

Jana Miears and Christopher Hughes To Pledge Vows





When I signed on to run for County Commissioner of Precinct 3, I published an article telling some of the things I want to do for our county and this precinct in particular. That is to set up a continuous paving program, build an Ethanol Plant in Precinct 3. And better finance management.

Note that Precinct 3 has given up more dollars (53.40%) of the total decrease in road and bridge funding than all the other Precincts added together. There should have been one heck of a battle before giving up that much of Precinct 3 funds. Funding cuts should be in all departments on a fair and equitable basis. There are 694 miles of county road. The road and bridge fund should be divided equally according to the miles of road maintained. The \$.54203 tax rate that is now being assessed by the county is in two parts. One rate for R&B fund and one for the general operating fund. The road and bridge tax money should be used on the roads and bridges and not put in the general fund. This is, in part, what I am referring to by MANAGEMENT. If elected I will work to reverse this trend and get a fair and equitable share of the road and bridge funding. It seems to be that precinct 3 has always been on the short end of the stick and with this kind of management the stick is getting shorter.

In this years budget there was a projected tax income increase of \$266,795.00 over last year. With this and the above cuts in the Road and Bridge fund of \$103,000.00 for a total of 369,000.00 put in the general fund, then why does the county still have a \$30,000.00 deficit? What is happening with this money? It is our tax money and we should be informed as to what is happened to it. If I have the opportunity I will find out what is happening to our dollars.

I still believe that we can have a continuous paving program where so many miles of road is paved each year and increasing miles paved each year. IT CAN BE accomplished by getting our share of road and bridge funds as stated above and NOT USE RESERVE FUNDS AND NOT RAISING TAXES but by simple planning, management, discipline and tenacity. PLANNING-choose a road that is mot heavily used and serves the most people and pave that road to an end. MANAGEMENT-get our share of funds and after the budget is complete, set aside funds for a years paving. DISCIPLINE—use that set aside funds for paving alone and nothing else. TENACITY—means to stay the course. Do not make a plan and not use it. Tenacity year after year.

To those of you that did not read an earlier article I said that with Birdsong closing a plant and possibly closing more and with the peanut program in the tube I suggested that we try to build an Ethanol plant and/ or other type of plant or plants in Precinct 3. The reason for Ethanol is that it can be made out of many different things such as corn, sugar cane, sweet sorghum, potatoes and I suppose even melons. Contract with the local farmers to grow one or two of the above, mainly sweet sorghum cane, not the grain, for feed stock. It will take thousands of tons. My opponent said in his last article that we would have to bring in grain and transportation cost would make it too costly so "we cannot attract an ethanol plant." This decision was made without doing any research. (This is the kind of management and decision making we now have running our county government.) I am proposing to build our own with grant




Obituary





Another Pays For His "Poison" With 20-Year Prison Sentence

Benjamin Scott Nicks, 28, of Eastland County, now joins other inmates awaiting transfer to state prison. In August of 2003, Nicks was placed on community supervision when he admitted that he possessed anhydrous ammonia with the intent to unlawfully manufacture methamphetamine. Approximately 4 months later, on Christmas Eve, Nicks was arrested on charges that he had violated numerous terms and conditions of his community supervision. The Court denied bond pending trial.

On February 13 Nicks appeared at trial with his attorney and admitted that all the charges were true - including that in December he was arrested for evading arrest or detention, he used both amphetamine and methamphetamine, he failed to avoid injurious or vicious habits, and he failed to avoid persons of disreputable or harmful character including known felons since being placed on community supervision in August. After receiving evidence in this phase of the trial, the Court requested the Community Supervision Office to prepare a pre-sentence investigation report to be utilized by the Court with other evidence to determine what punishment to assess. Nicks was returned to jail.

On February 20 the trial resumed and Nicks took the stand. He admitted among other things that he and other individuals he called by name had on numerous occasions manufactured methamphetamine in this County. In addition, although Nicks had previously received the children are overweight, and onebenefit of approximately two years of drug treatment, he admitted that eighth are obese. Because of these he continued to manufacture and use illegal drugs, mainly meth. Nicks testified he was afraid of going to prison and requested to remain free. That request was denied. Presiding Judge Steven R. Herod sentenced Nicks to 20 years confinement in the Institutional Division of the Texas dren. Department of Criminal Justice.

During the sentencing phase of the trial, Judge Herod was very complimentary of the Community Supervision Officer for the detailed presentence investigation report. In addition, Judge Herod referred to methamphetamine as "poison" and the manufacture of methamphetamine as "making poison." District Attorney Russ Thomason expressed gratitude for the joint efforts of the Community Supervision Office, the Eastland Police Department, and the Eastland County Sheriff's Office for their roles in bringing yet another poison maker to justice.

Felony Conviction For Hitting A Peace Officer

Last week an Eastland County jury in the 91st District Court of Eastland convicted STEPHEN PAUL PATEL of the felony offense of Assault on a Public Servant.

The offense occurred on the 7th day of March, 2002, when Patel was being arrested by a Gorman Police Officer. During the arrest, Patel resisted arrest and struck the officer in the head.

After the jury returned the guilty verdict, Presiding Judge Jerry Ray, sitting by assignment, set punishment at four years confinement in the Institutional Division of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice, suspended and probated for a period of four years and a fine of \$2,000.00. Among the many terms and conditions that Patel must adhere to while on probation, is a curfew from 8 p.m. each evening until 7 a.m. the following morning and confinement for ten days in the Eastland County


