The Boys led by a strong field performance in the jumps with Zack Fox and Tyson Swanner leading the way in both the Triple and High Jump. Fox finished 1st in High Jump and 2nd in Triple Jump. Swanner finished 3rd in both the high jump and triple jumps. Brandi Carlton led the girl's team in field events scoring in both the high jump and triple as well. Carlton received medals in the 400 and 800 meter run finishing first. Carlton was also part of the 4 x 400 relay that took 2nd place. The four girls were Carlton, Tecia Jones, Angie Silva and Audrey Johnston. The Boys team took first in the 4 x 400 relay with senior David Ibarra, Matt Underwood, Tyson Swanner and Zack Fox. Tony Perez and Reji Sanchez took home hardware in the 100 meter dash finishing 2nd and 3rd respectively. Both Perez and sanchez along with Underwood and Fox pointed in the Spring Relay as well. The girls also were led in the distance races by Crystal Thackerson and Mary Powell finished one and two in the 3200 meter run and 2nd and 3rd in the 1600 meter run. Senior boy Ty Vaughn placed in both the 100 and 200 meter dash. Carlos Palacios placed 5th in the 800

Senior David Ibarra won the 400 meter dash and started the 4 x 400 relay that shaved off seven seconds on the previous weeks time at Cross Plains where they took 1st place. The time of 3:40.06 was well ahead of 2nd place Ranger. The 4 x 100 took 2nd and the Boys 4 x 200 took the silver for the 2nd straight week behind Ranger but still knocked off over two seconds from the previous week.

The Boys and Girls teams will be off for Spring Break but will be back in action the following week in Gorman on Saturday, March the 24th with the Field Events beginning at 9 a.m. The Running should begin around 10:30. Hope to see you all at the Track.





Eastland County Shooting One Person Shot and Killed

Trip to Iraq

PUBLIC NOTICE **BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENT** CONSTITUTIONAL **AMENDMENT** SPECIAL ELECTION MAY 12, 2007

PROPOSITION 1 (SJR 13)

SJR 13 would amend the Constitution to authorize the legislature to adjust the public school ad valorem tax or tax rates for taxpayers who are aged 65 or older, or are disabled, and who are owners of an exempted homestead. The amendment would thereby allow the legislature to provide tax relief to such elderly or disabled taxpayers who did not receive tax relief as a result of the school tax rate reduction passed in the 79th Legislature, 3rd called session.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for a reduction of the limitation on the total amount of ad valorem taxes that may be imposed for public school purposes on the residence homesteads of the elderly or disabled to reflect any reduction in the rate of those taxes for the 2006 and 2007 tax years."

SENATOR HUTCHISON STATEMENT ON BROOKE **ARMY MEDICAL CENTER**

WASHINGTON, DC -- Senator Kay Bailey Hutchison (R-TX), Ranking Member of the Military Construction and Veterans Affairs Appropriations Subcommittee, released the following statement today regarding Brooke Army Medical Center:

However, I have since received a commitment from Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid to restore this critical funding in another measure and I intend to hold him to

SENATOR HUTCHISON APPLAUDS COURT RULING STRIKING DOWN D.C. GUN BAN

Will reintroduce legislation to repeal existing ban

WASHINGTON, DC -- Senator Kay Bailey Hutchison (R-TX)

today applauded a ruling issued by the U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit in which the court struck down Washington, D.C.'s ban on the use of firearms for self-defense.

"I agree with the court that the Constitution guarantees law-abiding citizens the right to bear arms and defend themselves," said Sen. Hutchison. "That is why next week I will reintroduce my legislation to repeal the existing ban. Protection of constitutional rights does not cease when you cross into the borders of the District of Columbia.

"Not only is Washington, D.C.'s gun ban unconstitutional, but it also has been a public policy failure as seen in the rise in crime since its enactment. The time has finally come to change course."

The District of Columbia enacted the Firearms and Control Regulations Act in 1975 and has some of the most restrictive gun control laws in the nation. Prior to the gun ban's implementation, the murder rate in the District was on the decline. Following the ban, the murder rate began to rise and had tripled by 1991, while violent crime was decreasing nationally.

CORNYN RENEWS EFFORT TO STRENGTHEN OPEN GOVERNMENT

Introduces Bipartisan Legislation to Reform Freedom of Information Act

WASHINGTON - Building on his efforts to strengthen public access to government information, U.S. Sen. John Cornyn (R-Texas), a member of the Senate Judiciary Committee, today joined Senate Judiciary Committee Chairman Patrick Leahy (D-Vt.) in introducing the bipartisan OPEN Government Act of 2007, S. 849, which would make the most significant reforms of the Freedom of Information Act in more than a decade. This renewed effort comes during the third annual Sunshine Week, a week devoted to creating a dialogue about government transparency and the public's ability to access information.

At a press conference on Capitol Hill today, Sen. Cornyn said, "Freedom of information and openness in government are among the most fundamental founding principles of our government. Accountability is only an empty promise without transparency. Our legislation will provide citizens and journalists with more information and make our great American democracy even stronger. It strengthens the view that the Freedom of Information Act establishes a presumption of openness, and that our government is based not on the need to know, but upon fundamental right to know."

Sen. Cornyn added: "Open government is an ethic. The citizen on the telephone asking about a three-year-old FOIA request isn't a nuisance to be placed on hold; in fact, he or she is our boss and the government needs to be accountable to him or her."


The bipartisan OPEN Government Act contains more than a dozen substantive provisions, designed to achieve the following four objectives:

- Strengthen FOIA and close loopholes
- Help FOIA requestors obtain timely responses to their: (2) requests
- Ensure that agencies have strong incentives to act on FOIA requests in a timely fashion
- Provide FOIA officials with all of the tools they need to ensure that our government remains open and accessible

Sen. Cornyn noted that Texas has one of the strongest laws in the U.S. expanding freedom of government information. "Our state is known for allowing citizens access to government records and requiring that the material be produced quickly. In the Senate, I've made a point of trying to bring some of that 'Texas sunshine' and openness to Washington. We have made some significant progress. I hope our colleagues will support this important bill."

Sen. Cornyn serves on the Armed Services, Judiciary and Budget Committees. In addition, he is Vice Chairman of the Senate Select Committee on Ethics. He serves as the top Republican on the Judiciary Committee's Immigration, Border Security and Refugees subcommittee and the Armed Services Committee's Airland subcommittee.
