



A daily visitor at the station, it was learned that Mr. Reynolds 87th birthday was approaching. When friends learned the news, a party was organized to help him commemorate this event.

Mr. Reynolds is a life long Gorman resident. But until last years Homecoming, some may not have known that he was also a war hero! While serving World War II in the Philippine Liberation and in New Guinea he received the Combat Infantry Badge and the Silver Rifle. This is a most respected badge and is worn only by Combat Infantry or Special Forces soldiers. Direct combat action with enemy forces is required to earn this award. Mr. Reynolds's discharge papers authorized him his badge and he was told it would be sent to him in the mail. When the war was over, this was overlooked and his silver rifle never arrived. During preparations for the 2004 Homecoming this oversight was discovered by MSgt Kenneth Welch, US Army, Retired. He contacted the proper authorities and after 59 years, Mr. Reynolds received the silver rifle to a cheering crowd during the general assembly of Homecoming activities at Gorman High School.

A PROSPEROUS COMMUNITY

By the blessing of the upright a city is exalted, but by the mouth of the wicked it is torn down. (Proverb 11:11)

Here we find two prerequisites to a blessed life and city. The verse speaks of blessing (meaning positive, life-giving words), and, uprightness (meaning lifestyles of truth and integrity). Experiencing the favor and prosperity of God demands both life-giving words that come from lives of integrity and uprightness.

The Bible says that "death and life are in the power of the tongue..." (Proverb 18:21) Indeed, the words we say can bring peace or strife, blessing or destruction. How many of us have felt the pain of harsh words? Lifelong friendships can be destroyed with one mouthful of words.

But talk can also be cheap. Flattery has no real moral power. The Bible says that, "The wisdom from above is first of all pure, then peaceable..." (James 3:17) Purity and uprightness are just as essential as peace. Truth is not always popular. The best medicine sometimes tastes terrible! However, the truth if spoken in God's way comes forth with a motive of peace and healing.

God's truth and God's peace always meet in the middle.

That's why Christ's death on the Cross is central to the Christian faith. God made peace with sinners when Jesus died...but not at the expense of truth and integrity. The truth was that all of us have sinned and deserve to be confronted and judged for our sin. God did not overlook sin or refuse to deal with the facts. He confronted sin right out in the open and made peace at the same time! This is the glory of the gospel: God can judge sin and yet be affirming and merciful to sinners at the same time!

For a city (or a life, a marriage, a business, a church, a school, etc.) to prosper under God's blessing, we must do the same. We must be positive and affirming people. But we must also be willing to confront what we believe to be unethical issues in our own lives and in our community. It's so much easier to embrace only one of these two components. But we do so at a great personal and corporate expense.

#### **Three Eastland County Businesses Raided**

On May 26, 2005, the law of Texas, not to mention the law of averages - caught up with the owners of illegal gambling devices and games rooms in Eastland County.

Shortly after 6 p.m., teams of law enforcement agents from Eastland, Midland, San Angelo, Lubbock and the DPS Special Crimes Unit simultaneously executed search warrants on two games rooms in Eastland and one in Ranger.

Spurred on by a growing number of complaints from residents, members of the State's Special Crimes Unit launched an undercover operation that eventually culminated in the busts. During the raids, officers confiscated cash, documents and three to four devices from each facility and disabled the rest. The seized devices are being stored as evidence for later prosecution. According to sources from the District Attorney's Office, the investigation is ongoing.

Patrons of the establishments were briefly detained and questioned none were arrested or charged related to gambling. One patron was arrested when it was discovered that she had a controlled substance, methamphetamine, on her person.

Last year, the Texas Supreme Court ruled that 8-liner game rooms violated state law. The ruling gave law enforcement agents a clear mandate to shut down any game room handing out winnings in cash or cash equivalents. Under Texas law, a gaming operation isn't allowed to give out cash or prizes worth more than \$5.

While some people may believe that limit to be too restrictive, Sheriff Wayne Bradford stated, "No future gaming operation should make the mistake of thinking that law enforcement will look the other way. The legislators write the laws and it is our job to enforce them."


"There may be some people who will question these raids and say that these are harmless games being played by consenting adults, District Attorney Russ Thomason said, but these particular games prey on people who can least afford the losses."

> Tres Leches Cake **Prep Time: 15 Minutes Start to Finish:** 3 Hours, 40 Minutes

1 cup flaked coconut,

toasted

4 eggs % cup sugar

4 cup cold water 1 teaspoon vanilla 1 cup Gold Medal all-

purpose flour 1 teaspoon baking powder

4 teaspoon salt **Tres Leches Sauce** 

Sweetened Whipped

1 pound sliced strawberries 5 kiwifruit, peeled and chopped

1. Place coconut in ungreased shallow pan and toast for 5 to 7 minutes, stirring occasionally, until golden brown; set aside to use for topping. Heat oven to 350° F. Grease bottom and sides of 11 x 7-inch glass baking dish with shortening or spray with cooking spray. In large bowl, beat



eggs with electric mixer on high speed until frothy. Gradually beat in sugar; beat on high speed about 5 minutes or until very thick and lemon colored. Beat in water and vanilla on low speed. Gradually add flour, baking powder and salt, beating just until batter is smooth. Pour into pan.

2. Bake 20 to 25 minutes or until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool 1 hour on wire rack.

3. Make Tres Leches Sauce. Poke top of cake all over with toothpick or fork; slowly pour sauce over cake, allowing it to soak in. Cover and refrigerate at least 2 hours until most of the sauce is absorbed. Serve cake topped with Sweetened Whipped Cream, coconut, strawberries and kiwifruit.

1 can (14 ounces) sweetened condensed milk

1 cup whipping (heavy) cream

½ cup canned cream of coconut (not coconut milk)

3 tablespoons light rum or 1 tablespoon vanilla

In medium bowl, stir together all ingredients. Refrigerate until ready to use.

**Sweetened Whipped Cream** 

1 cup whipping (heavy)

½ teaspoon vanilla

2 tablespoons powdered

In chilled small bowl, beat all ingredients with electric mixer on high speed until soft

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
