



Y BIRD'S WILDFLOWERS

Texas' landscape is a marriage of our Western heritage and progressive future. Glass skyscrapers are nestled between our prairies and ranch lands. Technology firms are as prominent as our oil and gas industries. But one thing remains constant - the natural beauty of our state. And nowhere is that more evident than in the fields of wildflowers that border our state's highways, courtesy of one of our nation's most revered first ladies, Lady Bird Johnson.

Lady Bird, who earned her nickname as a child because she was "purty as a lady bird," was born Claudia Alta Taylor in far east Texas. It was in Austin, where she studied at the University of Texas, that she met Lyndon Baines Johnson.

Lady Bird and Lyndon were married and became one of our state's most influential couples. She labored side-by-side with her husband as he worked his way up to Vice President of the United States. When President Kennedy's 1963 assassination thrust LBJ into the role of Commander-in-Chief, Mrs. Johnson was there to comfort a grieving nation.

As First Lady, she worked hard to beautify our nation and our capital. She labored tirelessly to raise funds to improve the landscape and plant thousands of flowers and trees throughout Washington, D.C. While traveling the country with President Johnson, she noticed the cluttered, unsightly mess that many roadways had become. She decided to do something about it. In 1965 she launched the Highway Beautification Act, one of as the Plum Island Disease Facility, would be moved to the new department. the first major legislative campaigns undertaken by a First Lady.

In 1982, on her 70th birthday, Mrs. Johnson opened the National Wildflower Center in Austin, Texas. She transportation security functions of many federal agencies. launched the Center to "educate people about the environmental necessity, economic value, and natural beauty of native plants." As a testament to her dedication, the 42-acre site was later renamed the Lady Bird Johnson Wildflower Center.

Each year, thousands of visitors flock to the Center just south of Austin to marvel at the fields of sunflowers, poppies and bluebonnets that flourish in the warm Texas Spring. The Center also serves as an educational resource to teach visitors from around the world about the importance of conservation and caring for our

One particular focus of the Center is landscape restoration, the effort to "heal" ecological systems that have been damaged or destroyed. Researchers at the center study unique ways to reintroduce vegetation to damaged ecosystems and help re-establish natural growth processes that have been interrupted.

The Wildflower Center is a great place to learn about the native plants that are unique to our great state and how we can all participate in ensuring they are still around for future generations to enjoy.

Lady Bird's legacy will forever grow along our Texas and national highways. The next time you pass a field of Texas wildflowers - stop, take a picture, and remember the loving handiwork of one of our nation's greatest leading ladies, Lady Bird Johnson.



USDA Asking for Farm Records

The USDA is in the process of contacting farmers to request that they verify and update records on planted and prevented planted

acres filed with USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA).

This information is required by the 2002 Farm Bill, and USDA says it must be correct in order to receive accurate direct and

counter-cyclical payments in the near future.

The FSA has mailed letters to producers all across the country asking for their updates.

The letter includes a summary acreage history report showing the acreage of covered commodities reported to FSA. The

information included will be planted acres and/or acres prevented from being planted for 1998 through 2001. If the information is correct, producers do not need to take any action. However, if the information is wrong, producers will need to provide verifiable documentation of acreage and yields to their local FSA office by August 31. Verifiable documentation may include seed receipts, production records and crop insurance records.

APHIS & Homeland Security

On the subject of the President's efforts to establish a Department of Homeland Security, you may recall that the White House had planned to move the entire Animal & Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) from USDA to a Homeland Security Department.

The House Agriculture Committee has worked closely with the administration to refine the President's proposal, and I am pleased to report that administration officials agreed to a scaled-baked version of this move. Under the revised proposal, the specialized border inspection and enforcement functions of USDA, as well

The Agriculture Committee's proposal is consistent with the President's goal of unifying the border and

Under the revised proposal regarding APHIS, some of the programs that would remain at USDA include: those aimed at protecting livestock from predators; eradication of boll weevils, fruit flies, and brucellosis; controlling rabies in wildlife; negotiating with foreign countries on technical requirements for U.S. exports and imports; biotechnology; and animal welfare.

Peanut Data Verification

Secretary Veneman announced that peanut producers with a qualifying peanut acreage history will soon be asked to update their peanut acreage history and yield information with the FSA.

The information will be used to determine each peanut producer's peanut base and yield for direct and counter-cyclical payments for 2002 through 2007 under the recently passed farm bill.

As many of you know, the farm bill makes significant changes in the peanut program and provides direct

and counter-cyclical payments to eligible peanut producers. Signup will begin this fall, and so producers should review and help update this information now so that

payments can be issued more promptly. FSA county employees are now updating these figures and will send letters to producers with their acreage

and yield information. If this information is incorrect, producers need to provide verifiable documentation of their acreage and yields to their local FSA office by August 5.

U.S. Farm Production Expenses Up

USDA Reports that U.S. farm production expenditures totaled \$197 billion in 2001, up 3.9 percent from the previous year.

The largest contributors to the increase in expenses were tractors and self-propelled machinery, seeds and plants, labor, and farm services. These increases more than offset a 7.1 percent decrease in farm improvements and construction.

Optimistic Outlook for Agriculture Trade

According to the Agricultural Outlook 2002-2007 Report, world agricultural prices should gradually rise from their current weak levels as the economic recovery strengthens at the end of this year and into 2003.

The report forecasts a larger price increase for certain meats and dairy products than for cereals and oil-

seeds. Much of this will be due to stronger demand and increasing imports in rapidly developing countries. The growth in trade of livestock products and feedstuffs will continue to be faster than that of food grains. Yield and productivity, rather than increased land use, will contribute most to crop expansion.

British Generating Electricity From Manure

Last week, I mentioned how the British are using innovative new ways to produce energy. This week, Britain opened the first ever manure-based power station.

The plant, which will use manure from 28 local dairy farms, is expected to feed enough electricity into the National Grid to light about 900 homes. The manure is fermented, which releases the methane gas that will be

used to fire electrical generators. Our British cousins have been very innovative in terms of energy production and, as I've said before, we are going to have to be equally innovative if we are going to lessen our dependence on foreign energy sources and

Lewisville sophomore encouraged to take a flying leap by sibling

Megan Lindaman said her older brother, Jacob, encouraged her to run the hurdles, but the decision to follow him was mostly hers.

Jacob, a 1999 Lewisville graduate, won the 110- and 300-meter hurdles in 1998 Texas Amateur Athletic Federation Games of Texas in Lubbock. Megan, a 15 year-old sophomore at Lewisville, won the 100 and 300 hurdles at the TAAF Region IV meet July 12-13 in Grapevine.

She will attempt to duplicate her brother's feats this weekend at the Games of Texas in Waco. Megan is a member of Lake Cities Track Club, as was Jacob.

"He did tell me I'd be a good hurdler," she said of Jacob's instruction a few years ago. "But I started doing them because I realized I was better at them than the sprints."

Megan won the district middle school meet in the 100- and 200-yard sprints and ran on the winning 4x100 yard relay team as an eighth grader at Hedrick. She became a hurdler last summer for Lake Cities coach Gary Greenier, who trained Jacob for nearly 10 years.
