## Month of April - Clean Up Month For City Of Gorman



## James Marvin Wooten Capture Report--November 23, 2002

Knowing he only has a few months to live, wanted fugitive James Marvin Wooten has surrendered to police from his hospital bed in Portland, Oregon. Locating Wooten was not a direct result of his profile on the Fox program "America's Most Wanted: America Fights Back," but Gorman, Texas Police Officer Jeff Baker says the AMW website, www.amw.com helped confirm Wooten's identity.

Wooten was wanted by the Gorman Police Department for Aggravated Sexual Assault of a Child, Tampering with a Witness and Indecency. Police say that Wooten sexually assaulted his girlfriend's daughter. He was arrested and bonded out. Police say that after his release, Wooten harassed the victim by calling her and sending her gifts. He was again arrested for Tampering with a Witness, but posted bail and fled.


In 2000, Wooten was spotted in Colorado City, Texas. Investigators learned he had a job in Roscoe, Texas using the alias of James Kitchens. AMW profiled his case on March 9, 2002.

In recent days, Wooten had checked himself into a hospital in Portland, Oregon, using the new alias of Kevin Grogan. He was diagnosed with cancer. According to Officer Baker, Wooten was told he had three to six months to live. Officer Baker said Wooten met with a preacher who convinced him to confess. Wooten told hospital personnel his true name, but gave and incorrect date of birth. The information was passed on to local authorities, who looked up his information on the AMW site, then contacted authorities in Texas.
