## City General Lady Panthers Take Second At Cisco Powerlifting Meet

We will be taking the lifters to their limits in the coming weeks since the final qualifying date for regional is Feb 28th. With Birdsong closing one plant and the possibility of closing another, Rising Star population and school enrollment dropping and the peanut program gone, it is time to get something else to help sustain our towns and have a marketable crop for the local farmers. I have discussed an ethanol plant with a many people and it is feasible and possible. With the plant closing and the peanut program gone makes this area a prime area for Federal and State GRANTS. Some colleges like A&M and Texas Tech have funding for this type of program.

If you will vote for me and help me to be elected as your County Commissioner, I will work to improve and pave precinct roads, maintain better budget control to keep taxes down, but most of all I will work to build an Ethanol plant and/or some other type plane in Precinct three.
