TPPB's Executive Director Announces Resignation

Mary Webb, executive director for the Texas Peanut Producers Board, has announced her pending resignation effective May 1, 2003.

James Martin, chairman of the board, said the board is now accepting applications for the executive director's position. He said since Mary's departure is not until May 1, the board will take the time to fill the position with the best possible candidate.

Webb began working for the TPPB in 1975 and accepted the executive director's position in 1982. She said that the peanut industry in Texas has grown from 244,000 acres planted in 1981 to 350,000 acres planted in 2001. Peanut production in 1981 totaled 393,250 tons to 467,000 tons in 2001. She said the Texas Peanut Producers Board programs of research, promotion and market development made possible the expansion of the industry.

Most of the increased acres and production is in west Texas because of the irrigation capacity and good soils. In 1998 the board expanded from a nine-member board to a twelve-member board to assure adequate representation from throughout the State.

The Texas Peanut Producers Board was the first commodity board established under the Texas Commodity Referendum Law in 1969. The Texas peanut growers voted to voluntarily assess themselves \$1.00 per ton of harvested peanuts each year to fund programs of promotion, research, education and market development. The measure passed by a two-thirds favorable vote. In 1990, they again voted by more than a two-thirds margin to increase the check-off from \$1.00 to \$2.00 per ton.

These check-off funds are paying big dividends to peanut producers through improved methods of peanut production and improved peanut varieties. The funds have enabled the release of nematode resistant varieties as well as other disease tolerant varieties. This year we will see the release of varieties that will enhance the shelf life of peanut products, which is very important to our domestic buyers and export markets.

Enthusiasm and better acceptance of Texas peanut products have been the result of promotion efforts carried out through harvest tours, media publicity, brochures, videos and various other public relations programs.

We distribute more than 25,000 recipe brochures annually.

Peanuts are a major part of Texas agriculture. The Texas economy benefits by up to \$1 billion annually from the peanut industry.

The Evant Elks spoiled the homecoming for the exes on Friday night when they edged the Panthers 15-8 in the homecoming tilt. It was a hard fought battle but the Elks scored early in the first period and again early in the third quarter for the victory.

After getting a fumble recovery on the Elk 37 by Joe Landa and moving deep into Elk territory the Panthers were held on fourth down at the Elk 15.

The Elks started a drive and went 85 yards in 11 plays with Chris Doyle getting the score from 10 yards out with 2:22 left in the first period. The drive featured all running plays as the Big Red defense just couldn't hold the Elk running back Doyle on defense. Kyle Simpson booted the point after and the Elks were up 7-0.

The Panthers and Elks couldn't move on their next possessions, but the Panthers got the ball on their own 25 and started another drive, going 73 yards, but fumbled the ball away deep in Elk territory at the 21.

Gorman got a 2 point safety on the next possession by the Elks when the Big Red defense forced a punt on the Elk 10. The snap to the Elk punter was high and the punter was tackled in the end zone for a safety with 1:36 left in the half.

After exchanging possessions the teams ended the first half with the Elks leading 7-2.

After the intermission at half-time the Panthers took the ball on their own 40 and scored in just 4 plays with Rollo Torres breaking free up the middle for a beautiful 50 yard scamper to thrill the fans and scored with 9:57 left in the third. A pass for 2 points failed and the Panthers were up 8-7.

But again the Big Red defense just couldn't hold the Elks runners and the Elks get the ball on their own 40 and scored in 11 plays with Chris Doyle again breaking loose for 22 yards for the score with 4:06 left in the third. Doyle added the 2 pointer on a run to boost the Elks to a 15-8 margin.

The Panthers came right back getting the ball on their own 35 and moved to the Elk 7 yard line on a beautiful 45 yard pass play. But on the next play the Panthers fumbled again on a toss play to their right and the Elks got the ball on the

Gorman 18.

The Panthers just couldn't get a complete drive together on their 2 possession and the Elks got the ball on their own 28 and ran out the clock for the victory. This put the Panthers at 4-1 on the season.

Torres again led the Panthers with 80 yards on 17 carries. Sawyer Wright carried 11 times for 44. Josh Carruth had 37 on 5 quarterback keepers and Roberto Rodriguez had 12 yards on 5 tries.

Gorman will open District play on Friday night when they host the Rising Star Wildcats. The Big Red defense will be tested strongly again as the Wildcats have on the best runners in the District. So come on out and back the Panthers back to victory.

Gorman High School Students Go to Brazil

The freshmen and sophomore classes of Gorman High School were allowed the chance of a lifetime Thursday as they were invited along with three other schools to participate in a virtual fieldtrip to Brazil. The Gorman students were able to actually communicate with and observe the students from Embraer HS in Brazil, Eastland HS, Ira HS, and Sidney HS.

The Embraer Company in Brazil, Region 14 Educational Center, Kansas University, and Sidney High School arranged the field trip. A video connection was set up between the school in Brazil, Kansas University, Region 14, Gorman, Eastland, Ira and Sidney so that the students could not only hear and speak to each other, but could see each other as well. Each high school was given about five minutes to make a presentation about their community and their school. They were then allowed some question and answer time between the students at their school and the students at Embraer HS in Brazil. This dialogue provided an opportunity for the students to actually talk to someone about their lives and culture rather than just read about it in a textbook.

Embraer High School in Brazil is a private school funded by the Embraer Company. The students actually attend classes on the Embraer Company grounds. The company funded the expense for the phone connection. The Embraer HS students that were involved in the field trip were taking English and were actually practicing their language skills as they participated in the event.
