The Lady Panther powerlifting team took 3rd place at a very competitive Perrin meet while the boys finished 5th against some quality competition. There were over 150 lifters at the meet and 12 schools represented. The Lady Panthers finished behind Santo and Springtown while the boys placed behind Millsap, Perrin, Santo,

The Lady Panthers had 5 girls place. April Voyles placed 2nd in the 114 division with a season best total of 455 lbs. Sharla Perez posted her season high total of 570 lbs to take 2nd in the 123 division. Finishing just behind Sharla in the 123 division was Megan Lewis who totaled a season best 560 lbs. Kendra Swanner earned 1st place in the 165 division with a career best 695 lbs. Rosa Herrera took 1st in the 181 division with a career best total of 665 lbs. Others that competed were Tecia Jones and Nikki Keith. The Ladies had two lifters set meet records. Kendra Swanner broke the previous records for the 165 division in the bench press (she lifted 120, old record was 115 set by Kendra Swanner in 2005), the deadlift (she lifted 335 lbs, old record was 295 set by Kendra Swanner in 2005), and overall total (she totaled 695, old record was 625 set by Kendra Swanner in 2005). Sharla Perez also set the meet record in the bench press for 123 division in the bench press (she lifted 125, old record was 115 set by Sharla Perez in 2005). The girls continue to improve and position themselves for a possible trip to Regionals.

The Panthers had 4 boys place at the meet. Daniel Shirley lifted his career best by totaling 775 lbs to take 1st place in the 123 division. Pete Ramirez also lifted his career best total by amassing 1095 lbs for 1st place in the 181 division. Zach Bryan took 6th in the 181 division with a total of 950 lbs. Seth Johnson totaled a career best 1160 lbs and finished 2nd in the 275 division. Also competing was David Ibarra who dead lifted a all-time personal best of 445 lbs.

The Powerlifting teams will travel to Winters for the Blizzard Invitational this Saturday February 11th. Lifting will begin around 9:00 am. This will be the last meet for the full teams as the Last Qualifier Meet in the Strawn on February 25th will be for those that are close to qualifying for Regional or those that must protect their standings in order to qualify for Regional. The girls Regional will be in Abilene (McMurry University) on March 4th and the boys will have Regional at Brownfield High School on March 11th.

Dodge Jones Foundation Emergency Grant Benefits Big Country VFDs

ABILENE, Texas—Overtaxed volunteer firefighters in the Big Country region of West Texas are receiving a welcome boost, thanks to the generosity of the Dodge Jones Foundation, based in Abilene. The foundation made emergency grant funding available through the Texas Forest Service to help replenish equipment and protective gear for 106 fire departments in 22 counties, which each have a \$2,500 grant awaiting them.

"The Dodge Jones Foundation came to us during the height of the wildfire siege and asked what they could do to address the immediate needs of the departments in the Big Country region," said Texas Forest Service Director James Hull. "By giving each department a grant for \$2,500, each one can purchase the items most vital to their continued operation, such as personal protective gear, replacement pumps and vehicle repairs. This will be a great benefit to their communities and the thousands of Texans they serve."

Most of these 106 volunteer fire departments (VFDs) are the first responders to wildfires in their areas, and they have seen more than their share of the state's largest and most destructive fires during the recent wildfire siege. Many of these departments responded to the 35,300-acre Carbon Fire and the 7,600-acre Cross Roads Fire that burned through the town of

"This has been a tough fire season, and we're a very small department, only four years old, so we're grateful for any help we can get," said Fire Chief Raymond Helberg with Promontory Park VFD in Comanche County. "We lost all our wildland firefighting gear when our brush truck was burned over on the Carbon Fire. All of our wildland hose, nozzles, everything burned up including our medical supplies. It was quite a loss. We were fortunate that our firefighters only received 2nd degree burns, and they're both fine

The Dodge Jones Foundation gift will provide emergency individual grant funds to volunteer fire departments in the following counties: Brown, Callahan, Coke, Coleman, Comanche, Eastland, Erath, Fisher, Haskell, Irion, Jones, Mitchell, Nolan, Reagan, Runnels, Scurry, Shackelford, Stephens, Sterling, Taylor, Throckmorton and Tom Green.

To the Parents and Students of Gorman and Eastland County:

As an educational consultant who has visited numerous schools in Texas as well as presented to a wide variety of Educational Conferences at all levels, I have a unique perspective on the TAKS. The problem is -- No one is empowering the student. We are telling the students what they should know or do, making the students defensive and at times scared, irritated or confused. It is just like the old saying: If you give them a fish, you feed them for a day; if you teach them how to fish, you have fed them for a lifetime. But if you beat them over the head with the fish, they begin to hate the whole process and everyone begins to stink. Test-taking skills, that are unique to standardized tests, are not being taught in our schools; and they can be fun. The latest brain research that shows how whole-brain techniques reach all learning styles are not being embraced; and they can be fun. Do not blame the schools but do not make yourself totally dependent on their timetables. The average teacher in Texas has 3.5 minutes per student per day to answer questions. This is not enough time for most students. Also a good coach knows that a student has the best chance to win a race when that student practices in the exact conditions of the real thing. So....Parents and Students who are reading this.....Do you want to not only pass the TAKS but to make Commended Performance on it? Go to the TEA website (www.tea.state.tx.us/ student. assessment/resources/release/) and download three copies of the released TAKS tests along with the answers. Two copies should be grade appropriate and one test should be one grade above the level of the student. The student then goes through the first test and decides which questions are clear, which are confusing, which have what are called distracters or mental traps. Working through three tests one question at a time and checking the answer immediately helps the brain record only the information and format that is correct. Problems should be spaced out over the three weeks prior to the test. The student is in control. There is no incorrect learning and the

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

TEXAS WILDFIRE VICTIMS WARNED OF CON ARTISTS

AUSTIN, Texas - Federal and state officials caution Texans who lost homes or other property to the recent wildfires that unscrupulous contractors prey on disaster victims.

"After wildfires claimed three lives, burned 589,000 acres and damaged more than 345 homes, victims are now faced with a Human Disaster...fraudulent contractors," said Federal Coordinating Officer Sandy Coachman. "Federal law enforces strict penalties for those who would commit crimes against disaster victims."

"Sadly, scam artists take advantage of tragedies such as these, seeking to cheat victims who are trying to rebuild their lives," said Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott. "I urge Texans who have suffered damage from these wildfires to be careful when deciding whom to hire to repair their damaged property."

* Get more than one estimate and don't be pushed into signing a contract immediately.

* Ask the Better Business Bureau if the company has had any complaints. * Get references from the previous customers and check them out.

* Get the salesperson's license plate number.

Abbott offered the following tips:

* Deal with local firms, if possible. * Get everything in writing and keep these documents in a safe place.

* Do not sign a contract with blank spaces. Dishonest salespersons may enter unacceptable terms later.

* Ask for proof of insurance.

* Never pay 100 percent up front. Arrange for an independent agent to inspect the completed work before making full payment.

* Ask whether the contractor will place a lien, security interest or mortgage against your property.

* Ask for guarantees in writing.

"If Texans encounter any fraud or deception, they should report it to my office. I will not stand for dishonest businesses that prey on people who already have suffered," said Attorney General Abbott.

Texans are urged to file complaints about unscrupulous contractors by calling the Consumer Protection Hotline at 1-800-252-8011 or by filing a complaint on the Attorney General's Web site at www.oag.state.tx.us. Abbott asked consumers to provide specific information about the business, including address or specific location, contact information, and the price the business advertises and the actual charges for a particu-

USDA Announces Commodity Credit Corp. Lending Rates For Feb. 2006

The interest rate for 1995 and prior crop year commodity loans disbursed by USDA's Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) during February 2006 is 4.375 percent, unchanged from January 2006. For 1996 and subsequent crop year commodity and marketing assistance loans, the interest rate for loans disbursed during February 2006 is 5.375 percent, unchanged from January 2006.

The interest rate for farm storage facility loans approved in February 2006 is 4.375 percent, unchanged from January 2006. The interest rate for sugar storage facility loans for February 2006 is 4.500 percent, down from 4.625 percent in January 2006.

The maximum discount rate applicable for February 2006 for the Tobacco Transition Payment Program is 9.0 percent. This is based on the prime rate 7.25 percent plus 2 percent, rounded to the nearest whole number.

Past monthly releases announcing interest rates charged by CCC on commodity and marketing assistance loans disbursed for that particular month reflected the interest rate the U.S. Treasury charged CCC for that month. This was the interest rate specified by CCC since Jan. 1, 1982, but the process of establishing the interest rate was changed by a provision of the Federal Agriculture Improvement and Reform Act of 1996 (the Act), enacted on April 4, 1996.

Section 163 of the Act requires that monthly interest rates applicable to commodity and marketing assistance loans are to be 100 basis points -- or 1 percent -- greater than the rate determined under the applicable interest rate formula in effect on Oct. 1, 1995. This formula resulted in a rate equivalent to the amount the U.S. Treasury charged CCC for borrowing for the month. The provisions of Section 163 of the Act are not retroactive. Accordingly, this and

subsequent monthly interest rate announcements will carry two sets of rates: one for 1995 and prior crop year commodity loans and one for 1996 and subsequent crop year commodity and marketing assistance loans.

President Bush Sends Budget Request to Congress

President Bush sent his 2007 budget request to Congress on Monday. While I differ sharply with President Bush's proposal to change payment limits for agricultural producers, his budget request to Congress indicates a continued commitment to national security and fiscal responsibility.

President Bush budget proposal for FY 2007 is fiscally responsible and sets the right priorities. He asks Congress to reduce non-security related discretionary spending while continuing to support our efforts in the War on Terror both abroad and here at home. While we are at war, an across the board pay raise for our military, developing new weapons systems, and keeping our military ready to fight the battles of tomorrow must be top priorities. And since border security is integral to national security, I support the President's proposals to add more border patrol agents and increase detention space for those who enter the country illegally.

I agree with President Bush's focus on the need to make reforms to large entitlement programs which are currently suffering from unsustainable growth rates. Congress took a good first step toward addressing these issues in the Deficit Reduction Act, and I look forward to working with the President on finding other reforms that will ensure that we can honor promises made through Medicare, Medicaid, and Social Security.

I also support the President's call for making the 2003 tax relief measures permanent, which would prevent a tax hike on families and small businesses. These sound economic policies have led to substantial economic growth and rapid increases in federal tax receipts. Allowing taxes to automatically increase would be detrimental to economic growth and job creation, and I will continue to support efforts in Congress preventing a tax hike.

However, once again the President has proposed changing payment limits for agricultural producers, and I disagree with this request. The time for debating payment limits and other changes in agriculture policy is during upcoming work in Congress to write the 2007 Farm Bill, not in the annual budget process.

As always, the President's proposal is just that, a proposal. Congress has much work to do throughout the year to pass funding bills that focus on national priorities like achieving energy independence, ensuring that our military and law enforcement personnel have the tools they need to defend our nation, and keeping America's workers competitive in the 21st century economy.

Emergency Farm Loan Applications Being Accepted

"Applications for emergency farm loans caused by drought that occurred on April 1, 2005, and continuing, are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency office located in Anson," Richard G. Young said today.

"Eastland is one of 31 contiguous counties in Texas recently named by the Secretary of Agriculture eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from drought that occurred on April 1, 2005 and continuing."

Richard G. Young said, "Farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 100% of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue the agricultural business, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 3.75 percent."

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for a FSA emergency loan," Richard G. Young said. Farmers participating in the Federal Crop Insurance Program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under the emergency designation will be accepted until September 18, 2006 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Richard G. Young said.

FSA is a credit agency of the United States Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who meet U. S. citizen requirements and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizenship requirements are met by holding a majority interest.

Texas Wildfire Disaster Recovery Aid Exceeds \$818,470

AUSTIN, Texas - On Jan. 11, 2006, President George W. Bush declared nine counties stricken by wildfires as major disaster areas in the State of Texas. The presidential declaration made individual assistance available to affected individuals and businesses in the counties of Callahan, Cooke, Eastland, Erath, Hood, Montague, Palo Pinto, Tarrant and Wise. To date, families and individuals who suffered damage from the recent Texas Wildfires have been approved to receive more than \$818,470 in assistance.

Recovery Services Summary as of close of business Feb. 1, 2006:

353 individuals have registered for Individual Assistance. \$818,470 has been approved through the Individuals and Household Program. Of that, FEMA has provided \$480,964 in Individual Assistance and \$337,506 in Other Needs Assistance.

357 applicants have visited the Disaster Recovery Centers (DRCs). 202 home inspections have been requested. 186 have been completed. Four inspectors are in the field.

Texas workers who lost their jobs due to the recent wildfires may be able to claim disaster unemployment benefits. To file a claim or to talk with a representative, eligible applicants should call the Texas Workforce Commission Hotline at 1-800-939-6631, Monday through Friday, 8 1.m. to 5 p.m.

Individuals and business owners located in the nine counties and who sustained losses shuld registers with FEMA by calling 1-800-621-FEMA (3362) or TTY 1-800-462-7585 for the hearing- and speech-impaired. Registrations also can be made online at www.fema.gov.
