rural philanthropic community. The national board will certify and fund Regional Investment Boards, which will be public-private partnerships focused on developing and implementing proactive regional development strategies.

Each regional partnership will develop a comprehensive action plan that identifies basic infrastructure needs, opportunities for economic diversification, human resource capacity needs and the availability of market-based financing and venture capital within the region, among other factors. To help local communities implement the plans, the national board will then select regions to receive innovation grants. Preference will be given to projects that exhibit strong public-private partnerships, leverage additional public and private funds and address gaps in existing basic services. Planning grants are capped at \$100,000 and innovation grants are limited to \$3 million.

In addition, the program encourages President Bush to create the position of Special Assistant to the President for Rural Affairs and to sponsor a White House Conference on Rural America. Both provisions are intended to facilitate improved coordination among the federal agencies that provide assistance to rural communities and to enhance the national dialogue on rural America.

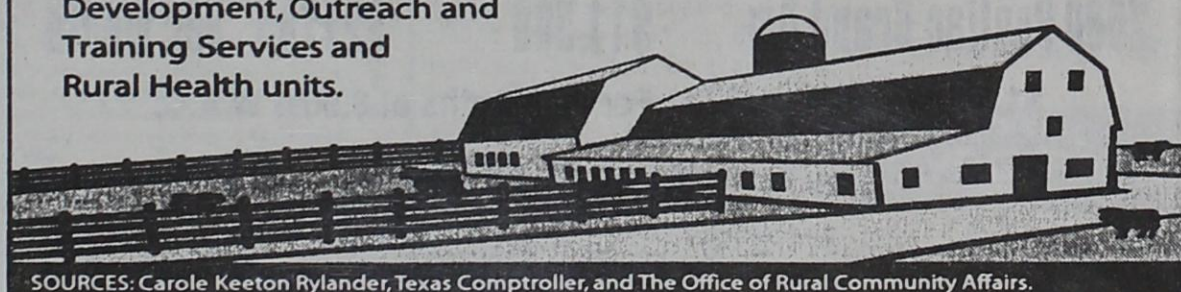

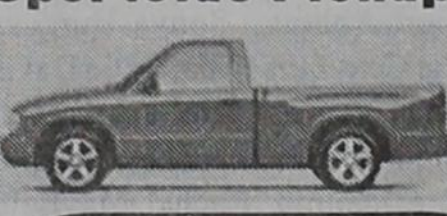
