



The Gorman Panthers were defeated by a highly rated Hico Tiger team at Brogdon Field on Friday night by a score of 26 to 3. The Big Red defense held the Tigers to just 2 first down in the first half and held the score to 6-3 at the intermission. But in the last half the Tigers made adjustments in their offense and made 172 yards of their rushing total in the final half.

The Tigers wasted little time in scoring as they got the ball on the Gorman 5 yard line after a bad snap on a punt try and scored in 3 plays with Jacob Bowden getting the final yard with 8:31 left in the first period. The kick for point failed and the score was 6-0!.

Gorman came back with a 25 yard field goal by Justin Snider with 11:57 left the second period to close the gap at 6-3. The Big Red defense gave the offense the ball on the Tiger 36 after a

Following the halftime break with the Gorman and Hico Bands giving real fine routines the Tigers got the ball on their own 42 and scored in 8 plays with Jacob Bowden getting the final 2 yards for the TD with 2.54 left in the third. Bryan Wallace ran for the 2 point conversion, making the score 14-3.

The Tigers came back on their next possession and scored with 1:01 left in the third with Bowden catching a pass and racing 30 yards for the TD. The drive covered 54 yards in just three plays. The pass try for 2 points failed and the score was 20 to 3.

The final Tiger score came with 8:43 left in the game after the Tigers blocked a Panther punt on the Gorman 11 and scored in 2 plays with Clint Rainwater getting the final 7 on a run. Again a pass try failed for the 2 pointer and the final score was 26 to 3.

The Gorman offense was held to a low total with Margarito Sanchez getting 22 yards on 13. Paul Petree had 19 yards on 8 carries before being injured. Jeremy Bryan had 16 yards on 6 tries. Adon Rodriquez got 14 on 3 carries. Nick Guthery had 7 yards on 6 keepers but his total was hurt by three big losses on the pass tries.

This week the Big Red defense will be tested again when they travel to Ranger Friday night at 8 p.m. The Panthers will need to crank up it's offense if they are to get their first win of the season as they are standing at 0 and 2.

Hope Joiner Joins Rehab Rancher Program to Benefit WTRC

Burgess recruited Mrs. Joiner along with other Gorman area ranchers to take cattle purchased by the Rehab Center Foundation and raise them along with their own. Revenues from the calf production go into the Center's Foundation. To date, 39 pairs have been placed with ranchers in the Gorman area.

Since the Rehab Rancher program began a little over a year ago, some 300 head of cattle have been placed with about 150 ranchers throughout the area.

Burgess expressed his gratitude for the fine response of the folks in the Gorman area and asked that anyone else in the area wishing to participate to give him a call. Burgess said, this program works well for a lot of us who maybe can't make a major contribution. The Rehab Ranchers just let a cow or two through their gate to raise. It's simple and requires very little additional work for the rancher and the long-term benefits for the Rehab Center are significant.

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

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 50 proposes a constitutional amendment providing that the legislature by general law may authorize the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board to issue general obligation bonds of the state in an amount not exceeding \$300 million to finance educational loans to students. The maximum, interest rate to be borne by the bonds must be set by law. The legislature may provide for the investment of bond proceeds and may establish an interest and sinking fund to pay the bonds.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of \$300 million in general obligation bonds to finance education loans to students.'

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


