Peanut Festival Huge Success

Gorman, Texas, a quaint farming community, was full of celebration on Saturday September 14, as people came from far and near, to honor the peanut, during the Gorman Peanut Festival and Parade. The parade committee would like to first, thank everyone who participated in the parade, without you, this would not have been the best Peanut Festival Parade ever. Thank you to our Grand Marshals, political officials, and helpers who volunteered their time to help with this year's parade. At 10am sharp, the sirens of the local police cars could be heard, leading the parade downtown. Following, on gallant horseback, the American and Texas Flags, waved in glory, as Grand Marshals Odie Brightwell, 101 year old resident of Gorman and Mary Webb, first woman inducted into the Peanut Hall Fame, waved to the crowds which gathered down the streets of Gorman. Next, over fifty different entries, from elaborately decorated floats, cars, tractors, children on 4wheelers, marching bands, cheerleaders and horses, made their appearance on the parade route. Several area politicians, queens, and duchesses also did their parts to greet the onlookers.. Panthers Overwhelm Owls 52-21; Play At Perrin-Whitt On Friday

The Gorman Panthers traveled to Covington on Friday night to meet the Owls and came away with an overwhelming 52 to 21 victory to up their season record to 2-0. The Panthers had a 26-15 lead at halftime, they exploded for another 26 points in the last half for the vic-

The Big Red showed the fans what was ahead as they held the Owls on their first possession and took over the ball on the Owl 27 when Chad Robertson intercepted an Owl pass. Following a 5 yard penalty on the first snap the Panwith Juan Martinez getting the final yard with 5:35 left. The drive featured runs of 14 and 2 by Rollo Torres and a 9 yard run by Josh Carruth. The kick for point after was no good and Gorman was up

But the Owls answered right back after getting a Panther fumble on the Gorman 28 and scored in 8 plays with a pass to Eric McFarland for the final 4 yards. A pass for the 2 pointer put the Owls up 8-6.

Then Gorman came right back and moved 74 yards in just 4 plays with Rollo Torres rambling the final 12 yards with 10:24 left in the second quarter. The drive featured runs of 8 and 37 by Sawyer Wright and an 18 yarder by Roberto Rodriquez. Then Josh Carruth got the 2 pointer on a run to put Gor-

The Owls scored again on a 91 yard pass play when they caught the Panther secondary up near the line and tossed a pass to McFarland who caught the pass at the Owl 35 and outrun the Panther defenders for the score with 4:17 left in the half. After the kick for point after the Owls were up 15-14.

But again the Panthers answered right back, taking the ball on their own 46, and after a 5 yard penalty on the Owls, moved 41 yards in just 3 plays with Sawyer Wright breaking free on a beautiful 35 yard run for the score with 2:55 left in the half. The drive also featured a 12 yard run by Rollo and a 4 yarder by Roberto. The pass for 2 points failed and Gorman was up 20-15.

With 2:30 left in the half the Panthers got the ball on the Owl 49 and scored in just one great running play by Sawyer Wright who ran the dis-



The purpose of this letter is to notify you of the conditions, under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA), through which special education and related services may be provided to children with disabilities voluntarily enrolled by their parents in private schools, including religious and home schools.

Child Find—The local Education Agency (LEA) has a child find system for identifying, locating, and evaluating all children with disabilities (birth through 21) residing in the school district, including children with disabilities attending private schools, regardless of the severity of their disabilities, and who are in need of special education and related services.

If you have a child or children whom you suspect of being disabled, you may initiate a referral for a full and individual evaluation by notifying your local school district or East End Education Co-op at 254-734-2020.

Children who have not been identified through the child find process and determined to be eligible for special education and related services by an Admission, Review, & Dismissal (ARD) committee cannot be included in the determination of services described below.

Services to Parentally Placed Private School Children with Disabilities—The law does not require that services be provided to all children with disabilities voluntarily enrolled in private or home schools, or to every private or home school. However, every effort will be made to provide appropriate services with proportionate IDEA funds. If you will contact your local school district or East End Education Co-op, you will assist us in our effort to accurately count all IDEA eligible children enrolled in private and home schools. This count will help to determine how best to use the proportionate share of IDEA funds to meet the needs of children with disabilities voluntarily enrolled in private and home school settings.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT Special Election NOVEMBER 5, 2002

Explanatory Brief for HJR 2

HJR 2 would amend the constitution to allow the commissioners court of a county to declare the office of constable dormant if that office has been vacant for at least seven consecutive years. The records of a constable office that is declared dormant will be transferred to the county clerk. If the office is declared dormant, the previous officeholder does not continue to hold the office. The office may not be filled by election or appointment unless the commissioners court votes to reinstate the office or a majority of votes cast in an election held on the issue favor reinstatement. The reinstatement election may be held if the commissioners court on its own motion orders such an election, or the reinstatement election must be held if the commissioners court receives a petition signed by 10% of the registered voters of the constable precinct,

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the commissioners court of a county to declare the office of constable in a precinct to be dormant if the office has not been filled by election or appointment for a lengthy period and providing a procedure for the reinstatement of the office.'
