

THE END OF AN ERA By Mary Webb

Yes, it is true the Texas Peanut Producers Board is moving its headquarters to Lubbock, Texas. Yes, it is true I will be retiring this summer. I did not want to just fade away without telling you folks "thank you" for allowing us to work in your fine community for almost 35 years.

We are so grateful for the support and cooperation given to us through the years by the citizens and businesses in Gorman. I am so proud to have been a part of this community for the past 28 years. Even though I am not a resident, I was born and reared in the Kokomo Community and have spent half of my adult life working here in Gorman for the TPPB. Therefore, I have laid claim to being one of

The TPPB was organized in 1969 and established its headquarters in what was then known as the old Southwestern Peanut Growers Association's building. Ross Wilson, manager of the Southwestern Peanut Growers Association, was responsible for getting legislation passed that established the TPPB as the first agriculture commodity check-off organization in the State of Texas. Wayne Eaves was hired as the first executive director.

When I was hired as the executive director in 1983, the office moved into downtown Gorman. Then in 1986, we purchased the lot and built the structure where we are now located. It was a good decision because it established the TPPB as a secure and permanent organization in a community completely oriented to peanuts. Plus, being located in Gorman allowed us to operate with very minimum administrative costs.

The Texas Peanut Producers Board began discussions and plans to move the office to Lubbock shortly after I announced my intent to retire. The deciding vote came in a board meeting in December 2002. Now that the majority of the peanut production is in West Texas and with the infrastructure expanding to that area, the Board felt the growers would be better served by relocating the headquarters to Lubbock.

I think it is too early to tell whether the new peanut program is going to be a "good" or "bad" thing for the Texas peanut growers as a whole. However, with the drastic decrease in peanut acreage in Central Texas, it is obvious the new program is not working for peanut farmers in this area. I share your sadness when I drive around the countryside and see coastal bermuda or untilled land where there once was peanuts. I would like to think peanut production might return to the area in the future, but with the breakdown in the infrastructure it does not look too promising.

You are a strong community with progressive leadership. I am certain that other businesses will come in and fill the void of the loss of the peanut industry.

Thank you Gorman for your friendship. You have given me many good memories I can take with me in my retirement. I appreciate all you have done for me and the Texas Peanut Producers Board.
