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



HERBAL TEAS Compiled by Berette Hart, Intern

Herbal teas and other herbal supplements have become popular, being recommended to build up the immune system, to relieve infant colic, and for other health benefits. According to the Journal of the American Dietetic Association, May 1995 issue, some fo these herbal teas contain enough of a certain ingredient, coumarin, to interfere with normal blood clotting. Teas made of three coumarin is often prescribed by physicians for those needing anticoagulants to thin the blood but can be very dangerous or life threatening if they are not needed. The three plants named above do contain coumarin, but the tupe of coumarin and the amount that would be present in teas made from these herbs were unknown. Taking herbal teas or herbal supplements without the advice of a physician is not unwarranted but may be dangerous. Before taking any herbal tea or supplement, as with any other supplement, you should check with your family doctor just to be sure it is safe for you. This is particularly true for in the case of infants, young children, senior citizens, pregnant and lactating mothers, and those having a chronic illness. Just because supplements are available without prescription does not necessarily mean that they are safe for everyone.



## **Gramm Praises** South Korea

U.S. Sen Phil Gramm today praised South Korea's decision to lift trade restrictions on U.S. red meat, saying the move should help open markets for all Texas beef and prok producers.

"I am extremely pleased that South Korea has chosen to do the right thing and resolve this dispute by opening its market to U.S. beef and pork once and for all," Gramm said.

Under the agreement, Korea will phase out its current "use by" date system for chilled or vacuum-packed meats and all frozen foods by July 1, 1996, after which U.S. manufacturers will set their own dates. For dried, packaged canned and bottled foods, Korea will allow manufacturers to set their own dates beginning Oct. 1 of this year.

"While I would prefer that the Koreans change their policy immediately, and I will encourage them to do so, you can be sure that I will insist that they meet the deadline they have committed to," the senator said.

South Korea had been under pressure by Congress and U.S. beef and pork exporters to eliminate its short shelf-life rules, or face having the dispute argued before the World Trade Organization.

Gramm had joined 40 senators in urging the White House to take a tough stance in the dispute during an upcoming visit to the U.S. by South Korean President Kim. The senators had demanded that South Korea lift the "web of non-tariff barriers" which make it virtually impossible to sell American beef and pork in South Korea.

Beef and pork producers say the deal could mean as much as \$240 million in increased sales immediately for American beef and pork producers, and as much as \$1 billion in higher annual sales by 1999.

"South Korea's decision to eliminate this trade barrier on American beef and pork will open markets for all U.S. food products, and promises substantial long-term benefits for Texas producers," Gramm said. "Reducing barriers to trade and increasing markets for value-added Texas farm products holds the key to economic growth for agriculture in Texas."

Trade experts report that Korea is the fourth largest market for U.S. agricultural exports, and the third largest for American beef.
