SOUTH AMERICAN FILMS

One evening the President and I. with our dinner guests, had the pleasure of seeing some new films. One is made from pictures taken during Mr. Julian Bryan's last trip to South America, and his voice gives the running comment.

She told most interestingly of the country and the life there and casually mentioned that they had been spending some very pleasant hours with Mr. Julian Bryan. Here I was looking at the picture made on his last trip, while he was out making pictures for a future film!

The other picture shown was done under the direction of Mr. Joseph Losey. It is a very charm. ing picture of a nursery school in a rural area. Children are shown in all the activities that are possible in country surroundings. We see them at work and at play. The children range in age from two to seven years.
