The focus of this years conference will be on producing peanuts more efficiently. Several experts in peanut production are scheduled to assist with the program presentation. The event will end with a panel discussion with questions fielded from the audience to the specialist and to a selected group of efficient peanut growers.

Top Spanish and Runner Growers from the area will be recognized and awarded plaques plus receive a special peanut industry trip for producing the top grades in the multi-county area.

A Drip Irrigation Seminar has been set for Thursday, January 12, 1995 at the Comanche Community Center on Hwy. 377 in Comanche. The Drip Irrigation Seminar is sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension service and Submatic Cemetery. Austin, Inc.

The Drip Irrigation Seminar will include many important aspects of drip irrigation that will help anyone with an interest in applying this water saving technology to their production system. Pecan, vegetable, melon and field crop producers have all found ways to adapt and use Callison of Corpus Christi and Larry the benefits drip irrigation offers to any production agriculture enter-

The seminar will begin with an overview of drip/micro irrigation including a look at ways other production areas in Texas are using drip. System make up will be covered next including "Re-inventing the Wheel", "How To Buy A System To Meet Your Needs" and an "Overview of System Components". Management of drip systems will include "Guidelines to Practical Drip Irrigation and Fertigation" and will be the last topice for the morning program.

The afternoon session will include crop specifics for producers of field crops such as melons or peanuts and for permanent crops like pecans. Producers will be able to get specific application questions answered in this session so that they can go away from the seminar with plans for drip irrigation use in their own farm situation.

Speakers for the Drip Irrigation Seminar include drip/micro irriga tion engineers as well as Robin Franks, Research and Development ingineer, Netafim, Inc.







Marty Baker, Extension Horticulturist to discuss "Cucurbit Crops and Varieties to Consider." Mr. Baker has extensive experience in growing cucurbit crops from his work in East Texas vegetable fields. Dr. Nancy Roe, Extension Horticulturist in Central Texas will cover "Crop Establishment and Production Techniques for Selected Cucurbits".
