



The Gorman Panthers will end the 2001 season at home this Friday against the Wildcats from Rising Star. Gorman (1-7, 1-3 Dist) is coming off a 27-8 loss to Santa Anna while Rising Star (4-5, 2-2 Dist) is coming off a 34-14 loss at the hands of Baird.

the majority of Rising Star's mul- and Santa Anna led 13-0. tiple offense. "Clay is a good athto go the distance every play. Young is an exceptional athlete especially for a freshman. Those guys play at QB, RB and receiver and are good at everyone of them." Rising Star offensive line averages over 215 lbs and opens up holes for Clay and Young. Defensively the Wildcats bend but seldom break out of their split defense. "#23 Hayley does a good job of plugging holes at linebacker #55 and #74 do as good a job in the middle as anyone we've faced. #51 and #20 are solid defense ends as well." Rising Star and Gorman are both out of the playoff hunt but both have a lot to play for Friday.

We can win and finish third in the district with a 2-3 record. That would be one more district win than we had last year. A win would give us a boost going into basketball and off-season. But just as important, I would like to see us play at a higher level than we did last week and show up at the start of the game unlike the Santa Anna game. "Rising Star can finish outright 3rd with a win and finish 5-5 overall which would be their first non-losing season in many years." They are much better than they have been in the

The Gorman Panthers traveled to Santa Anna on Friday night to take on the Mountaineers and came away on the short end of a 27-8 score. The Panthers fumbled on their first possession on their own 35 and Santa Anna moved in for a score and built at 13-0 lead in the first period and then added 14 more in the second for a 27-0 halftime score. The Big Red came back in the third period for 8 points but couldn't manage another score.

Gorman took the kickoff and returned it to their own 35. However on the first play the Big Red fumbled the ball and the Mounties recovered at the Gorman 35. They scored in 5 plays with Michael Guthrie running in from 15 yards out with 9:43 left on the clock. Jacob Pritchard added the point after and Santa Anna was up 7-0.

### Services Held for **Montie Johnson**



### Successful Migrant Education **Programs Honored**

Maxfield Elementary, Gorman High School and Gorman ISD have been recognized by the Texas Education Agency (TEA) for successfully educating their migrant students.

TEA's Division of Migrant Education has selected Maxfield Elementary as winners of the 2001 -2002 Excelling Campus Award, the Gorman High School as winners of the 2001-2002 Promising Campus Award and the Gorman ISD as winners of the District Award given to school campuses and school districts that achieved academic success with their migrant students Statewide, 121 school districts and 583 campuses are receiving this recognition.

The purpose of the award is to recognize school districts and campuses that strive to meet the unique needs of migrant children and their families and that help migrant students to meet high academic standards. There are approximately 126,000 migrant children in Texas.

Recipients of the Exceptional Campus Award will be presented with a plaque at the 2001 Texas Migrant Education Conference during a special luncheon in their honor. Recipients in all other categories will be recognized it the awards luncheon program. The 2001 Texas Migrant Education Conference will take place at the Westin Galleria Hotel in Houston, Texas on November 7-9, 2001.

In order to receive the district award, school districts had to attain a migrant student passing rate of at least 80 percent in each subject area (Reading, Writing, and Mathematics) in Spring 2001 Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS), and have a migrant student dropout rate of 5.5 % or less. The 121 district winners were divided into four categories based on number of migrant students enrolled.





Water is one of this state's most precious resources. Without it, agriculture would dry up and blow away, along with our towns, infrastructure and people. That's why I take the ongoing violation of the 1944 U.S.-Mexico Water Treaty very seriously.

The treaty was supposed to guarantee that Texas gets a predictable water supply from the Rio Grande, but Mexico has been falling behind on payments. It now owes the United States 1.35 million acre feet of water.

To curb its debt, Mexico agreed to a partial payment of 600,000 acre feet of water earlier this year. A deadline for the remainder was set for Sept. 30, which gave me high hope that the debt would be repaid.

Unfortunately, Mexico did not meet that deadline and has only paid approximately half of what was agreed to. While negotiations for a payment system are ongoing, it's unfortunate our South Texas crops will continue to suffer without a steady supply of water from the Rio Grande.

What makes this situation particularly difficult is that data show that Mexico is using water from reservoirs that store Rio Grande/Rio Bravo treaty water for its own purposes - irrigation in Mexico. All the while, our agricultural producers in the Rio Grande Valley are not receiving the water they should, and it is becoming increasingly difficult for their operations to survive.

The United States must urge Mexico to repay its water debt - water that is rightfully ours under the treaty especially considering that it is fully able to do so.

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



### WASHINGTON WANTS **Desert Repository For Nuclear Waste?**



(NAPSI)-Experts throughout the world agree that the most feasible and safe method for disposing of highly radioactive materials is to store them deep underground. Based on this consensus, Congress passed the Nuclear Waste Policy Act of 1982, which directs the Department of Energy (DOE) to find a site and characterize it.

The site currently under consideration is Yucca Mountain in Nevada. Many scientists think that the area has features that may make it suitable as a depository for nuclear waste-spent fuel from power generation programs -which will remain highly radioactive for thousands of years.

By "suitable," scientists mean the rock will keep the waste sufficiently isolated. Physical characteristics that make Yucca Mountain a suitable site for waste disposal include:

Dry climate (less than six inches of rainfall a year); and

Extremely deep water table (800 to 1,000 feet below the level

of the potential repository).

In May 2001, the DOE released a report summarizing 20 years of scientific and technical study of the remote desert site, thus beginning the formal process that will culminate in a Congressional bill and Presidential decision.

The new repository would go a long way toward facilitating the construction of more nuclear plants throughout the country. In addition, according to experts at Westinghouse, the pioneering nuclear power company, new technology is helping make existing plants even safer and more economical-and new plants even better.

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




