USDA Announces Base and Gorman Elementary Students Yield Designation Period

As part of USDA's ongoing implementation of the 2002 Farm Bill, USDA today announced that peanut producers can designate their base acreage and yield information to a farm or farms between Jan. 6, 2003, and March 31, 2003.

"The new farm bill contained a historic overhaul of the peanut program," said Administrator James R. Little, USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA). "This is the only opportunity peanut producers have to designate their peanut bases and yields. It is vitally important that producers visit their USDA Service Centers and complete this important task."

The total peanut acreage and yields designated to a farm will be used for the purpose of issuing 2003 through 2007 direct and, if applicable, counter-cyclical payments. FSA has begun notifying peanut producers of these important dates by means of a "Designation of Average Acreage and Yield Notification

The 2002 Farm Bill significantly changed the peanut program by replacing the quota system that was established in the 1930s with direct and countercyclical payments for eligible peanut producers.

The Direct and Counter-cyclical Program provides payments to producers on farms having bases for peanuts and other commodities for 2002 through 2007 crop years. Direct payments are issued regardless of market prices. Counter-cyclical payments, however, are made only when a commodity's effective price is below its target price.





A New Congress

In 1789 the members of the first federal Congress convened with the noble goal of creating a solid foundation on which to build a great nation. Knowing that the responsibility for the success or failure of America's Revolution laid squarely on their shoulders, they began to create the legislation that would become the blueprint for our system of government.

This January, 214 years after our nation's experiment with democracy began, we convene for the 108th Congress to continue the work of our Founding Fathers.

107th Congress (January 2001– December 2002)

The 107th Congress came to a close having achieved a number of important accomplishments. When we set out in January of 2001, we could never have envisioned the tragedy that would strike our nation on September 11th. While our primary focus was rightly on securing our homeland and protecting our citizens, we were able to accomplish a great deal on other key issues.

Economic Opportunity - Congress passed sweeping tax relief to create jobs, strengthen the economy, and put more money in Americans' pocketbooks. We also passed Trade Promotion Authority to give the President a strong hand to negotiate trade agreements and open new markets to U.S. products. Congress enacted an economic stimulus bill giving shortterm help to displaced workers and providing long-term stimulus to help businesses create more jobs. We also addressed the need for terrorism insurance to help building projects recover.

Improving Public Education - Congress passed the "No Child Left Behind Act," the most historic education reform in a generation to increase funding, infuse accountability into our public school systems, and create opportunity to ensure that every American child has a chance to

Corporate Accountability - Congress passed tough corporate accountability legislation to punish acts of corruption, help restore confidence in corporate America, and protect small investors. It also established stricter standards for auditor independence by prohibiting accounting firms from providing most consulting services to the clients they audit.

National Security - While the U.S. military has expertly prosecuted the war on terrorism, and rooted out al Qaeda from Afghanistan, Congress has worked to provide the tools and resources they need. We passed a defense bill to give our men and women in the Armed Forces upgraded equipment, technology and infrastructure, and better housing and pay for the difficult job they perform.

Homeland Security - President Bush signed legislation creating the Department of Homeland Security, which will help the U.S. government to better protect our nation against terrorism and preserve the liberties and freedoms we enjoy as Americans.

108th Congress (January 2003– December 2004)

The new Congress begins with a full plate to help us grow and prosper as a nation. Here are some of the top priorities:

Extend unemployment benefits for Americans who need them; Finish the appropriations bills left over from last year's Congress to

fully fund the initiatives and programs on which people rely; Enact an economic stimulus package to bolster our economy and

strengthen the stock market; and Reform Social Security and Medicare with a prescription drug com-

ponent to bring those venerable programs up to date and ensure they will be there for generations to come.

Enact an energy bill to make our country more self sufficient.

Finishing the Job

We will complete the work we undertook with the Department of Homeland Security. We must ensure the Department is fully funded and operational as soon as possible. Though the transition will take time, Congress will work with the president and the new Department to ensure the move is seamless and efficient.

Congress must also develop and implement a comprehensive national energy policy. Though we worked tirelessly toward that end last year, we were ultimately unable to send a bill to President Bush. I'm confident we will pass a bill that will encourage domestic production and release our nation from the grip of Middle East oil dependency.

Undoubtedly, there are many other issues that will be brought before this Congress, and our priorities may shift with the needs and concerns of the American people. But we enter this year with the echo of the first Congress' noble goal foremost in our minds: we will continue to build upon the solid foundation they began and ensure that America continues to be the beacon of freedom and liberty for all people around the world.






