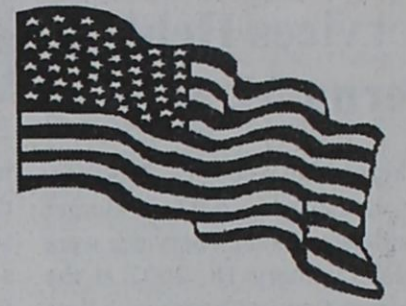

Lana Howard Qualifies for the All-State Treble Choir

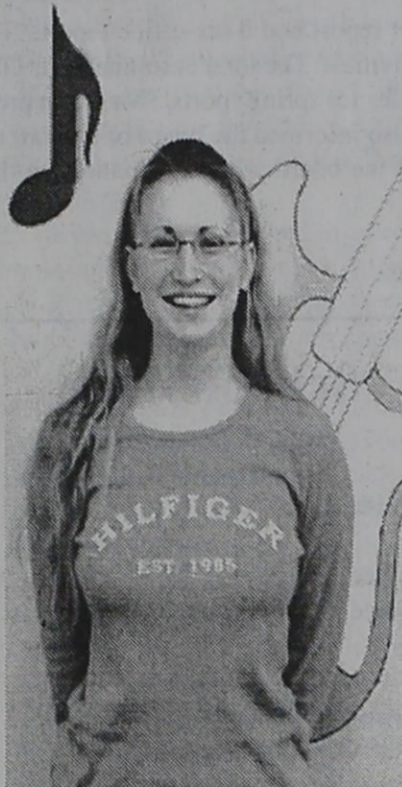

FSA Accepts Late-Filed Notices of Loss

The Eastland County Farm Service Agency (FSA) has been authorized to accept late-filed notices of loss for forage losses that occurred in 2001 to native and improved pastures. Regulations previously limited the filing of a notice of loss to 15 days after the evidence of a loss was apparent. For the 2001 crop year, this was generally around October 1, 2001 for losses that related to drought. Notices of loss are used by FSA in computing compensation due to those participating in the Non-Insured Assistance Program (NAP). The final date for producers to pay their \$100 per crop administrative fee for participation in the 2001 NAP has not been announced but is expected soon.

David Martin, County Executive Director for FSA, said "This authorization is good news for those who have not filed a notice of loss since one can now be filed." A fee is not charged for the late-filed notice of loss, but producers that did not timely file a report of acreage will be charged a late-filed acreage reporting fee.

Martin concluded, "We are encouraging all producers who have not filed a notice of loss on their grazed native and improved pasture for the 2001 crop year to file early while this opportunity is available. There is no announced final date to file a late filed notice of loss but we expect this authorization to be withdrawn at any time." In order for a late-filed notice of loss to be accepted, a Loss Adjuster that is contracted by FSA, must visit the acreage and determine the cause of loss was due solely to drought as opposed to any other factors such as over grazing.

I apologize for being out of touch lately on the A.D. article. Things have been pretty busy on the athletic front. Basketball is winding down with only 2 JH games left and HS is beginning its second trip through the district schedule. Of course that means that softball, baseball, track, tennis, and golf are just around the corner. Also, don't forget that we have powerlifting in full gear right now as well.

The JH basketball teams have games left against Bluffdale (there Jan 28th) and May (here Feb 4th). The HS teams have Baird (T Jan 22nd), Ranger (H Jan 25th), Cross Plains (T Jan 29th), Lingleville (H Feb 1st), and May (H Feb 5th).

Our powerlifting teams have competed well in their two meets at Troy and DeLeon. The boys and girl have 3 meets left with the next one coming on Feb. 2nd in Cisco. The other meets are Eastland (Feb 16th) and Bartlett (Feb 23rd).

Baseball, softball, and track will begin practice when basketball season has come to a close. Schedules for those sports will be released to the newspaper in the near future.

We will be hosting a JH track meet here on March 1st and it will be sponsored by the Lion's Club. If you are interested in helping, please contact Coach Wilson at the school.

We will also be hosting a softball and baseball tournament on the 22nd and 23rd of Feb. The athletic booster club will be sponsoring the tournaments and need your help in putting them on for our kids. Please contact Kathy Marlow if you would like to help support our athletic programs.

On Feb 4th the UIL will release the realignment for all schools as far as their classification as well as release the district alignment in football and basketball. Other sports will soon follow. There are many rumors flying around the coaching circles that have the class A to AA cutoff as high as 200 enrollment. Remember enrollment is based on grades 9-12. Our 9-12 enrollment that we turned in on Oct. 26th was 116. Other rumors have the cutoff number around 180-185. The current cutoff is 170. If you are unclear what all this means to us, let me explain. If the number for Class A to AA cutoff became 185 then all schools that have an enrollment under 185 would become class A schools unless they are designated as six-man. That would drop schools such as Albany, Goldthwaite, Hamlin, etc. from AA to A. No matter what the rumors are, nobody really knows what it will be until it is released at 8:00 am on Feb 4th. At that time there will be many districts effected and many football schedules adjusted. Coaches will spend the next several days trying to fill their schedules. Those that are slow to react on the first day or have a severe change in districts are often left scrapping for games. Rumors range from Gorman staying in its current district, to moving east, to moving more north, and even combining south and north with some of our current. It is fun to sit and imagine things, but nothing will be certain until Feb 4th. Until then however, there will continue to be more and more rumors, so don't believe what you here until after the 4th.

The athletic department will be releasing information on summer sport camps. Please look for this information in upcoming weeks. We will be hosting 2 football camps, 2 basketball camps, 2 volleyball camps, and 2 softball camps. These camps will be divided into age groups. UIL limits us to work with youth up to entering 9th grade. Therefore a camp hosted by a school employee cannot have entering 10th, 11th, or 12 graders in it. However we will have a volleyball camp hosted by my wife that will be for those of high school ages. We will release the information on ages, dates, prices, etc as soon as we have it all finalized. So hold off on your summer plans for a few weeks until we get this out to you. I hope we have a lot of interest in these camps.

From the Gorman City Commission

The City Commission would like to remind the residents of Gorman to please try to be courteous towards others, your neighbors, when owning a dog(s), cat(s), chickens, or roosters, goats, etc. Please be reminded that not everyone enjoys pets or livestock as yourself. Excessive noise, odor, dogs tearing up trash or yards, etc. We are publishing a few sections of the ordinance we presently now have. Thank you and please try to abide.

Section 3.05 Animals at Large

It shall be unlawful for any person owning or harboring an animal to permit such an animal to run at large. The Animal Control Officer, or anyone under the direction of the Animal Control Officer, is authorized to take up any animal mentioned in this ordinance that may be found at large in the corporate limits of the City, subject to the applicable provisions of the law. The Animal Control Officer, anyone under his direction or a Peace Officer are authorized to impound any animal mentioned in this title which is in violation of this ordinance. In the event that the animal is on private property or the property of the animal's owner the Animal Control Officer, or anyone under the direction of the Animal Control Officer, or Peace Officer may enter upon the property, other than private dwelling for the purpose of impoundment or issuance of a citation, or both, subject to the applicable provisions of this title and law.

Section 3.08. Estray and other Livestock

It shall be unlawful for the owner of any horse, mule, jack, jennet, cattle, hog, chicken or other fowl, goat or sheep (estrays) to permit any such animal to run at large on land that is not his own or under his control, or on any street, alley, or other public place in the City.

It shall be unlawful for any person to keep or harbor any combination of two or more of any of the following animals, horses, mules, jacks, jennets, or any species of cattle. It shall be unlawful for any person to keep or harbor any combination of six or more of any goats or sheep. It shall be unlawful to keep or harbor any member of the swine family within the corporate City limits except as a temporary project of an approved 4H or FFA project.

Section 4.14 Excessive Noise

Any person who shall harbor or keep on his premises, or in or about any premises under his control, any animal or poultry which by loud, continual or unusual noise of any kind shall cause the peace and quiet of the neighborhood or the occupant of adjacent premises to be disturbed, shall be guilty of a Class "C" Misdemeanor, and a separate offense shall be deemed committed each day during or on which such violation occurs or continues; provided that where only one rooster is kept in compliance with this ordinance, the crowing of such rooster shall not be a violation of this section.

each deemed it necessary in order to preserve their lives.

Isaac was not in Gerar against his will. Furthermore, God had instructed him to stay there rather than go down to Egypt. But, he still feared for his life. We know in retrospect that there was no cause for him to fear. God was his protector.

In **Genesis 15:1**, the Lord spoke to Abraham and promised to keep him. The following is a direct quote of what he said. *After these things the word of the LORD came unto Abram in a vision, saying, Fear not, Abram: I am thy shield, and thy exceeding great reward.* Five chapters later, Abraham tells Abimelech that Sarah is his sister, because he was afraid.

And the LORD appeared unto him, and said, Go not down into Egypt. Dwell in the land, which I shall tell thee of. Sojourn in this land, and I will be with thee, and will bless thee. For unto thee, and unto

thy seed, I will give all these countries, and I will perform the oath which I swear unto Abraham thy father. Genesis 26:2-3. This is what the Lord spoke to Isaac prior to his trip into Gerar. Yet, Isaac feared for his life.

We can plainly see neither Abraham nor Isaac had cause to fear for their lives. God clearly told Abraham that he would be his shield, that he shouldn't fear. He told Isaac that he was not traveling into Gerar alone, but that he, God, would be with him. What more could they have asked for?

From time to time, every person faces a situation that appears to threaten his or her existence. They proceed to examine it from every angle and conclude that there is no way out for them. Then, fear grasps their soul. Fear motivates them to make decisions that further complicate their dilemma. In fact, sometimes a dilemma is only imagined,

until a bad decision creates it. The decision Abraham and Isaac made to lie about the true relationship with regard to Sarah and Rebekah caused Abimelech to become angry with them.

Eventually, Isaac's relationship with Abimelech was subverted. Isaac had to leave Gerar. The men of Gerar trashed his wells that Abraham had dug. Isaac and his servants dug the wells again, but fought with the herdsmen of Gerar over the water. This struggle did not cease until Isaac moved further away from Gerar.

Have you ever made a bad decision? Are you still hurting because of it? Jesus can help you, just ask Him.

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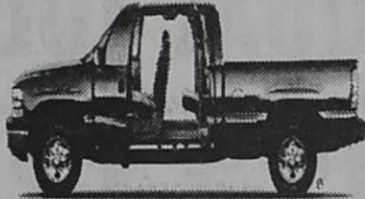

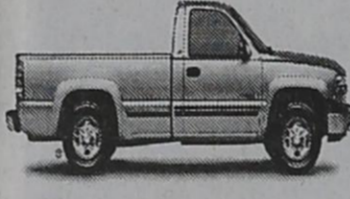
