her a bouquet of red roses. Reminiscing of school days spent at GHS continued with Woodrow Browning calling on exes to tell about themselves and what they have been doing since they attended Gorman Schools.

We came with a sense of excitement, thankful for the confidence given us

by your, and thankful for the honor of being able to serve the Lord in a church while college students.

After being here for several months, Lisa and I had sincerely fallen in love with many people; and after graduating from Howard Payne, felt the need and had the desire to make our home here, so that we could minister more effectively, and give more time to the church. Our ministry grew both in size and in depth. I truly thank God for the growth that was seen in people's lives, and in the young people, for being so teachable, having a desire to grow.

Roby came and graciously supported me, and asked me to remain as youth minister until he was established as the pastor. I wish to thank Bro. Roby for his confidence and support of me, but I now feel that the time has come to devote more time to my seminary education, and to my wife and family (my parents). At this time I am submitting this letter of resignation as youth minister to the church effective Sunday, November 21, 1976.

This is a very painful decision for Lisa and I to make for we have grown to love so many people in this community. But God has assured me that His work here can get along well without me, and I'm sure it will.

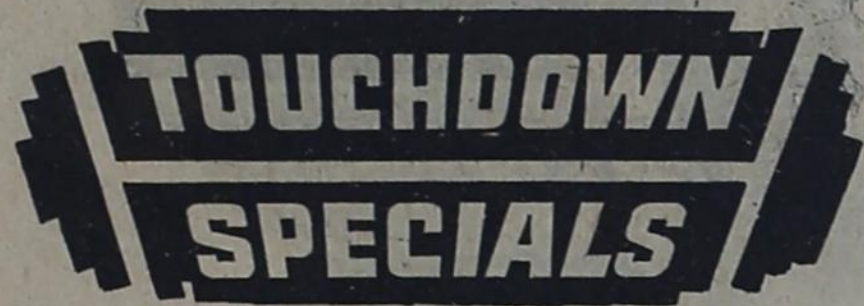

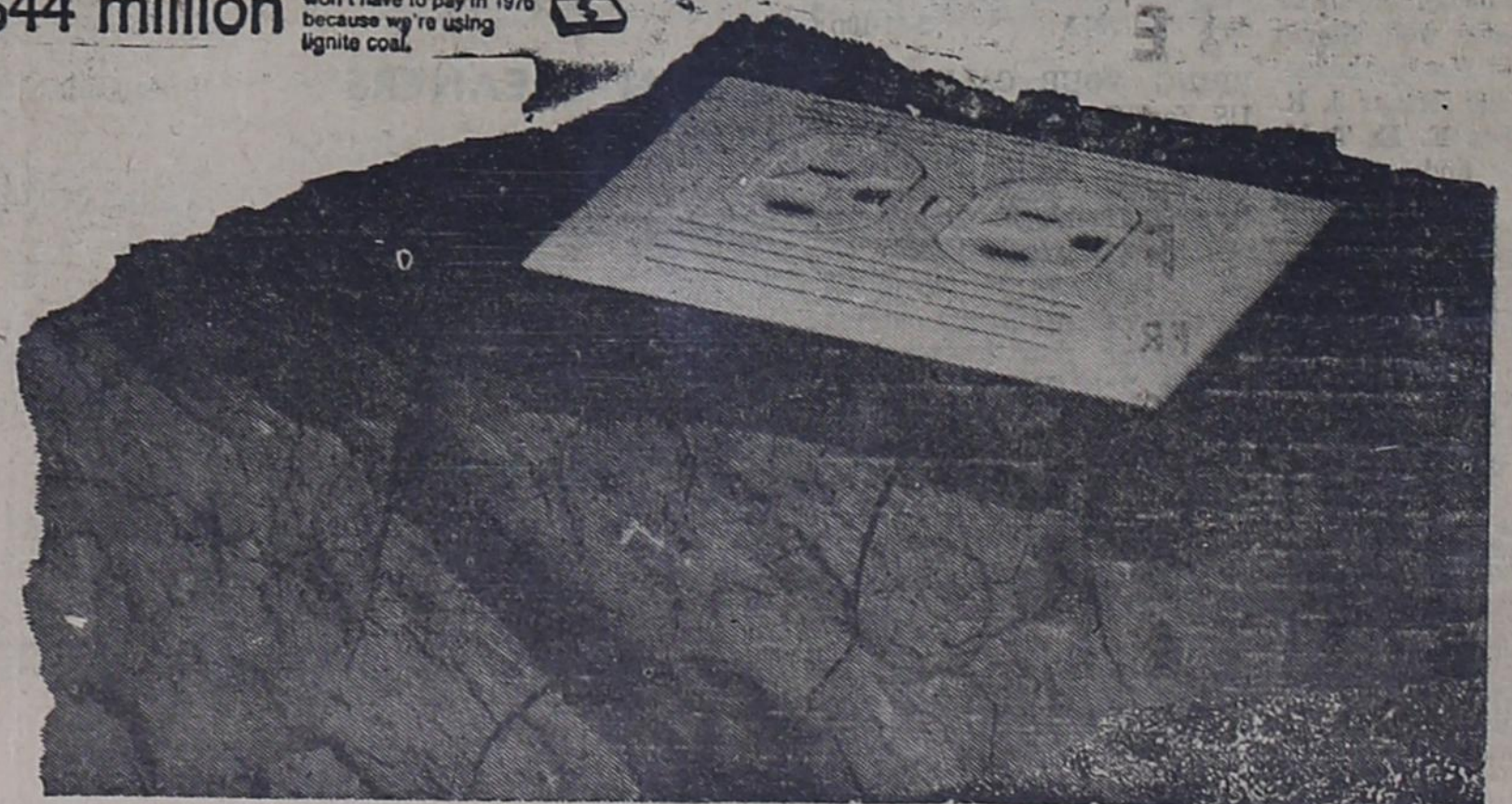

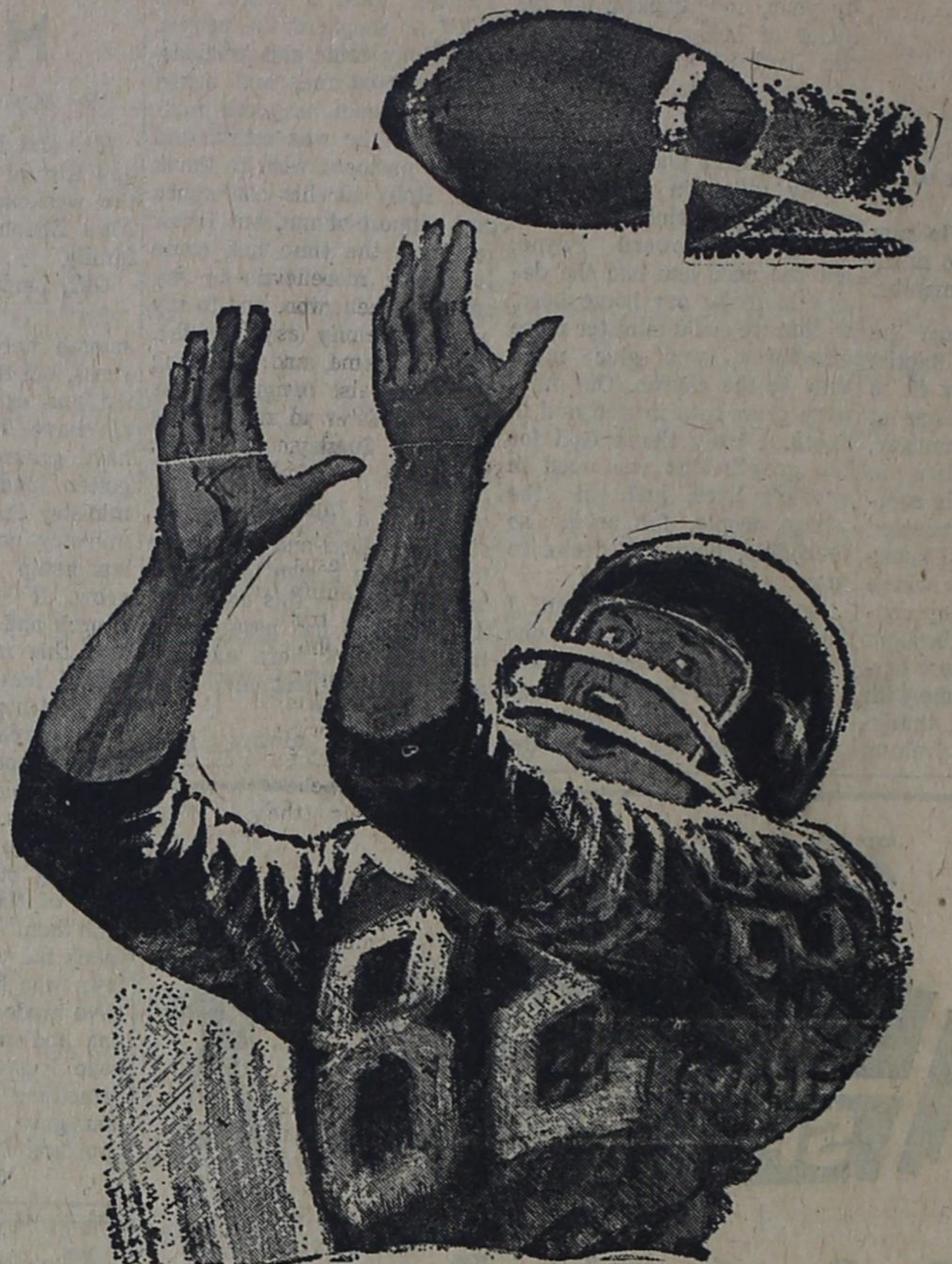

(II John 10-11).
4. The practice of division will condemn a person. John has warned: "Whosoever trans gresseth, and abideth not in the doctrine of Christ, hath not God." (II John 9).

When Christ prayed for unity, He prayed "that the world may believe that thou hast sent me." One reason for our Saviour's desire for oneness was that through it the world might be brought to believe in Him as the Son of

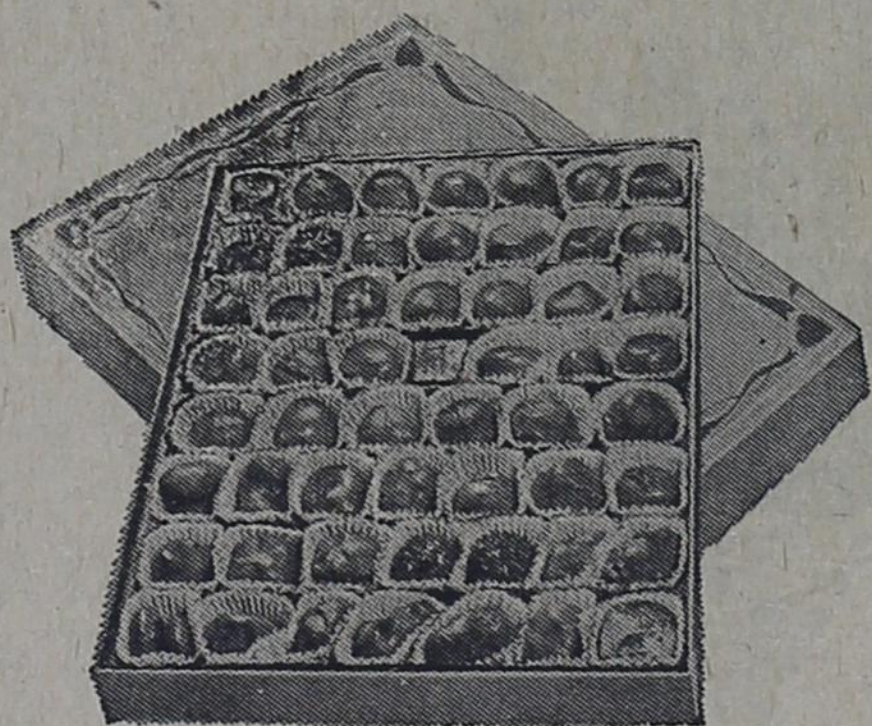

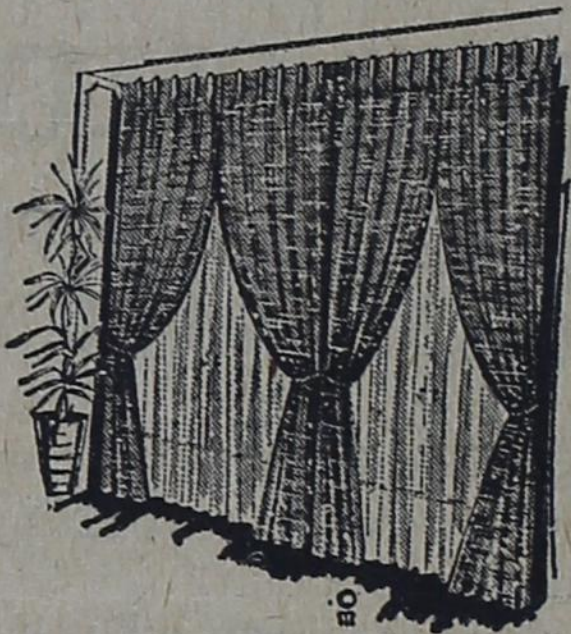
