She was born in 1923 in the New Hope community and attended school both in New Hope and Gorman High School. Nell is a daughter of the pioneer family of George and Ozy Hallmark and is the sister of Gorman resident Joy Hallmark Rogers. Nell was married in 1941 to Arlin (Red) Alldredge. These were war years and her husband served in Germany in World War II. The couple lived in Gorman, Andrews, and Midland Texas before their move to Rogers Arkansas. Then, after a span of time in West Plains, Missouri they moved back to Eastland County. The couple has four children. They are Pat Alldredge Pockrus and family of Ranger; Eddie Alldredge and family of California; Judy Alldredge Layfield and family of Graham and Sandra Alldredge Barnes and family of Humble, Texas. Local grandchildren include her granddaughter Angela and Bill Underwood of Gorman. Nell has an extensive work record as part of her membership at the Daugherty Street Church of Christ in Eastland. She was a member of the Ladies Bible Class, taught in children's education and used her extensive talents in benevolent work in the church. An accomplished seamstress, Nell has made more than 100 bedspreads and 45 quilts for the church's Mexico mission efforts. She also volunteered in the church's clothing service outreach. In addition to her church work sewing efforts, she has made more than 100 personal quilts for friends and family. At a going away party in the Eastland church in March, a plaque was presented to her that read:

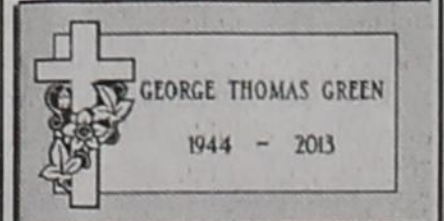

## Neugebauer Announces Location For Texas Farm Bill Hearing

Congressman Randy Neugebauer announced Thursday that the House Agriculture Committee will hold its Texas Farm Bill field hearing in San Angelo on Tuesday, May 9.

Over the past few months, Neugebauer had been working with the Committee and his fellow colleagues in the West Texas congressional delegation to hold one of the hearings in the region. The exact time and location of the San Angelo hearing remain undetermined.

Neugebauer noted that it makes sense for the Committee to visit West Texas. "West Texas is the heart of Texas agriculture so I am pleased that the Lone Star state's Farm Bill field hearing will be held in a West Texas city," Neugebauer said.

Similar field hearings have already been held in North Carolina, Alabama, California, Nebraska, and Georgia.

"As I have been attending these hearings across the country, the Committee has been receiving valuable input from producers on what the future of federal agriculture policy should look like," Neugebauer said. "This hearing will give West Texas agriculture the opportunity to have its views heard."

The San Angelo hearing will be the second opportunity for West Texas producers to express their views on the 2007 Farm Bill in person with the nation's top agriculture officials. In October 2005, Neugebauer hosted U.S. Agriculture Secretary Mike Johanns at a public forum in Lubbock.

## April Is Child Abuse Prevention Month

April is Child Abuse Prevention Month, a time to focus on the protection and care of our most vulnerable and trusting resources - our children. Governor Perry has proclaimed April Child Abuse Prevention Month in Texas.

Child Abuse Prevention Month has been observed each April since its first presidential proclamation in 1983. Since that time, individuals and organizations have joined during April to raise the public's awareness of child abuse and its prevention.

Nearly 200,000 Texas children are reported as abused or neglected every year, according to Child Protective Services, a division of the Texas Department of Family and Protective Services. April is child abuse prevention month in Texas and in the nation.

"It's a time to focus on ways not only to protect children but also to prevent abuse from ever occurring," said Wendell Teltow, Executive Director for Prevent Child Abuse Texas. "This is our opportunity to make a difference in young lives."

Neglect is the most frequent form of child abuse, according to the state agency charged with protecting children.

"Yes, children die simply because they're put in situations where they are not supervised," said Teltow. "But parent's are not alone. We need to raise the public's awareness of these distressing statistics, and to encourage people to become involved in the prevention of child abuse. One small, but public way of showing your support, is wearing a blue ribbon during April. Remember, children are helpless, you are not."

According to Prevent Child Abuse America forty-three percent of American parents report spanking or hitting their child, 37 percent report insulting or swearing at their child, and two percent report having kicked, bit or punched their child. More than 3 million children were reported to child protective service agencies as alleged victims of child abuse or neglect each year, and approximately 1 million of these reports are confirmed.

The presidential declaration made individual assistance available to affected individuals and businesses in the counties of Anderson, Bastrop, Callahan, Cooke, Deaf Smith, Eastland, Erath, Hood, Montague, Palo Pinto, Parker, Tarrant and Wise.

Disaster Recovery Summary as of close of business March 30, 2006: **418 individuals** have registered for Individual Assistance.

**\$1,124,039** has been approved through the Individuals and Household Program. Of that, FEMA has provided \$582,255 in Individual Assistance and \$541,784 in Other Needs Assistance.

**\$2,853,500 in loans** have been approved by the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) for individuals and businesses affected by the Texas Wildfires.

**245 home inspections** have been requested. 244 have been completed.

**\$1.6 million** has been obligated in Public Assistance by FEMA to the State of Texas to reimburse local governments and agencies for eligible and documented expenses related to emergency protective measures associated with the Texas wildfires.

**WILDFIRE SUMMARY:** Since Dec. 26, 2005, Texas has had 11,044 fire starts. There is currently one active fire. During this period, 4,902,824 acres have burned, 423 homes have been destroyed and 4,845 homes have been saved.

### House Ag Committee to Visit West Texas

The big news last week was the announcement that the House Agriculture Committee will hold a Farm Bill field hearing in West Texas. As I had been working with the committee to hold the Texas hearing in West Texas, I welcome this good news. On May 9, committee members from across the country will gather in San Angelo to get the West Texas perspective on what policies should be included in the 2007 Farm Bill.

Through my conversations with West Texas farmers as well as with producers in other regions of the country, it is clear that many of the policies in the current Farm Bill are doing the job to provide assistance when needed. Not surprisingly, there is strong support for retaining these policies in the next Farm Bill. Although I often make this fact known in Washington, this field hearing will give other committee members the opportunity to hear it straight from those in West Texas agriculture who have to make a living under these policies everyday.

### Fire Caucus

Last week, I officially joined the Congressional Fire and Emergency Services Caucus. The Fire Caucus, as it is known on Capitol Hill, works to bring attention to first responder issues and to advocate legislation that provides them with the resources they need to protect our communities.

Events in recent years have highlighted the importance of firefighters and other first responders in towns throughout America. The terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001 proved that firefighters are an integral part of the War on Terror. More recently, wildfires from Eastland to Deaf Smith Counties have affected much of the 19th District. These events demonstrate how all communities - urban and rural, small and large - depend on first responders for public safety. I look forward to taking an active role in developing policies that reflect this reality.
