Walking Blood Bank Discussed

By Doctor At BM Club

Dr. W. M. Brogdon expressed his appreciation to members of the Businessmen's Club Monday who had signed up for the Walking Blood Bank. He urged others to come to Blackwell Hospital and have their blood typed. He stated that this could be beneficial to the individual as well as offering his blood to someone else. Furthermore, there is nothing binding about having your blood typed. If you happen to have a type of blood that is needed it is only accepted if you wish to give it voluntarily. When your blood is typed you are given a card to carry in your billfold. If you ever need blood in an emergency, having this card will save the doctors time in typing your blood and may save your life.

Dr. Brogdon stated that a person could come to the hospital at his own convenience and they would gladly take time to type his blood and give him a card.

Members of the Armed Forces are more conscious of the need for an organization than civilians as you can note by the following letter.

Funeral services were conducted by Rev. Don Turner, at the First Baptist Church in Desdemona.

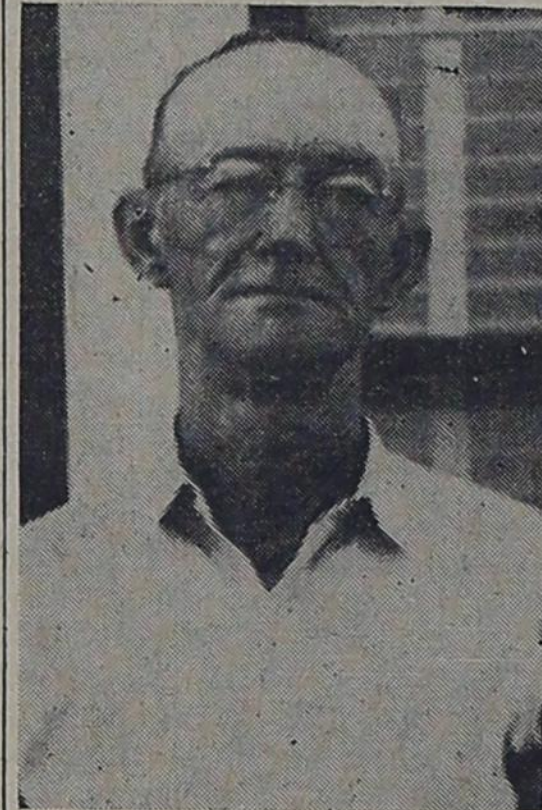
Burial was in the Howard Cemetery on Friday, May 6, 1958.

As It Looks From Here

WASHINGTON, D. C. - WHILE THE UNITED STATES has been trying to keep its front lawn mowed and its hedges trimmed, it has let its back yard grow up in grass and thorny brambles.

WHILE WE HAVE BEEN LOOKING at the Iron Curtain in Europe and the Bamboo Curtain in the Far East, we practically dropped the curtain on our friends and neighbors to the south in Latin America.

WHILE THE UNITED STATES has been trying to build up dams and levees with dollars against the Soviet expansion in some far reaches of the earth, Soviet influence has seeped in under the foundations in Latin America.

OUR SOUTH AND CENTRAL AMERICAN FRIENDS are naturally sensitive towards North America. This natural sentiment exists because of the contrast in the standard of living between the two areas of this same hemisphere. It can not be said it is because we are a "have" nation and all the nations south of us are "have nots." Latin America does "have," and we need a lot of it.

LATIN AMERICA IS TREMENDOUSLY IMPORTANT to the United States, and, of course, the United States is all important to Latin America. Security is not the only common interest which we have, although the defense of both is essential to both.

THESE FEW FACTS SHOULD IMPRESS upon us the point: OUR TRADE WITH LATIN AMERICA is almost as large as our trade with all of Europe. We import annually \$3,700,000,000 from Latin America, and they buy \$4,700,000,000 annually from us. That is the figure for 1957. Unlike many other parts of the world, almost all of these exports to Latin America are paid for. THEY DEPEND UPON US TO BUY 44.2 per cent of their products. The United States sold them, for cash, 48.8 per cent of all their imports in 1957.

WE IMPORT STRATEGICALLY IMPORTANT METALS from South America. They purchase from this Country about 35 per cent of our export of automobiles and trucks, one-third of our exports of chemicals and electrical machinery, iron and steel mill products, and 17 per cent of all our exports of foodstuffs.
