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Drafting Of 18-19 Group May Come Before Congress



L'Stock Sale Volume Is \$22,000

Bidding and offerings both remained steady at the weekly sale of the Big Spring Livestock Commission company Wednesday as 800 head changed hands for \$22,000.

The figure was only slightly under the 800 head for \$24,000 a week ago despite the arrival of soaking rains which heretofore have always put a temporary damper on the volume of cattle trade.

Stockers showed most strength, as they have since showers first relieved ranchers some two or three weeks ago. Bids on these bobbed between 12.00 and 14.00. Bulls were steady to slightly stronger with tops of 9.50.

Canners and cutters were weaker on the bottom by half a cent, moving out at 4.50 to 7.50, and fat cows were steady.

Good fat butchers lost some of their demand edge and dropped a cent on the top in being knocked down at 10.00 to 11.00. Ordinary butchers were alternately weaker and stronger, showing no great fluctuation in being at 8.50 to 9.50. A few head of sheep passed through the ring for around \$8 a head.

Legislation Likely, Says Rules Leader

WASHINGTON, Aug. 27 (AP)—New draft legislation to make 18 and 19 year old youths eligible for armed service topped a program mapped out today for the waning months of the 77th congress by Chairman Sabath (D-Ill) of the house rules committee.

"In all likelihood," Sabath said in an interview, "congress will be asked this session to permit the drafting of 18 and 19 year olds and will give its approval."

In his opinion, he added, the 18-19 group contains "the finest fighting material available."

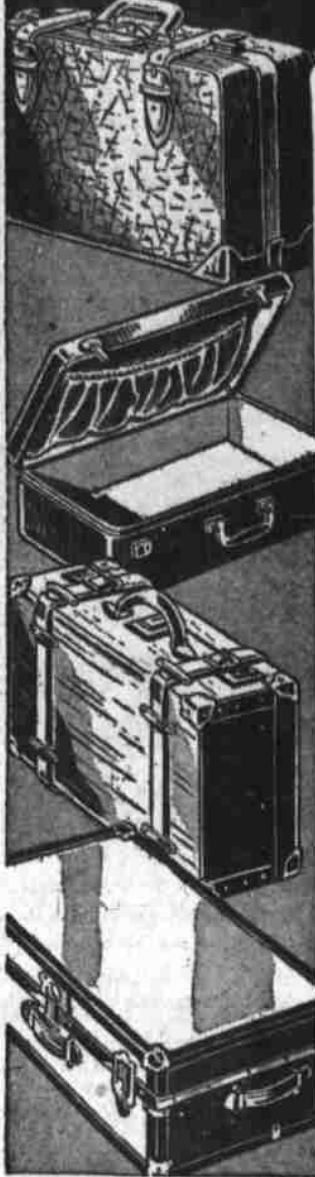
Barring any congressional repercussions from President Roosevelt's Labor Day cost of living message, the only other subjects that will be considered at the session, if Sabath has his way, are taxes, senate changes in the service men's vote-by-mail bill, a new appropriation for defense housing, and a few relatively minor bills.

"There is no reason why, between the time we go back into regular session early next month and the middle of October, we cannot dispose of everything that is urgent and either adjourn or recess until the next congress convenes," Sabath said.

That program, he acknowledged, precluded consideration of pending labor and farm legislation, among other things.

Back To Log Cabin Days— Wartime Wheat In Non-Priority Bins

DODGE CITY, Kas.—Wooden bins are rising over the big southwestern plains area almost as if by magic to safeguard one of the country's precious war assets—a huge wheat supply capable of feeding millions.

When farmers of Kansas and other southwestern wheat states out a bumper wheat crop this year elevators and bins already were full of grain—the result of previous big crops and virtually no exports.

So they were forced to dump their new wheat on the ground or put it in other improvised

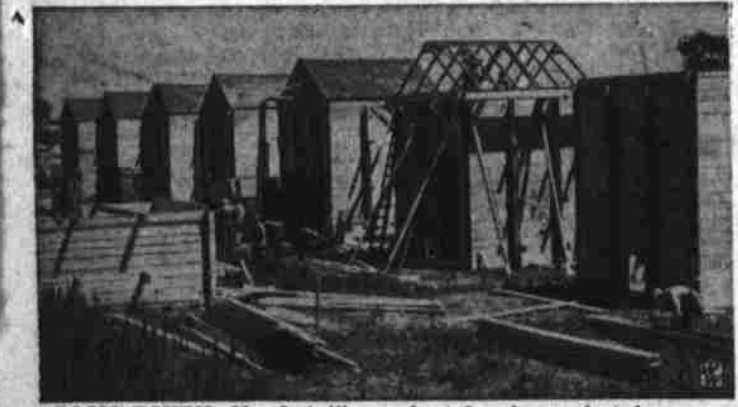
storage, which isn't any too good for the grain.

Back To The Log Cabin

But out in Berkeley, Calif., B. H. Critchfield had an idea the Commodity Credit Corporation liked so well that today five big western lumber mills are working on it exclusively.

Critchfield's idea was for pre-fabricated storage bins built on the old log cabin idea of lock joint construction, requiring few nails, little metal, not much time and having the added advantage of 80 per cent salvage when the storage problem is over.

And today, the Commodity Credit Corporation is erecting

hundreds of these wooden bins and moving wheat into them as rapidly as they are completed. The wheat being put in the bins is Commodity Credit Corporation wheat taken over from farmers under the A.A. loan program and occupying badly needed elevator space.

3000-Bushel Capacity

Each bin has a 3,000-bushel capacity and is approximately two stories high. Inside it is 14 feet, 9 inches square and 16 feet from top to bottom. It requires only 29 pounds of nails, two hinges and two hasps.

At present the bins all are han-

dled through the Credit Corporation and are not available to farmers individually.

They are to be built in Texas, Kansas, Colorado, North and South Dakota, Oregon, Washington and Nebraska. They are being put up in 80 towns in Kansas alone, 84 of them being put up in Dodge City.

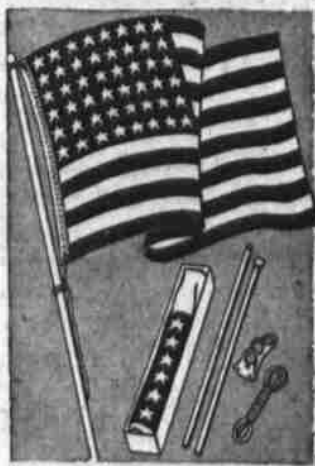
The western lumber companies at work on Critchfield's idea now are turning out 125 to 150 bins daily and the goal is 200.

In them, perhaps, will be stored the bread and the cake, for a hungry, post-war world.

Suggested Recipes Use Cheese As Current Victory Food Special

Another Victory Food Special, advocated by the government is Cheese Week in effect this week throughout the country. Listed below are some suggested recipes for using cheese as a sauce, with macaroni and as a loaf.

Macaroni and Cheese
(Serves 6)
1-2 lb. uncooked macaroni
4 tablespoons fat
4 tablespoons flour
1-2 teaspoon salt
2 cups milk (or 1 cup evaporated milk and 1 cup water)
1 1/2 cup cheese, grated or chopped fine
1-2 cup dry bread crumbs or cracker crumbs
2 tablespoons butter or oleomargarine
Break macaroni into one-inch pieces. Cook in large amount of rapidly boiling water until tender. Drain and separate macaroni in cold water to remove excess particles of starch. Mix spaghetti, rolled oats (or bread crumbs), milk, and beaten eggs. Pour into greased baking dish or pan and bake in a moderate oven (not over 350 degrees F.) for about 40 minutes.

Saved From Jap Torture By Prayer, Says Missionary On Return To U. S.

(AP)—Unharmed and "saved from torture through the power of prayer alone, while she was interned by the Japanese army in China, Mrs. W. Eugene Salles, of Waco, Tex., widely known Southern Baptist missionary, returned aboard the exchange ship, Gripsholm.

She was accompanied by her cousin, Miss Josephine Ward, of Austin, Tex.

They were interned together in their mission compound in Kailfeng, Honan province, China, on the morning that war began between the United States and Japan.

"We heard news reports of increasing tension," Mrs. Salles said, "but I would hardly say that we had any warning of what was coming. That morning, we went to our classes as usual." They were teaching in a boys' high school, located in the same compound, a mile outside of Kailfeng.

"Suddenly the Chinese gatekeeper walked in. Class was in session, but he was so agitated that I could see he had some good reason. He said Japanese soldiers had surrounded the compound and were coming to get Miss Ward and me, immediately."

The gatekeeper added, she said, that the Japanese "had very bad manners."

War came in that fashion to the two women. They were alone in Kailfeng. Mrs. Salles, who had been in mission work in China for 37 years, said in that time there had been many alarms, many emergencies.

"I trusted in the Lord, always, and now I needed Him more than ever," she said.

"Actually, we were never harmed, but I know that we were saved from torture through the power of prayer, alone. You could feel the Chinese praying for us. It was strong in the air. We never worried. We knew we would be protected."

Mrs. Salles and Miss Ward were given only a few minutes to pack some clothing, then brought by ricksha into the city.

In Kailfeng, they were placed in a small house, a mission building known in Chinese as "the drum tower." There, they found four Catholics, two American missionaries, Mrs. Salles and Miss Ward were lodged in a tiny room with the other two women.

The Japanese came at night and in the early morning, always at unexpected times, to take roll call. The internees were called into the garden, shivering, often in scanty night clothing alone, for inspection. Japanese soldiers, armed with flashlights peered into the faces of each one.

"From time to time, we heard that other mission workers in China were being tortured. We never knew. Still, it was impossible to be afraid."

Christmas day came. They gave each other calendars for presents. Nothing in the house was more useful, Mrs. Salles said, smiling. She herself had brought some new handkerchiefs from her home. That made another set of presents. A cake of soap was her only other gift to those with her.

That night, they sang Christmas carols.

The next day, they were all released, and sent back to their homes. Until late June, when the international exchange began, they stayed there, prevented from working, but without interference, otherwise.

War Workers, School Children Need Energy Building Lunches

Many war workers as well as school children have to look to boxed lunches for a man-size allotment of vitamins, minerals and other strength-building nutrients.

Since sandwiches are the mainstay of most boxed meals, you can avoid monotony by varying the kinds daily. Variety also assures a wide assortment of protective foods which are needed to keep America strong.

Uncle Sam advises using whole-grain or enriched white bread for vigor. Nut, raisin, peanut butter, and Boston brown breads offer appetizing sandwich diversions. And they need only butter or cheese for filling.

Sliced cold cuts (salami, tongue, ham, bologna) are popular sandwich fillings. But a chop, piece of roast, steak or even liver saved from dinner makes good sandwich chow for heavy workers or active youngsters.

A hot food or beverage puts zip in a lunch. A vacuum bottle makes it easy to carry hot soup, steaming vegetable juices, savory chowder, coffee or chocolate. To make sure that the lunch contains a goodly amount of vitamins and minerals include some celery, carrot strips or crisp cauliflower bits. Olives and pickles step up lunch appeal and are fine partners for sandwiches. For added nourishment, milk and cheese are important additions to the lunch-box lineup.

The lunch kit for the heavy eater also may contain nuts, stuffed eggs or raisins. For dessert, put in gingerbread or Victory cookies (short on sugar), candy bars (good energy foods) and always at least one fresh fruit.

Diversification Of Crops Advocated

WACO, Aug. 27 (AP)—Ingenuity to increase crop production for the war effort was recommended yesterday by E. D. White, assistant chief of the Agricultural Adjustment Administration, in a talk to a one-day meeting of Texas cotton farmers.

White mentioned heavily increased outputs of soybeans and peanuts, wheat, corn, flax, rice and cotton in connection with larger crop production.

In addition to farmers, the meeting was attended by government cotton specialists, state and U.S. department of agriculture war board officials and AAA committeemen.

Plans probably will be worked out whereby farmers will receive better prices for cottonseed, I. W. Duggan, director of the southern division of AAA, predicted.

The meeting was presided over by George Slaughter, AAA committee chairman.

Visiting Parents At Colorado City

COLORADO CITY, Aug. 27 — Pvt. James E. Franklin is visiting his parents in Colorado City while on nine-day leave from Fort Bragg, N. C., where he is stationed with the 39th Infantry in the communications section as a radio operator. The son of Mr. and Mrs. L. O. Franklin, Pvt. Franklin enlisted Jan. 22, 1942 and has been at Fort Bragg the past four months. "But our outfit expects to be moved immediately," he said, "to some unknown bivouac area."

Texas Taking Place In Lemon Market; First Shipments Made

This year, for the first time, Texas becomes a factor in the lemon market of the nation, with the introduction of Texsun Meyer lemons. The deal started in a very small way when first shipment was made on August 15. Dependent on weather conditions, peak movement should be about September 15 to 25.

The history of the Meyer lemon in the Rio Grande Valley is a little uncertain. From the best sources, it appears that Frank Meyer of the U. S. department of agriculture, shipped buds to a Florida nursery about 25 years ago. These buds were inserted in sour orange stocks and a number of small trees were grown. About 22 of these trees from Florida were planted in a grove near Westlaco, in the Rio Grande valley. Out of the 22 trees only four turned out to be of value and it is from these four trees that the present Meyer lemon orchards were started in the valley.

The Texsun Meyer lemons have all the good qualities of the finest lemon and stand as low a temperature as the standard oranges and grapefruit, something no other variety of lemon will do. Its shape is uniform, skin smooth, when cured it is of a vibrant yellow lemon color, and when raised in the Rio Grande Valley the Meyer lemon is said to contain 70 per cent more juice and about 80 per cent more citric acid than the lemons from other sections.

For the first time in the history of the Texas citrus industry, Texsun Meyer lemons will be properly cured, colored, graded as to quality, waxed and polished, sized and packed in new white pine standard lemon boxes. They will be picked only when mature by gloved hands, and will be clipped—not pulled—from the stem to avoid bruising.

The Rio Grande Valley Citrus Exchange controls an estimated tonnage of between twenty and twenty-five thousand field boxes of these lemons to be marketed under their Texsun and Tex-Maid brands. This tonnage will pack

out fifteen to twenty thousand packed boxes, running heavy in sizes 300s to 360s which are standard sizes of California lemons.

In Wartime, It's Christmastime — Yuletide Packages To Servicemen Should Be Mailed In October

Don't laugh if somebody starts reciting "The Night Before Christmas" within the next few weeks. It simply will be an eruption of the Christmas spirit at an all-time early date in response to appeals from the postal department to truly shop and mail early this year.

In the current bulletin, postmasters are instructed to advise the public that time of mailing Christmas parcels and Christmas cards for men in foreign service is from Oct. 1 to Nov. 1, and the earlier in this period the better.

In view of urgent need for shipping space to transport war materials, Christmas parcels may not exceed the present limits of 11 pounds in weight or 38 inches in length or 48 inches in length and girth combined. Even so, the public is urged to cooperate further by holding weight of the package to six pounds and the size to that of an ordinary shoe box.

It is imperative that the goods be packed in substantial containers and be securely wrapped. At the same time, the package should be tied so as to cause minimum difficulty to carriers who may have to open it for inspection.
