Back to School

The halls of Gorman Independent School District were filled with excited students Monday morning. The teachers and staff have been preparing all summer for the students. Elementary reported an enrollment of 210 students and the High School reported an enrollment of 168 students in grades 7-12. The first day enrollment is down slightly compared to the enrollment last August with a total enrollment of 388.

Students were greeted by many veteran teachers and had the opportunity to meet a few new instructors. New staff members include DuAnn Jones-elementary teacher, Randy Jones-Coach/History teacher, Christine Roath-Band Director, and Amanda Rainey-English/Art teacher.

The school year began with Elementary gathering around the flagpole saying the Pledge of Allegiance and the Texas Pledge while the High School met in the Auditorium as the Seniors were honored in the Alpha Omega ceremony. All students will have the opportunity to say the pledges and participate in a moment of silence each day.

Safety is a major concern for every school system. Steps are being taken to ensure the safety of every child. All visitors to campus will be required to report to one of the campus administrative offices and sign in. In order to better protect our students who cross major streets to attend class and to participate in athletics, Gorman ISD will install speed bumps on Second Street in front of the High School and Maxfield Elementary buildings. The District will also restrict access to the area between the High School/Elementary buildings and the Bus Barn/Ag Shop during school hours. The District apologizes for any inconvenience, but the safety of the children must be addressed.

As the new school year begins, the Gorman ISD faculty encourages you as community members to volunteer at school. Everyone has something to offer. It takes a community educate our children. If you would like to volunteer, please contact either campus.

Zane Grey Jones

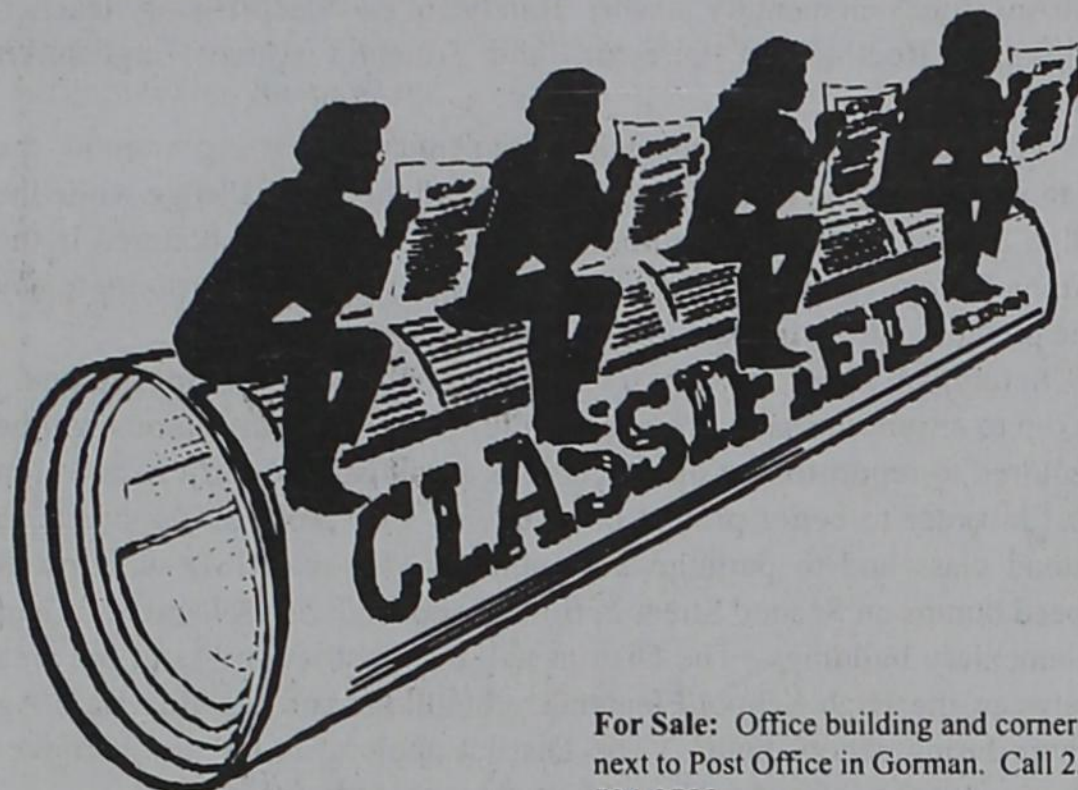

'Science Rules' At Tarleton This Summer

The answers to tomorrow's challenges in medicine, energy and economics might one day come from work done by a group of young scientists who participated in a series of camps offered this summer by the College of Science and Technology at Tarleton State University.

Summer camps in Engineering Physics might not sound like a lot of fun, but Tarleton professors Dr. Denise Martinez and Dr. Michael Hibbs and their dedicated staff managed sneak in some critical points of science while leading sixth through 12 grade campers through in a variety of experiments. Included among the activities were hands-on demonstrations in bottle rockets, Lego robotab creativity, astronomical presentations and other scientific projects.

Seventh grader Miles Vann of Gorman was among the young scientists who participated in the summer program.

This was the second summer that the unique camps have been offered at the University. Sparking an early interest in subjects such as science and math is key to providing future scientists and technicians with the insight to address tomorrow's issues. A current trend in teaching in the areas of science and engineering is aimed at providing students with a more visual hands-on approach to learning. Many of the teaching models used in this year's summer camp were evaluated for effectiveness and then passed on to high school and junior high faculty.

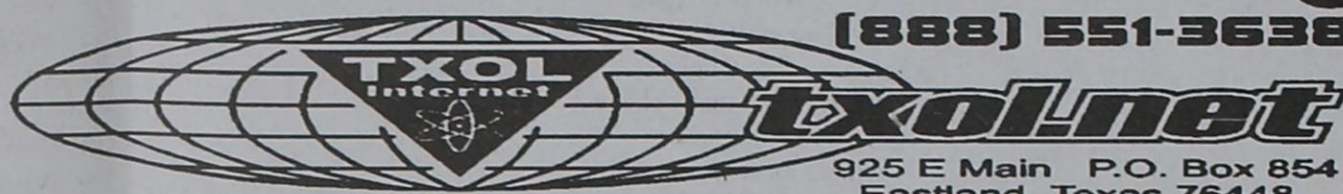

Eastland County Court News

Cisco Man's Probation Revoked

Presiding Judge Steven Herod of the 91st District Court revoked the probation of CHARLES DAVID WHITEHEAD, 47, Thursday afternoon after hearing testimony. Whitehead, a Cisco resident, had previously been placed on four years probation on April 24, 2000 for the felony offense of Indecency with a Child. The Court sentenced Whitehead to 4 years in prison, the maximum allowed by law under the prior original sentence, for violating the terms and conditions of his probation. Criminal District Attorney Russ Thomason stated: "Probation Officer Joe Tucker made extraordinary efforts to rehabilitate Mr. Whitehead, which he failed to take advantage of, leaving Mr. Tucker no choice but to seek his imprisonment."

JURY CONVICTS MAN OF DRIVING WHILE INTOXICATED

Last week a petit jury in the County Court of Eastland found Roger Eric Weimer of Dallas, guilty of Driving While Intoxicated. Weimer, who had his wife and grandchildren as passengers in the vehicle in which he was driving, was apprehended by Trooper Chris Ledbetter. Abilene Attorney Lynn Ingalsbe represented Weimer at trial. Weimer had been previously convicted of another DWI in another county. Presiding Judge Brad Stephenson assessed punishment, sentencing Weimer to one year confinement in the Eastland County Jail, suspended with community supervision for a period of two years, court costs, and a fine of \$2,700.00. As another term and condition of his community supervision, Judge Stephenson ordered Weimer to spend thirty consecutive days in the Eastland County Jail or submit himself to a twenty-eight day in-house alcohol treatment facility at his own cost.

Eastland Man's Probation Revoked

Presiding Judge Brad Stephenson revoked the probation of RICHARD GLEN HARR, 46, last Friday afternoon after hearing testimony in the Eastland County Courtroom. Harr, an Eastland resident, had previously been placed on two years probation on October 19, 2001 for Driving While Intoxicated. The Court sentenced Harr to one year in the Eastland County Jail, for violating the terms and conditions of his probation. Criminal District Attorney Russ Thomason stated: Judge Stephenson's sentence should be a strong message to those who are fortunate enough to receive probation but don't take their terms and conditions of probation seriously.
