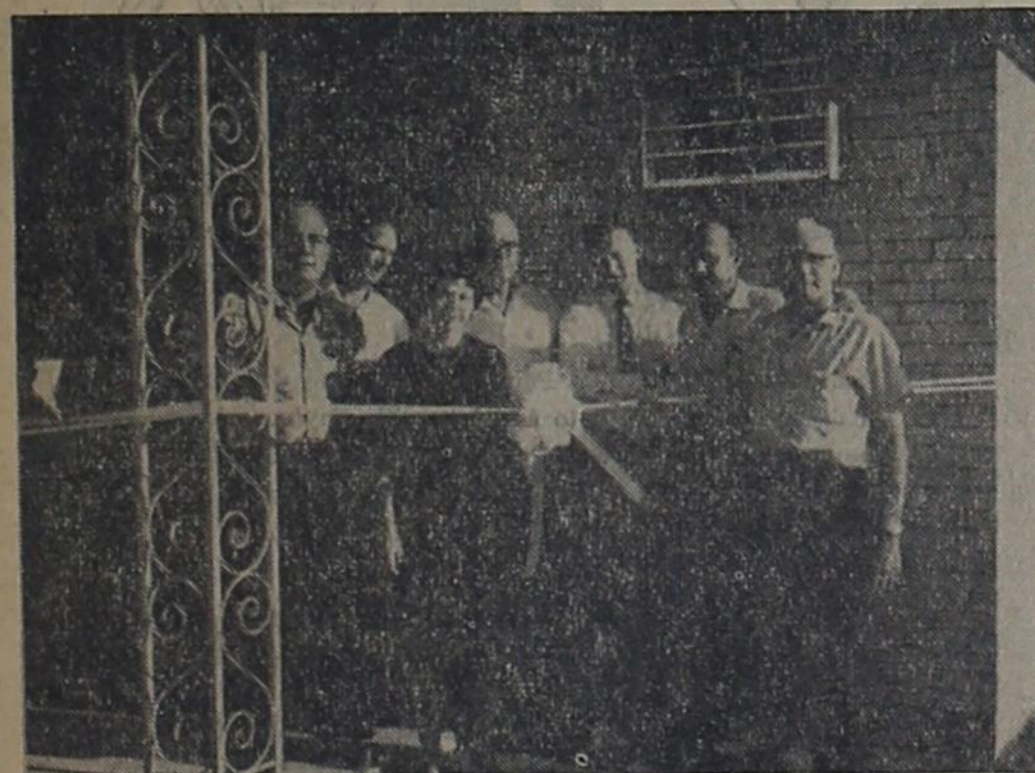
HAPPY JUBILEE — It's here, and if all the floats and entries turn up for the parade Saturday morning it will almost reach the Leon River — well, almost.

Ribbon Cutting Ceremony On Friday Opens Gorman Housing Authority

The twelve unit homes are one, two and three bedroom homes with each unit built with a different color brick and each unit interior is done in a different color.

The kitchen cabinets are mahogany with stainless steel sinks and formica tops. Each has a gas range and utility area.

The bathrooms are done in ceramic tile and floors are tiled throughout.

The Panthers were badly outclassed on Friday night when they journeyed to Eastland to take on the Class A Mavericks. The Mavericks had little trouble with the Red and Blue running up a score of 39 to 0.

The Panther offense couldn't get started against the tough Maverick defense as they made only 29 yards rushing all evening. They managed only 21 yards on their aerial game.

Gary Overstreet was the leading ground gainer again for the Red and Blue with 19 yards on 13 trips. Ormsby got 3 yards on 5 tries. Jay made 3 on 4 carries. Clark got 4 yards on 3 tries. The averages for the ball carriers were low due to the fact that

they were thrown for losses on numerous occasions.

The Mavericks scored in every quarter on the game. The first score came with 4 1/2 minutes gone in the first period. The second tally came with 5 minutes left in the first half and the third one with 1 minute and 50 seconds left before the half. In the second half with 4 minutes gone the Maverick fullback, Jim Moylan, rambled for 65 yards for the 4th TD. With 4 minutes left in the game Stanley Underwood pulled in a pass for 20 yards and the fifth tally. In the closing minute of the game Eastland scored again when Norman Rhodes intercepted a Panther aerial on the Panther 10 and crossed the goal line.

The Panthers had three new members come out for football last week despite the fact that the Red and Blue had lost all 3 of their games. Don Wallace, Glen Scitern and Mike Foster reported for practice on Monday of last week. These boys should help to bolster the Panther team. At least we hope so.

The Panthers will host the Hico Tigers in the Homecoming Game on Saturday night at Brogdon Field at 8 p. m. This should be a fine ball game as these two teams should be fairly evenly matched.

The Panthers will be playing hard for their first win and also to please the large crowd which is expected for the Homecoming Game.

There will be a splendid half-time show with the crowning of the Homecoming Queen and the Coming Home Queen, and the Diamond Jubilee Queen will also be presented.

As It Looks From Here

WASHINGTON, D. C. — CONGRESS, A MICROCOSM OF THE NATION, is in turn, represented by its various Committees in the early stages of any legislation. Each Committee has its specialty and its jurisdiction.

A GREAT PART OF THE WORK OF THE CONGRESS is done in Committees and, by necessity, Members of Committees likewise become specialists on the subjects with which their Committee deals.

THERE ARE DRAWBACKS AND CRITICISMS of the Committee system, but no one has devised a better plan. This is true with many of the procedures of any legislative body, but the very nature of our system of representative government causes the process to be somewhat cumbersome.

A COMMITTEE PASSES UPON a given subject, which either kills a bill or reports it out favorably. If reported out, it goes to the Rules Committee, which acts as the traffic cop to the Floor for debate.

THOUSANDS OF BILLS ARE INTRODUCED IN EVERY SESSION OF CONGRESS. Many are never considered by a Committee at all and, in fact, some introduced are never intended for passage.

THERE ARE PROCEDURES FOR BYPASSING both a Legislative Committee and the Rules Committee. One is by a process called "discharge petition."

WHEN A MEASURE IS BOTTLED UP IN A COMMITTEE, any Member may file a discharge petition requiring the signatures of at least a majority of the entire membership. There being 435 Members of the House of Representatives, this means that it takes 218 signatures to bring out a bill under this procedure.

THE RULE FOR THE DISCHARGE PETITION WAS ENACTED IN 1910. Since that date only two measures brought up under this method have actually become Law.

AT PRESENT A NUMBER OF SUCH PETITIONS are on file. The best known is that which provides a \$100 monthly pension for World War I veterans. Many World War I veterans and their families write, urging the signing of this petition, since the Veterans Affairs Committee has not cleared it. Most recognize it to be the least desirable course of action, but feel it is the only avenue by which the measure could be considered by the entire House of Representatives. Most members, if not all, recognize the remote possibility of success by resorting to the discharge petition plan. For this reason, many who may favor a measure are opposed to giving their support to this procedure.

IN THIS CASE OF WORLD WAR I VETERANS PENSION there is every indication that the United States Senate would not consider the measure, and second, should it be brought up and passed by both Houses, there is virtual certainty that the President would exercise his veto.

AS IS THE CASE OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES this does not mean the United States Senate or the President does not favor adequately caring for World War I veterans, or as to that matter, any veteran. From the standpoint of the Administration itself, the Budget Bureau advised that it would add \$1,266,247,000 to the present Pension Program, which is in the President's Budget at \$1,799,840,000. In other words, the total cost of pensions alone would be \$3,066,087,000.

FROM THE STANDPOINT OF THE EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT, sums in this amount would almost have to be budgeted before approval could be likely. The 1965 fiscal year Budget is now in the process of being prepared to submit to the Congress next year. As is the case of any expenditure connected with a new program of such magnitude, it usually starts with this process, and although smaller items may be added as legislation finds its way through the many steps necessary to final enactment, there is no record to indicate expenditures this high, which have not been budgeted, have ever reached final success.

MANY WORLD WAR I VETERANS FEEL HURT THAT a flat monthly pension will be the

There are, however, a number of measures pending which would amend existing Law and, if finally approved, would be of help to many who either do not now qualify for a pension or other benefits under present Law. Some of these are under active consideration and have chance of passing.

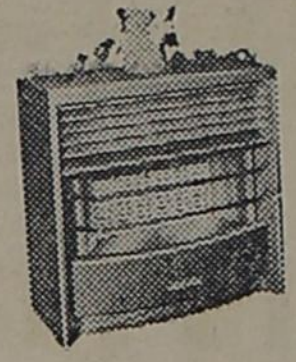
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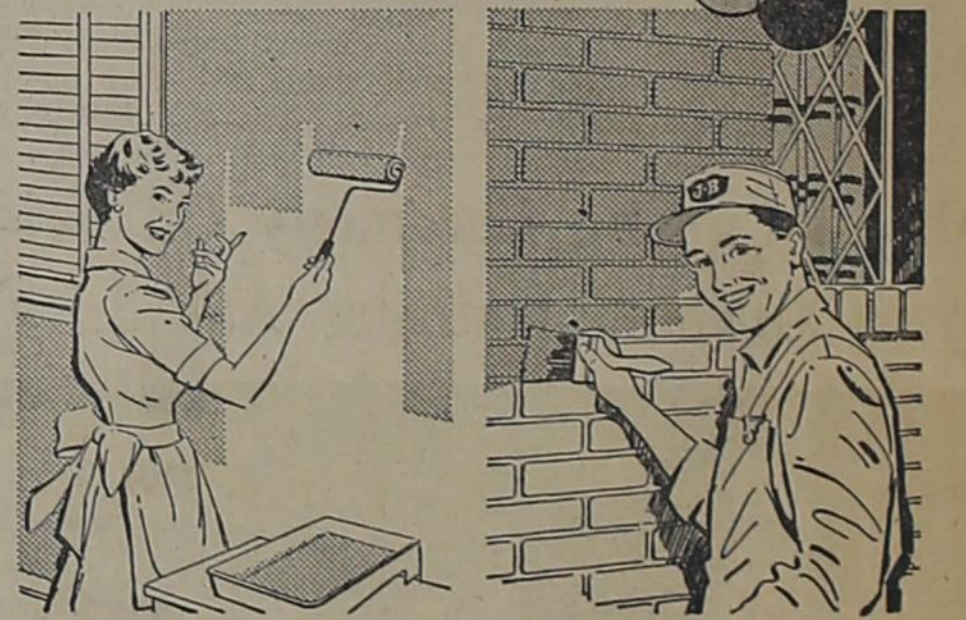

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**A Letter From
 An Ex-Student**

Dear Fellow Ex-Students:

Thanks for the postal card giving the date of the homecoming this year. You sent the card out well in advance to allow for planning to attend. Thanks also for the follow-up letter and programs.

Regretfully, I will not be able to attend this year though I have had the privilege of being there 3 times already. I have already taken my vacation and went to Idaho to see my 3 children and 6 grandchildren. Hope I can be there next year.

Homecoming means a lot to me. I was born and raised in Gorman. It was my whole life from the time I first saw the light of day until I came to California in 1933. My father was born there and my mother was born in Comanche County. My grandfather McMullen came to that country after the Civil War and bought 400 acres of land from the railroad on the Sabanna Creek. His 7 children were born on the creek as well as some of us 17 grandchildren. As children we went swimming in the creek, we watered our stock there, we went fishing there, we hauled water from it, we gathered pecans on its banks in the fall, we saw it overflow during the heavy rains, we walked across it on a foot log to go to school. That was our life, our happiness, our joy.

In 1919 we were living in the house on the ground where the peanut mill is now located and it was there that I got my eye put out.

It was in Gorman that I learned my abc's. It was there that I graduated from grammar school in 1925 and made the speech of welcome. "Friends, we see you have come. We hope you are well. We know you are welcome."

It was there that I learned and spoke the declamation speeches, "Happiness and Liberty," by Robert G. Ingersoll. "I Am An American" by Elias Liberman. Then a foreign born boy arose and said: "I am an American. My father was an atom of dust; my mother was a straw in the wind to his Supreme Majesty. But then the dream came. The dream of America. The atom of dust became a man and the straw in the wind became a woman for the first time. See, said my father, pointing to the flag that fluttered near. That flag of stars and stripes is yours! Live for it! Die for it! And under the open skies of my new country I swore to do so. And every drop of blood in me will keep that vow. I am an American."

In 1929 came the exhilaration of graduation from high school and again I was privileged to make the speech of welcome and

used the same speech that I had given 4 years before.

So, all my memories of childhood are centered around Gorman for the most part.

When I was in the 5th grade I was in love with 7 girls. By the time I reached the 8th grade it was narrowed down to one and then she moved away and my heart was broken. None of them ever knew for it was a secret love. And every valentine day, I would buy the most expensive nickel valentine I could find, sneak up behind that one and only girl, give her the valentine and run. I was never able to express the great love that welled up in my heart so I had to let that valentine convey the message of pent up emotion.

In my senior year I campaigned for and won the election as Editor-in-Chief of the Broadcaster. It was an experience to help raise the money, get all the pictures taken, and get the engraving done in Ft Worth. I went to the engravers in Ft Worth by hitch-hiking. I came back on the train but I only had enough money to get as far as Carbon. I walked the last ten miles down the railroad track getting to Gorman about 5 a. m.

In the Senior Class play, which we gave in the Mayo Theatre, I played the part of Carl Thomas and I was in love with a girl named Catherine. I had to — I mean I got to put my arm around her and say, "Catherine, you know I love you. I have studied and slaved with the one though in my mind that some day I could take you in my arms and say 'this is my wife.'"

I was pretty bashful and the girl who played the part of Catherine knew it.
