Burleson Urges Equal Support For S. W. Peanuts

The Honorable Lyndon B. Johnson United States Senate Washington 25, D. C. Dear Lyndon:

I believe the enclosure is self-explanatory.

The Agriculture Department is supposed to make a decision on this matter of peanut grades and support provisions in the next few days.

Representatives and Senators from the peanut-producing area in the Southeast are maintaining their steady pressure on the Department, and as I have mentioned in my letter to Mr. McLain, their best argument is that we should not agitate the status quo for fear of furnishing ammunition to those who would like to drop peanuts as one of the basic commodities.

We have gone along with this threat for a number of years, but personally, I am not willing to do so any longer.

Other enclosures may be helpful to understanding the feeling of our shellers and growers in the Southwest.

You may wish to contact Mr. Marvin McLain, Assistant Secretary of Agriculture, on this matter, and should you do so, time is of the essence since the decision could be rendered within the next few days.

It is my understanding that in the next few days the Department will determine its new formula of price support and grade standards for the various types of peanuts.

The Department is well aware of the views of the growers and shellers of peanuts in the Southwest. The disagreement between the treatment applied to the Southwest as opposed to the Southeast is of long standing.

Serves Railroads For Thirty Years In Texas

Mr. Tom Woody, local Katy station agent, has been working at the local depot since November, 1956. He has also worked at various places along the Waco, Houston and San Antonio line. However, he did make his first start on his railroad career at this same depot thirty years ago in December, 1928.

Mr. Scates had charge of the depot then and Mr. Woody was only a high school student. Mr. Woody worked around the depot as a handyman who swept out the station and kept things neat and in order. Later when he finished school, Mr. Scates employed him as a regular worker. He worked a year there and then went to Telegraph School in Ft. Worth for nine months. There he learned telegraphing and typing and other business principles.

Mr. Woody then secured jobs at several depots, working in a variety of places. His last job before coming to Gorman was Stamford where he worked for 12 years. In November of 1956 he came to Gorman and began work at the local depot where he started out thirty years before.

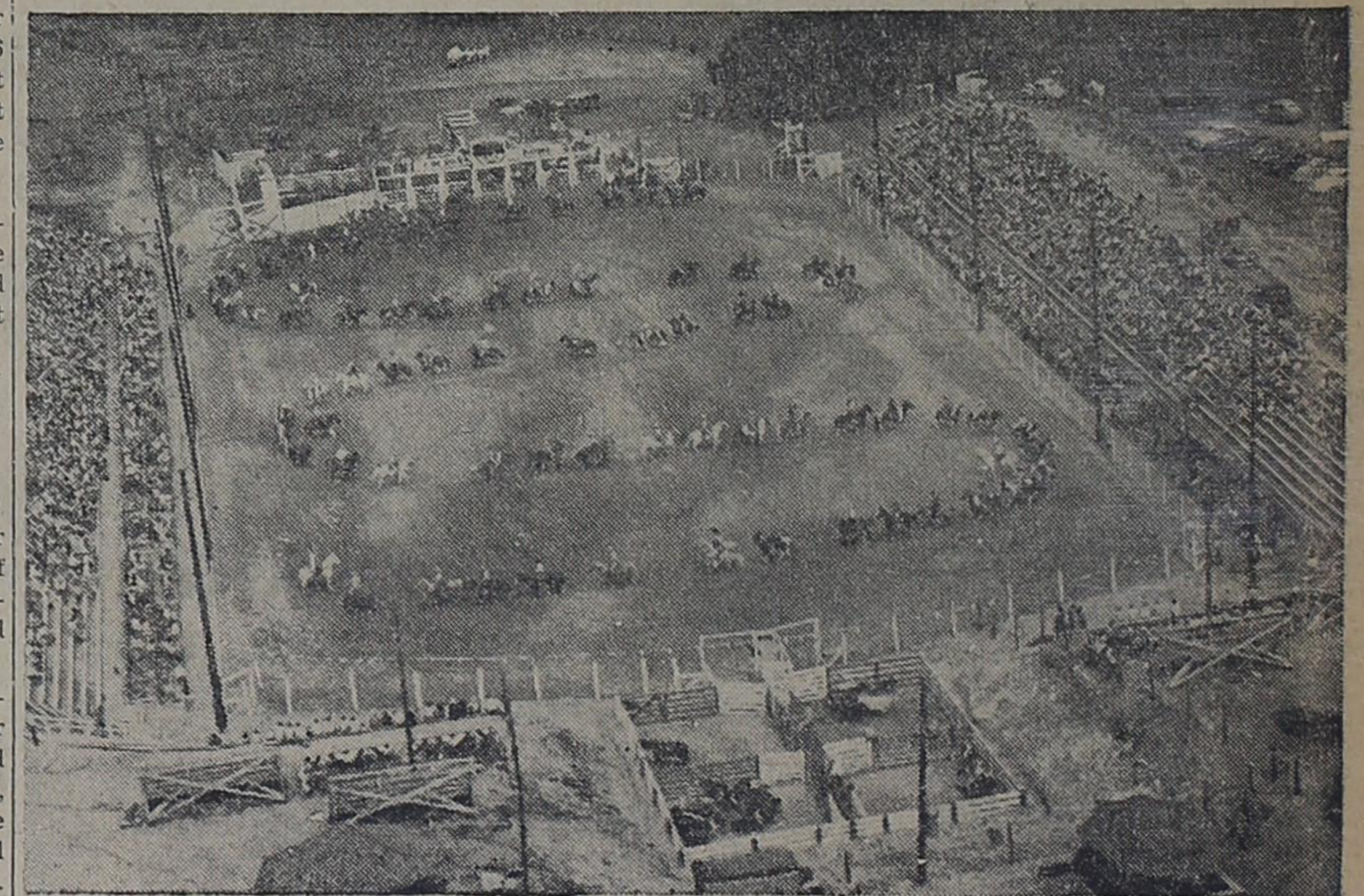

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.
SJR #4-Number Seven on the Ballot.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4 proposing an Amendment to Section 56 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing that the Legislature be authorized to appropriate money and establish the procedure necessary to expend such money for the purpose of developing information about the historical, natural, agricultural, industrial, educational, marketing, recreational and living resources of Texas, and for the purpose of informing persons and corporations of other states through advertising in periodicals having national circulation and the dissemination of factual information about the advantages and economic resources offered by the State of Texas; providing that neither the name nor the picture of any living state official shall ever be used in any of said advertising, and providing that the Legislature may require that any sum of money appropriated hereunder shall be matched by an equal sum paid into the State Treasury from private sources before any of said money may be expended.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 56 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Section 56. The Legislature of the State of Texas shall have the power to appropriate money and establish the procedure necessary to expend such money for the purpose of developing information about the historical, natural, agricultural, industrial, educational, recreational and living resources of Texas, and for the purpose of informing persons and corporations of other states through advertising in periodicals having national circulation and the dissemination of factual information about the advantages and economic resources offered by the State of Texas; providing that neither the name nor the picture of any living state official shall ever be used in any of said advertising, and providing that the Legislature may require that any sum of money appropriated hereunder shall be matched by an equal sum paid into the State Treasury from private sources before any of said money may be expended."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing the Legislature to make appropriations and establish procedure for advertising the historical, natural, agricultural, industrial, educational, recreational and other resources of Texas."

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing the Legislature to make appropriations and establish procedure for advertising the historical, natural, agricultural, industrial, educational, recreational and other resources of Texas."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the constitution and laws of this state.

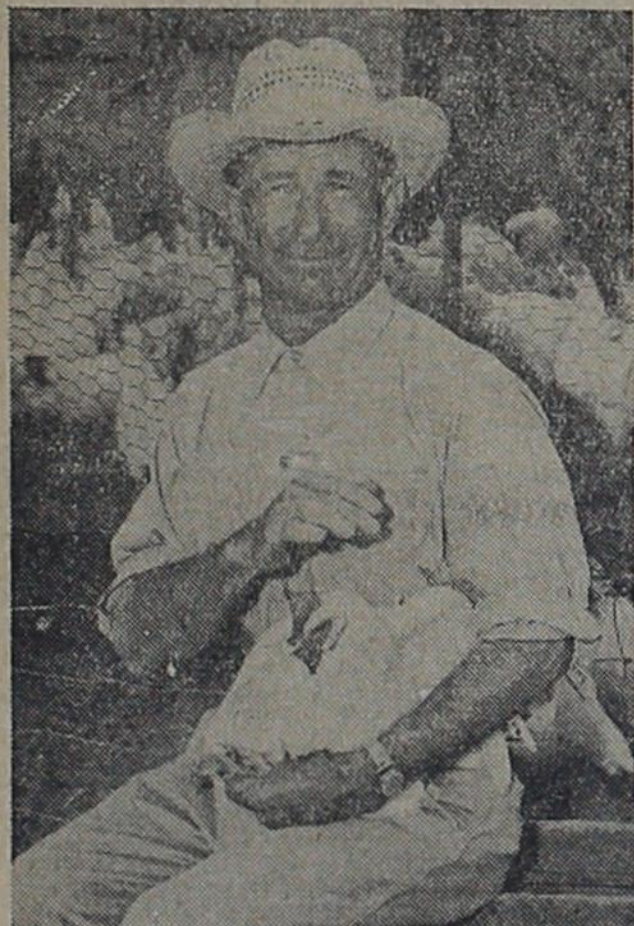

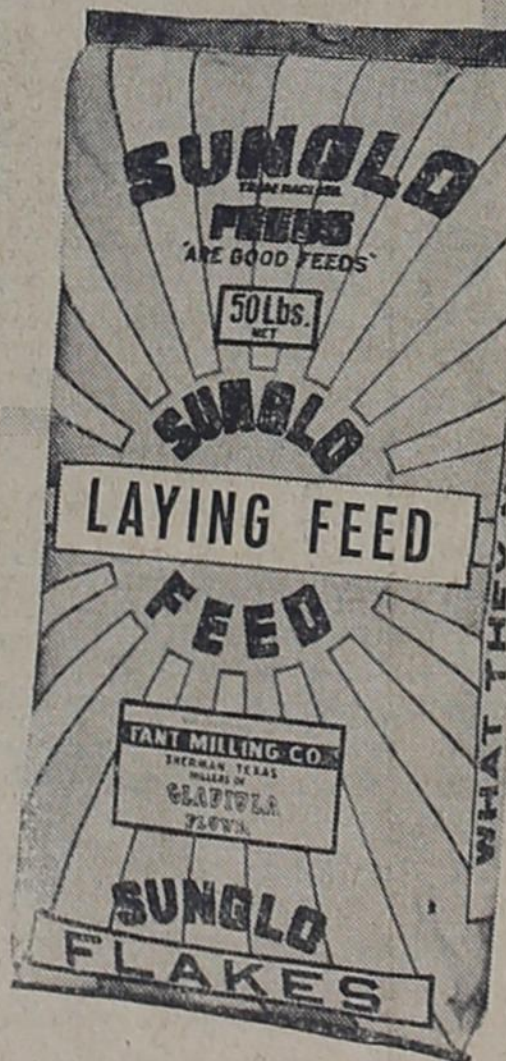

Southwest growers and shellers is even admitted by some of the opponents of their views. The most substantial argument of those who wish to maintain the status quo is that to disturb the present arrangement would create dissension between the areas, giving the opponents of the Peanut Program the opportunity to "divide and conquer".

We of the Southwest have recognized this fact and have carried the burden. We are to the point, however, of not being willing to carry it no longer and to suffer the obvious disadvantages now imposed upon us.

We believe and strongly recommend that the grade standards and definitions established by the Government, either on a basis of voluntary or mandatory use, for peanuts shall be uniform among the various types of peanuts, except for variations as to size of kernels.

We believe the same price support should apply to each 1 per centum sound mature kernels for all types, with premiums to be determined by the Department for the extra large Virginia and Valencia-type which are suitable for cleaning and roasting.

We do not believe our position in this matter can be successfully and reasonably opposed. It is a matter of fairness and equal treatment. It simply does not make sense that a so-called number one grade of any commodity should have a lower standard in one area than in another.

This unequal treatment is dearly costing our farmers and shellers in the Southwest, for no other reason than an application of an arbitrary formula. There is no reason to believe that the growers and shellers of the Southeast will agree to giving up this advantage which they enjoy. There seemingly can be no agreement between the areas and, therefore, it rests on the Department to resolve this issue of long standing.

We believe the Department should take immediate action to remedy this situation and not continue a program which penalizes competition between types and areas of peanuts.

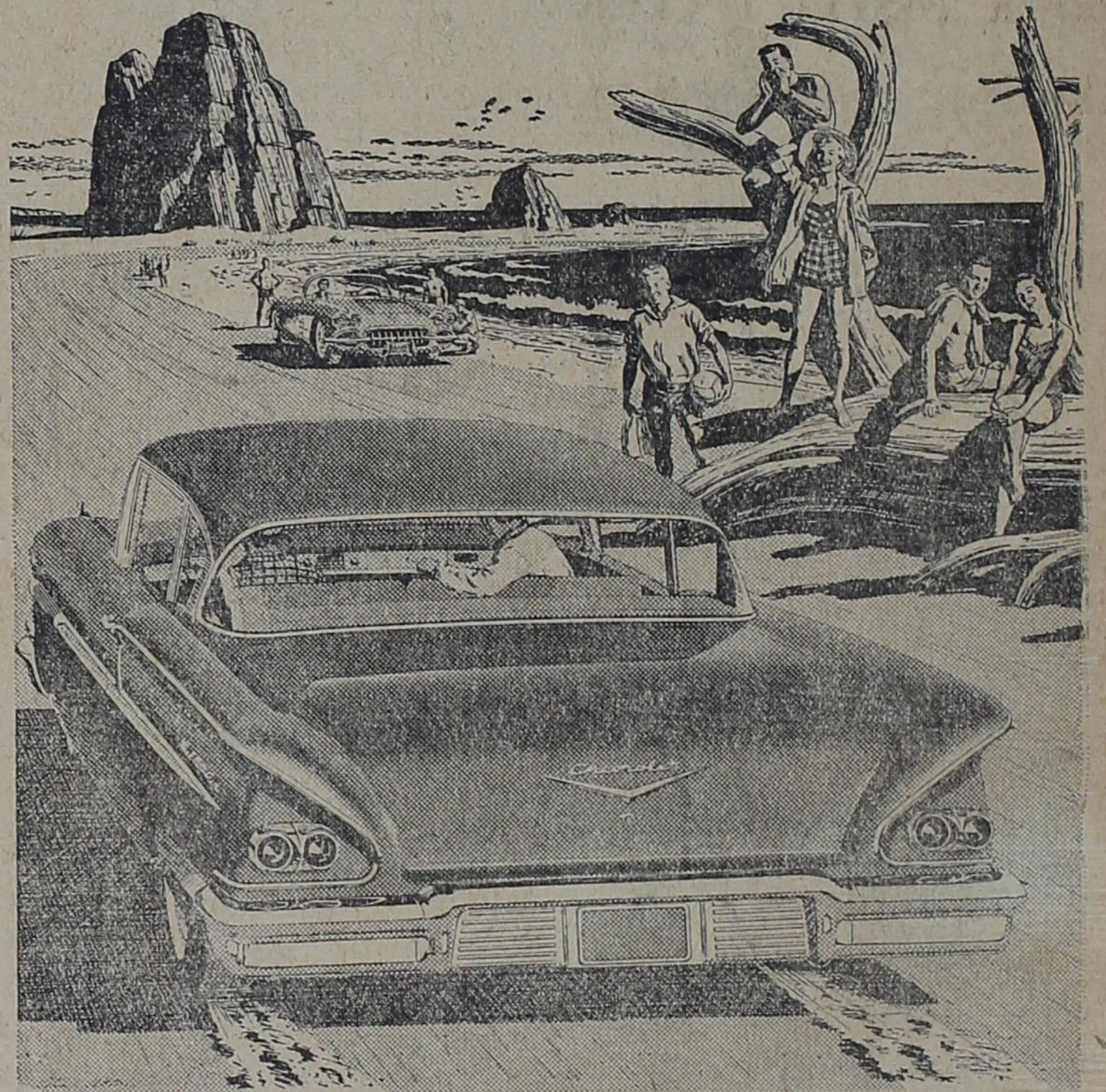

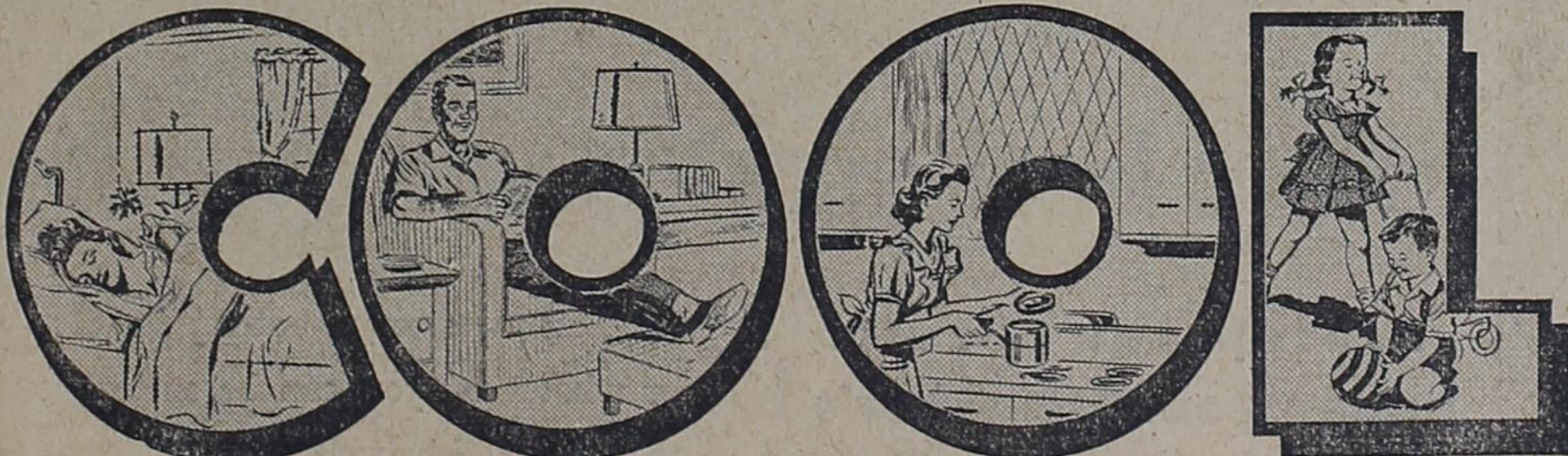

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.
HJR #36—Number Eight on the Ballot.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 36 proposing an amendment to Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Subsection to be known as 51a-1; giving the Legislature the power to provide, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for assistance on behalf of persons eligible for Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, and Aid to Dependent Children as provided in Section 51a of Article III and for persons eligible for Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled as provided in Article III, Section 51-b of the Constitution of the State of Texas; providing for direct or vendor payments for medical care on behalf of such recipients; providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States for such payments; providing that the amounts paid out of State funds shall be in addition to the direct assistance to such recipients; providing that the amounts paid out of State funds shall never exceed the payments out of Federal funds for such purposes; providing for the expenditure of State funds for such purposes; and providing that the amounts so expended out of Federal funds:

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Subsection to be known as Subsection 51a-1, which shall read as follows:

"Subsection 51a-1. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by General Laws and to make payment for same, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for direct or vendor payments for medical care on behalf of needy recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, or Aid to Dependent Children as provided for in Section 51a of Article III and on behalf of needy recipients of Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled as provided for in Section 51-b of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas. The payments for such medical care on behalf of such recipients shall be in addition to the direct assistance to such recipients, and shall

be in such amounts as provided by the Legislature; provided, however, that the amounts paid out of State funds for such purposes shall never exceed the amounts paid out of Federal funds for such purposes.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Federal Government of the United States, such financial aid on behalf of the needy aged, needy blind, needy children, and needy permanently and totally disabled persons as such Government may offer not inconsistent with restrictions here-in set forth."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to authorize vendor payments for medical care in addition to the public assistance to and on behalf of needy recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, Aid to Dependent Children or Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Federal Government for the purpose of paying such assistance; and providing that the expenditure out of State funds for such purposes shall never exceed the amounts so expended out of Federal funds"; and

"AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to authorize vendor payments for medical care in addition to the amount paid in the form of direct public assistance to and on behalf of needy recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, Aid to Dependent Children or Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Federal Government for the purpose of paying such assistance; and providing that the expenditure out of State funds for such purposes shall never exceed the amounts so expended out of Federal funds";

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and held as required by the Constitution and the Laws of the State of Texas.

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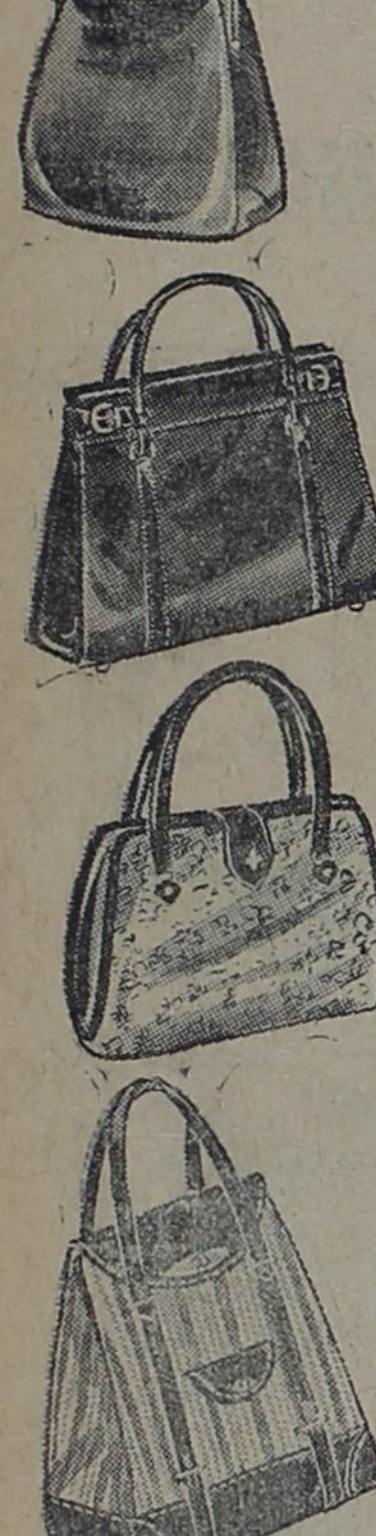
