

### **Prop. 5 Important to Continuation of Veterans Home Loan Program**

Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro is traveling across the state these days explaining to voters the importance of Proposition 5 in the Nov. 7 constitutional amendments election.

"Texas has a longstanding tradition of assisting the men and women who have served their country in one of the military branches," Mauro said. "Passage of Proposition 5 in the Nov. 7 election will ensure that this

u adition will continue. Failure means the state could lose a program that has helped thousands of veterans and their families make their dreams of home ownership come true."

Proposition 5 authorizes the Veterans Land Board (VLB), which Mauro chairs, to sell an additional \$500 million in tax exempt, general obligation bonds to continue financing the Texas Veterans Housing Program. The program provides low-interest loans for the purchase of homes and making home improvements.

The VLB interest rates range from 1 to 1.5 percent below market, which can save veterans \$30 to \$50 a month on their mortgage payment, depending on the length of the loan. By law, the maximum loan is \$45,000, but it can be blended with a conventional, FHA or VA loan to bring the overall interest rate down for the purchase of a more expensive home.

"The reason we need authority to issue more bonds is simple," Mauro said. "We're running out of housing money. The program is so popular that the last two years have been the best in its history. In 1994, more than 6,800 veterans bought homes utilizing the program. Overall in 1994 the VLB certified \$354 million in loans for land and housing, \$309.5 million for housing alone–an increase of 175 percent over 1993 which also was a record year."

Mauro emphasized that the program costs the taxpayers nothing. The bonds are retired by the loan repayments. Small fees paid by the veterans cover the cost of administration. He also emphasized that the program has solid bipartisan support. The State Legislature voted unanimously to place Proposition 5 on the November ballot, and it has been endorsed by Gov. George W. Bush and the Texas Association of Realtors.

"This program helps communities remain viable," Mauro said. "It is estimated that each dollar loaned has a ripple effect of six dollars in the state's economy. It generates dollars for all sorts of folks, including title company employees, builders, painters, plumbers, electricians, remodelers, and furniture and appliance salespersons. It's win-win for Texas all the way."



First of all, remember that the new household coverage law resulted form a number of well-publicized cases of people who did not pay their household worker Social Security taxes. it is designed to make it easier for people to pay these taxes by having to file only once a year instead of quarterly, by not having to pay taxes on babysitters, and by paying taxes on people they pay earnings of at least \$1,000 a year instead of \$50 a calendar quarter. You'll have fewer forms to complete and, depending on how much you employ outside help, you may pay less tax. Here are some frequently asked questions: Q. Exactly who does the law cover? A. Instead of filing a report each calendar quarter and paying tax on the earnings of worker who are paid \$50 or more during the quarter, you pay annually on earnings of at least \$1,000 for the full year. The tax rate is unchanged, with you and your employee each paying 7.65 percent of the gross earnings.

Q. I heard something about a refund if you paid household worker's taxes last year. How does that work?

A. The new tax threshold was effective iwth 1994 earnings. In those cases where a household worker was paid less than \$1,000, the employer and employee will receive refunds for their share of the taxes. However, the employee won't lose his or her Social Secuirty credits. To obtain a refund of if you have questions about paying taxes on household employment, callthe Interanl Revenue Service at 1-800-829-1040.

Q. How do I File? For 1994 taxes, you should have filed the qurterly IRS Form 942 to report. Beginning with 1995 taxes, you will be required to report Social Security and federal unemployment tax obligations on your own federal tax return (Form 1040). During the 1995-1997, you can pay the employment taxes in a lum usm when you file your tax return, without incurring a late penalty. Beginning in 1998; you will need to satisfy the tax obligation by increasing your quarterly tax payments or increasing the tax withholding on your own wages. If you have questions about the changes in reporting household employment and paying the Social Security taxes on Household contact your local Social Security office, or call our toll=-free West Central Tx. number, 1-800-772-1213. 



Every Thurber home had running water and electricity. In fact, Thurber was the first totally electrified city in the United States. A power plant was 1915, each home also had natural gas for heat.



"October marks the reality of USDA's implementation of President Clinton's Reinventing Government initiative," said George Ellis, Rural Economic and Community Development (RECD) Texas State Director. The agencies which will make up the service centers include: the RECD, which is the housing, community, and business programs of the former Farmers Home Admistration (FmHA); the Farm Service Agency (FSA), which is the former Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) and the farm programs of the former FmHA; and the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), which is the former Soil Conservation Service (SCS). The purpose of Reorganization is to "right size" the federal government and create a "one-stop" service concept for USDA customers.

"Every customer who needs service should call or go to the same USDA service center that he or she is using now," said Ellis. "In most cases, the

### Working While Retired? Time For A Reality Check


Working beneficiaries whose benefit amounts depend on the earnings estimate they provided Social Security on the annual earnings report they filed last April should be sure to review their current earnings to see if they have changed. If so, the change should be reported to Social Security immediately, according to Ken Hargis. Social Security manager in Abilene.

"Because it is difficult to estimate exact earnings for the year, we encourage beneficiaries who work to call us to adjust their estimated earnings if they get a raise, work overtime, or otherwise increase their income," Hargis stated.

Every year about a million people receive more money from Social Security than they were entitled to receive as a result of unanticipated earnings. Most of these overpayments occurred because beneficiaries who work while drawing benefits earned more than they had estimated and their income exceeded Social Security's annual limits. The annual limits for 1995 are \$8,160 for persons under age 65, and \$11,280 for persons between age 65-69. If you are still working at age 70, the earnings limits do not apply so you no longer have to report your earnings to Social Security.

People who are overpaid by Social Security are required to return the money, either by direct refunds or by having their benefits reduced to cover the overpayment.

It's easy to report excess earnings and other events that would cause you to be overpaid. Visit the nearest Social Security office or call us on our tollfree number, 1-800-772-1213, business days between 7 A.M. and 7 P.M.



### **Prison System**

The Texas Department of Criminal Justice is looking into the possibility of serving as an offical conduit to help Texas counties lease empty county jail space to other states.

Such a move might immediately match Dallas County's empty beds to the needs of the state of Massachusetts, TDCJ officials said Friday.

"With the help of the Jail Standards Commission, TDCJ can bring the counties and the other states together to their mutual benefit and that's a service we should perform," said Allan B. Polunsky, chairman of the Texas Board of Criminal Justice.

Many Texas counties have found themselves paying mortgages on empty jail space since this summer when TDCJ's massive prison expansion program cleared the backlog of state prisoners out of the county jails.

At the same time, many other states which have not had aggressive prison

expansion found themselves confronted with prisoner backlogs and have decided they would rather rent than build. Although many of those states' prison systems are barred by state law from contracting with out-of-state counties, they can contract through the State of Texas because TDCJ is a member of the Interstate Corrections Compact. Collins said that while TDCJ would serve as the legal conduit for the counties and states, the Jail Standards Commission would serve "as a referral service because they are familiar on a daily basis with the situation in every county jail in Texas."

"TDCJ, Jail Standards and the State of Texas would have absolutely no liability whatsoever in helping pair what the counties have and what the states need," Collins said.
