Panthers Shock Eagles; Play At Ranger Friday

The Gorman Panthers thrilled the Homecoming Exes while shocking the Sterling City Eagles 40 to 30 at Brogdon Field on Friday night. The Panthers jumped out to an 18-12 first quarter lead, then added 14 points in the second while holding the Eagles scoreless in the second for a 32-12 lead at halftime. Then held off an Eagle comeback in the last half and added a victory securing touchdown in the final minutes of the fourth quarter for a 40-30 win.

The Panthers started out on a good note on Friday night when they received the opening kickoff on their own 20 and scored in 7 plays with Matt Underwood scoring from 3 yards out with 9:15 left in the period. The drive featured runs of 2, 5, and 3 by Underwood and runs of 45 and 15 by Reggie Sanchez and a 9 yarder by Zack Fox. The run for points failed and the Panthers led 6-0.

Then on the ensuing kickoff the Panthers covered the free ball on the Eagle 31 and went the distance in 5 plays with Tyson Swanner running in from 21 yards with 7:34 left. The drive featured runs 3 by Fox, 4 and 3 by Sanchez. Again the try for 2 points failed and Gorman led 12-0.

Then the Eagles took the ball on the Gorman 20 after a long run back of the kickoff by Joshua Fitchett. From there the Eagles scored in 4 plays with Joel Galaviz going in from 9 yards out with 5:15 left in the first period. The kick try failed and the score was 12-6.

But on the next possession the Panthers got the ball on their own 28 and scored in just four plays with Underwood breaking free up the middle for a beautiful 62 yard gallop with 2:52 left in the first. The Panthers overcome a 10 yard penalty on the drive. Underwood ran for 1 and 17 and Sanchez got 2. The try for 2 points failed and Gorman led 18-6.

Then the big bomb went off when Fitchett caught the following kickoff on his own 20 and raced for 80 yards for the score. The try for point failed and the score was 18-12.

After exchanging possessions the Big Red got the ball on an Eagle fumble on their own 15 and scored in 5 plays with Sanchez breaking loose for the final 23 with 6:05 left in the half. The drive featured a 14 yard by Orlando Valenzuela, runs of 1 and 1 by Swanner and 46 by Sanchez. Valenzuela ran for the 2 pointer to make the score 26-12.

The Panthers got another break when they recovered an Eagle fumble on the Gorman 48 and the Big Red scored in 11 plays with Sanchez getting the honors from 10 yards out with 3 seconds left in the half. The drive featured runs of 16, -5, 6 and 6 by Sanchez and 8, 1 and 4 by Underwood and 4 and 1 by Swanner. The run for points failed and Gorman was up 32-12.

The Eagles got a break when the Panthers fumbled the snap on a punt try, giving the Eagles 2 points when they tackled Swanner in the end zone in the third period for a Safety. Score 32-14.

The Eagles got the ball on their own 3 and scored in just 3 plays with Fitchett going in from 21 yards out with 11:47 left in the game. The drive featured a pass of 69 yards to Joel Galaviz. The Eagles added the 2 pointer on a run by Fitchett and the score was 32-22.

The Eagles got the ball again on a Panther fumble on the Gorman 48 and moved the distance in 4 plays with Fitchett racing in from 40 yards out with 9:41 left. Fitchett added the 2 pointer on a run and the score rose to 32-30.


But the Panthers get the victory securing score on a beautiful time killing drive of 75 yards in 14 plays with Zack Fox getting the final 5 on a run with 1:06 left. A pass try Fox added the 2 pointer and Gorman was up 40-30. This was a fantastic drive by the Panthers when the game was in doubt.

Sanchez led the Panthers with

176 yards on 18 carries. Underwood got 142 on 22 totes. Fox had 54 on 5 runs. Tony Perez had 26 on 5. Valenzuela got 14 on 1 try and Swanner got 11 on 10 keepers.

This was a great effort by the Panthers, who are getting more experience with the new offense and defense. They will need another yeoman effort this week when they take on the highly rated Ranger Bulldogs at Ranger, Friday night at 7:30. Let's all travel to Ranger and back our Panthers to victory.

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Wrangler's Defense Helps Keep #13 CJC Undefeated

The Cisco Junior College Wranglers spoiled "family night" in Athens at Bruce Field against Trinity Valley Community College with a 31-12 Victory Saturday night.

The victory keeps CJC undefeated for the season at 5-0 and moves their SouthWest Junior College Football Conference record to 2-0. The TVCC Cardinals fall to 1-4 and 1-1 in conference play.

After an early TVCC fumble, Andrew Mellencamp, Freshman QB from Granbury, Tx, hooked up with Brandon Girby for a 39 yard touchdown. The Cardinals then drove deep into Wrangler territory. The defense stopped a quarterback sneak, and Freshman Kyle Smith of San Marcus, Tx stripped QB Ben McMahan of the ball, then scampered 99 yds. for a touchdown. Girby and Mellencamp teamed up to score again in the 2nd quarter, moving the lead to 21-0. Girby finished the game with 4 receptions for 85 yards, 2 Touchdowns. TVCC scored late in the 1st half on a 36 yd. touchdown pass cutting the CJC lead to 21-7.

The momentum continued for the Cardinals early in the 3rd quarter with a field goal after a blocked punt and a safety. They were driving again, when The Wrangler defense stopped a run on fourth down. This crucial stop shot a hole in the momentum. CJC then turned TVCC turnovers into 10 pts. and a victory over the pre-season favorite Cardinals.

CJC's offense was led by QB Andrew mellencamp who was 7 of 10 for 162 yards, 2 Touchdowns, 1 int. Leading the rushing attack again was Jacques Crawford, the conference's leading rusher, with 156 yards on 26 carries, an average of 6 yards a carry. He scored 1 touchdown on a 55 yard run late in the game.



Important Change In Motor Vehicle Sales Tax Law

Effective October 1, 2006

Please keep in mind that this is part of the Education Tax Reform Package that is supposed to lower the rate of your School District Tax.

Short and simple! Beginning October 1st if you buy a vehicle from an individual, you will be charged tax on either 80% of the retail value or on actual price paid, whichever is more. This applies to cars, trucks, trailers, campers, motor homes, motorcycles, dollies, etc., that are less than 25 years old, with certain exceptions. The details follow:

As part of the Education Tax Reform passed by the Texas Legislature this spring, House Bill 4 changes the way sales tax is charged for sales of most motor vehicles between private parties (non-dealer sales). A taxable value will be determined called a "standard presumptive value" (SPV). The Comptroller defines this SPV as: "The private-party transaction value of a motor vehicle, as determined by the Texas Department of Transportation based on an appropriate regional guidebook of a nationally recognized motor vehicle value guide service, or based on another motor vehicle guide publication that the department determines is appropriate if a private-party transaction value for the motor vehicle is not available from a regional guidebook."

The new law requires county tax offices to determine the sales tax due by using one of two methods, and calculating tax on the greater or:

- (1) The amount paid for the vehicle, or
- (2) 80% of the Standard Presumptive Value.

If the amount paid is less than 80% of the SPV, the buyer may establish a lower value by obtaining a "certified appraisal on a form prescribed by the State Comptroller's office from a licensed vehicle dealer or an insurance adjuster. Insurance adjusters are not limited to the amount charged for their appraisal.

A licensed vehicle dealer can appraise only the types vehicles they are licensed to sell, such as passenger car/truck, trailer, motorcycle or travel trailer. The dealers must charge on LESS THAN \$100 UP TO \$300 (motorcycles start at \$40) or a travel trailer appraisal may be up to \$500.

Current law stated on the back of a Texas title requires the SELLER to furnish the following:

- a. Title, and on the back to
- b. Fill in the name of buyer, odometer, date and sign and print names as the Seller(s).
- c. Title application (Form 130-U) and license receipt.

Current law stated on the back of a Texas title requires the BUYER to bring these to the County Tax Assessor-Collector and apply for a new title within 20 "working days".

* A certified appraisal obtained to verify a lower taxable value must be presented within 20 "working days" of the purchase date as well.

CJC Auto Tech Club To Host "Cisco's Big Dam Car Show"

The Cisco Junior College Auto Tech Club is busy preparing for its upcoming car show. Although this is the ninth year for the club sponsored car show, Jim Latson, CJC Auto Tech Instructor, said the name of the show was recently changed and that this has been a source of some confusion.

"When we changed the name to "Cisco's Big Dam Car Show" it never occurred to us that some people might misunderstand the usage of the word "dam". This is not swearing, but instead is a reference to the dam at Lake Cisco," Latson explained.

"At one time Williamson Dam was one of the largest dams in the U.S., and the Cisco Swimming Pool was billed as the largest swimming pool in the world. Although the pool has been closed for many years, it is still a very fond memory," he said.

About 12 years ago Latson served on a committee that tried to revive the Lake Cisco Park and swimming pool "We ran into an impossible problem to overcome with the EPA who said that this could not be done. In more recent years, a group of us have discussed the possibility of cleaning out the old pool and actually having the car show in it, and that is why we changed the name of the car show," Latson explained.

Latson continued by saying that now there is a working committee that is looking into cleaning out the large concrete part of the pool, clearing off the island, restoring the park, making a walking path over the dam and cleaning out the old zoo for hiking trails.

While Latson admits that it would be a huge undertaking, he and many others believe that the efforts would be well worth it. If this facility could be refurbished, it would once again become a great attraction and could be used for a multitude of events which in turn would be a boon to the Cisco economy.

"Every time I mention this to some of the old Ciscoans who remember those days, they are ready to help. Those of us who remember the sound of the water splashing, the sound of the skating rink and music echoing off of the dam could bring back that experience. Can you imagine the sound of laughter, kids playing, the sound of old cars running, and music coming from the island? Car shows are so popular today that they are in competition with each other, and some draw other than just cars would help to ensure a successful show. There are indeed lots of new things going on in Gorman. Many of you may have noticed that the old Branding Iron and Peanut Hut have sold. There will be a family moving in there as a residence with tentative plans to re-establish the Peanut Hut business. Be sure and stop by to tell them hello and welcome to our community.

Another item that sits on the horizon of improvements to our area is the upcoming GISD School Bond election. Superintendent Perry has done a good job getting the information out to the community regarding many of the bond facts. There has also been a separate organization formed known as Citizens for Gorman Children. CFGC will be helping answer questions regarding the bond election at all home football games and a couple of public meetings.

There are a couple of facts about this \$5M bond election that I feel are extremely important to make very clear.

- * Our tax rate will still be nine cents lower than 2005
- * It will not affect those on fixed income (senior citizens, etc.)
- * It will not affect the homestead exemptions on your taxes
- * This bond pays for 35% of the total project cost. NOT ONE CENT of the money will be spent until the state of Texas comes through with their 65% after January 2007.

I think these are all very important solid facts that need to be made clear. Then we can move on to the how the new facilities will enhance the education potential of our students. A new science lab, new computer lab, and fine arts classroom are long overdue. This can be the beginning of a new future for Gorman children.



Charlie led the opening prayer followed by the Pledge of Allegiance. Joe made the motion to approve the minutes as read. Charlie made a second. Motion carried 3-0.

Nathan made the motion with a second from Joe to approve the bills for payment. Motion carried 3-0.

Bill Oldham, Joy Rogers, and Ann Maxfield were present to express their concerns about the water line that runs on North Kent Street. Robert explained that a 6" cast iron line runs right under the yellow stripe on Kent St. also being the same State Hwy. 8. Mayor Ervin said that the City would continue to keep flushing the fire hydrants out.

After the second reading of Ordinance #2006-04, Levying Taxes for 2006-07, Joe made the motion to approve and adopt said ordinance. Nathan made a second. Motion carried 3-0.

Nathan made the motion to amend the Fire Dept. budget to make the proper adjustments for the increase of fuel charges and to reflect the amount reimbursed by the fire department. Charlie made a second. Motion carried 3-0.
