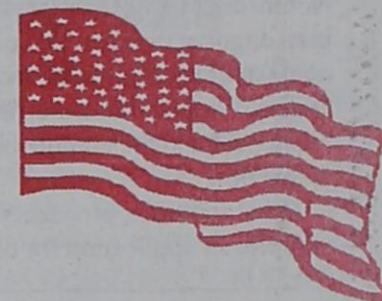

## Mike Siebert Seeks Re-Election As Eastland County District Attorney

Mike Siebert, who is presently serving as Criminal District Attorney for Eastland County, has authorized the following statement regarding his re-election campaign. Mike is an experienced attorney with years of courtroom experience in trying both criminal and civil cases. He plans to run a positive campaign based on his own merits, abilities, and qualifications rather than focusing on the real or imagined faults of others. Candidates that resort to "name-calling" or "finger-pointing" generally lack either the necessary qualifications for the position or a true knowledge of the real issues in order to mount a positive campaign.

### Eastland County Product

Mike was born, raised, and educated in the public schools and the first two years of college in Eastland County. After graduating from Tarleton State University, Mike attended St. Mary's University School of Law in San Antonio, Texas, where he received his law degree and admission to the State Bar of Texas. Mike was administered the oath of office as a licensed attorney in the 91st District Court room by the late Justice Cecil Collings of the 11th Court of Appeals in the presence of family, friends, judges, attorneys and well wishers. Mike and his late wife, Becky, began their respective careers. Mike joined a local leading law firm, and Becky began teaching in the Eastland Independent School District. They were blessed

with two beautiful daughters, Becca and Katy, and resided in a log home in the Flatwood community south of Eastland where Mike continues to live and raise a few head of cattle and some "cotton mules." For many years Mike and Becky were a familiar sight in local and area parades around Central West Texas driving mules hitched to a covered wagon.

### Experience Counts

Mike brings this solid Eastland County background with him as our Criminal District Attorney along with his experience as a Region IV school board member, city commissioner, appraisal board member, and city attorney. At the time of his election as our Criminal District Attorney, he was a partner in the Hoffmann and Siebert law firm. The Criminal District Attorney is a state official and represents the state in all matters pending in the courts starting with the Justice Courts, the County Court, the 91st District Court, and if a matter is appealed, the 11th Court of Appeals. It is an extremely busy office, and Mike Siebert has attended to these duties in a professional yet "down-to-earth" manner. He gives his staff much of the credit for running a smooth office. "We feel as though we're very fortunate to have these men of God with us and pray that the Lord will again use them as He did last year," Jones added.

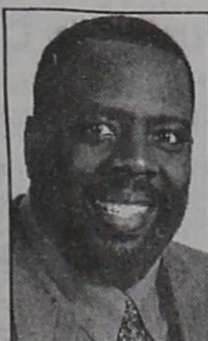
Services begin on Sunday morning and will continue through Friday.

## Southwestern Peanut Growers to Nominate Committee Member

Peanut Growers of the Southwest—primarily Oklahoma, Texas, New Mexico, Arizona, Arkansas, California, and Louisiana—will meet at the Oklahoma State University Extension Service Building, 930 North Portland Avenue (at intersection of Northwest 10th & Portland), Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, on Saturday, March 9, 2002, to elect a grower member and alternate to the Peanut Administrative Committee.

The meeting is scheduled for 10:00 a.m. (CST) in conjunction with a meeting of the Annual Meeting of Oklahoma Peanut Growers' Association. The nominations portion of the meeting will occur early in the meeting.

Lane Campbell, Compliance Officer, Peanut Administrative Committee, will conduct the nominations.

Robert R. Tabb, Manager, of the Peanut Administrative Committee explains that the Committee administers the Peanut Marketing Agreement. The Committee is made up of growers, shellers, and the Area Association Managers, and recommends peanut marketing regulations to be issued by the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture under the Agreement. These regulations apply generally to the entire industry.

The grower member position to be filled is currently held by Billy F. Coe of Hydro, Oklahoma. The Alternate position is occupied by Donnie Soddors of Hydro, Oklahoma. Both terms expire on April 30, 2002. Both men are eligible for renomination.

A special program of interest to the peanut industry will be held in conjunction with the meeting, says Jack Coppedge, President of Oklahoma Peanut Growers Association. He invites and urges peanut growers from all Southwestern Area states to attend and participate in the nomination.

The Committee prohibits discrimination and unlawful restrictions in the committee nomination process based on race, religion, gender, national origin, age, or disability.

## James B. Hicks Requests Vote for Criminal District Attorney of Eastland County

I am pleased to be a candidate on the Democratic Ballot for the office of Eastland County Criminal District Attorney. Prior to my move to Cisco, for 15 years, I maintained a prosperous law office largely based on criminal defense work. In the past several years, I have served as the Chief Prosecutor for the 42nd District Court. I am employed by James "Butch" Eidson, the Criminal District Attorney for Taylor County, Texas. While working in Judge John Weeks court, I have successfully prosecuted hundreds of cases. My trial experience includes drug convictions where juries have sent the offenders to prison where I believe they belong. I have tried murder cases, sexual assault cases, burglaries and robbery cases. My philosophy in prosecution is that the guilty should be punished, both fairly and timely.

My wife, Kathy, and I moved our family to Cisco approximately three years ago to leave the large metropolitan problems of Houston behind us. Since my family has had a farm in Eastland County for all of my life, it really feels as though we returned home. With children in the Cisco I.S.D. and Tarleton State University, we share similar concerns with each of you about drug dealers, sexual predators, and the temptations facing our children on a daily basis. Those concerns are magnified when I hear or see know drug offenders walking our streets without fear of prosecution. I want that to change. The most

common question asked during my campaign is "Why are they just released and nothing happens to them?" I want that to change. Many report that drugs are freely available in our neighborhoods. This also needs to change. I vow that a vote for James B. Hicks on March 12 in the Democratic Primary will begin that change.

I am constantly asked why run for office in Eastland County? The answer is simple. I was requested to do so by law enforcement officers. They are the backbone of our war on crime. When making a decision on whom to vote for in this race, ask someone you know in law enforcement for their past experiences and opinions. Statistics show that the current administration is one of the least productive in the state. In 2001 Eastland County filed approximately 112 felony cases and only disposed of 18 of those cases. In 2000, Eastland County reported 121 new felony cases and disposed of only 25. In comparison, Callahan County reported filing 101 new cases in 2000 with final disposition of 96. Coleman County filed 164 felony cases in 2000 and disposed of 157 cases. Comanche County reported filing 103 new felony cases in 2000 and disposed of 141 cases. 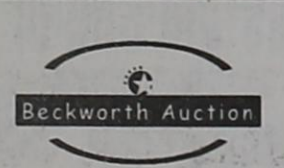
