Letter of Thanks

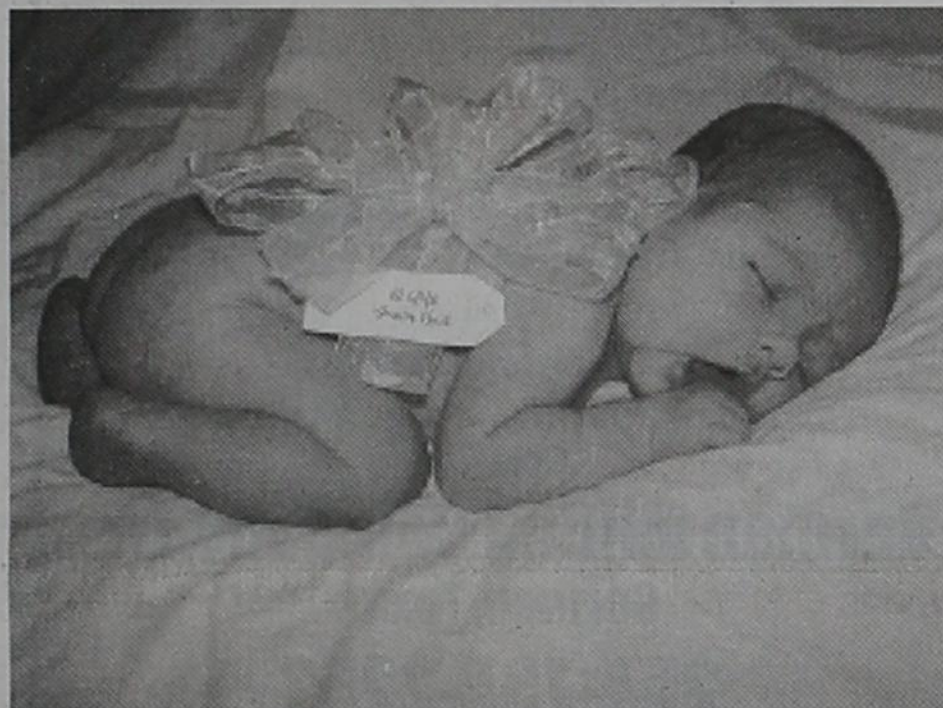

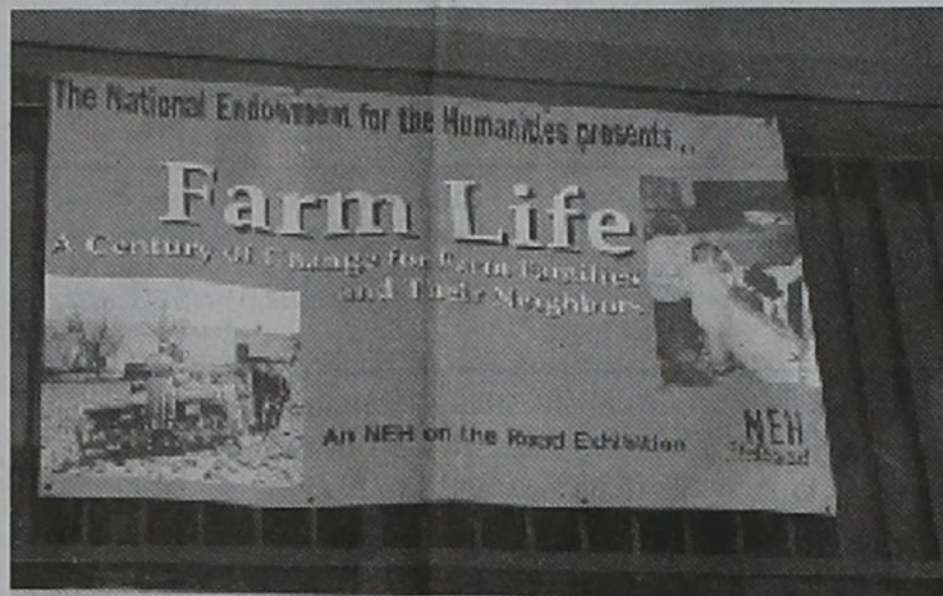

Child Passenger Safety

With Christmas just around the corner, this means that we will be traveling to see friends and family. They maybe across the state or they maybe just across town, either way we need to make sure that our kids are safe during this trip. Motor vehicle crashes are the #1 killer of kids. Why? In many cases, children are either not properly buckled into their safety seats or parents don't realize that a booster seat is vital to ensuring children fit safely in their vehicle seat belts. On average, 7 out of 10 car seats are not installed correctly. For the most part, it's only minor things, but they can become dangerous if not caught. Example, seat belt not pulled tight enough to secure the seat, seat not at the correct angle for rear-facing infants, seat turned around too soon, internal straps are not tight enough or positioned correctly, and the list can go on.

In Texas, the law states: "if the child is BOTH less than 5 years old and less than 36 inches tall, they are required to be in either a car seat or booster seat." It's recommended that infants remain rear-facing as long as possible, and that children in booster seats remain in those seats for as long as possible, at least until they reach the maximum weight limit of the seat. As with any child safety seat, they should NEVER be placed in front of an active air bag, doing so can cause serious injury to the child including death.

Children that have out grown their boosters seat and are able to sit in the vehicle seat with a seat belt should make sure that the seat belt fits them properly. Allowing the belt to ride up on the child's abdomen or neck can cause severe injuries to the child's neck and internal organs during a crash.

If you would like to have your seat checked before hitting the road for Christmas, please call our office at 254-734-5989 for a free seat inspection. If you need a seat, we still have some convertible seats and a few boosters seats left. These are free to those that are not able to purchase a new one. What better way to say, "I love you" to your child than making sure their seats are installed and working properly, or getting a new seat for them.

We want you and your family to have a safe and happy holiday season, so please set an example and buckle up.

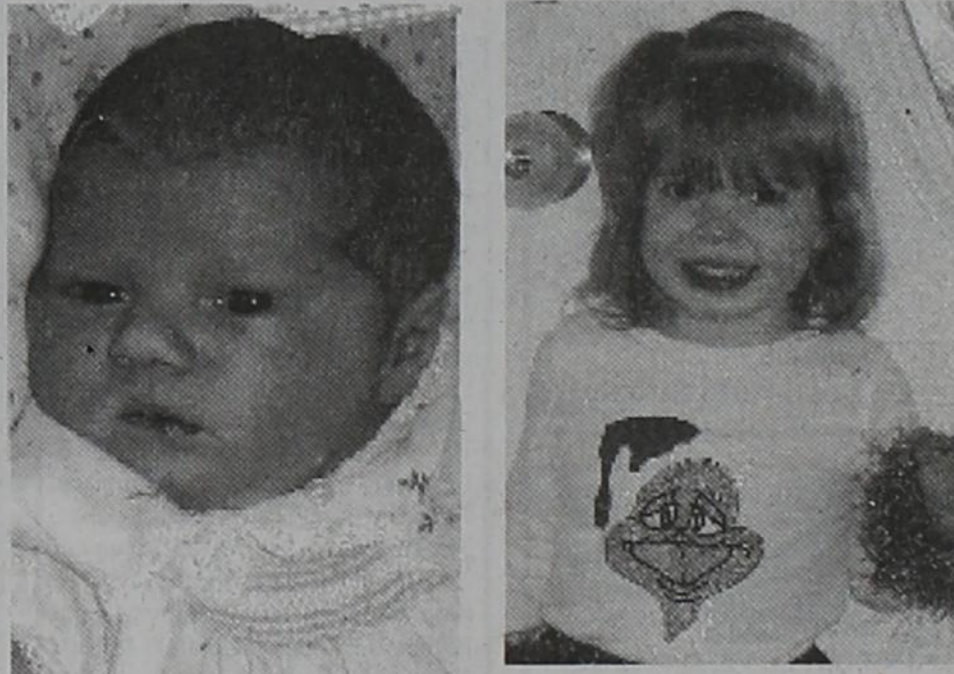
Howard & Hardin Inducted Into Alpha Chi

Super Notes

Last week I attended the annual conference of the Texas Association of Rural Schools in San Antonio of which we are a member. The conference was very informative. The first day I attended a workshop hosted by the top school finance people in the state: Omar Garcia, Doug Carr, and representative from the Equity Center of which we are also a member. Mr. Garcia is the person that keeps the funding template used by schools in Texas to calculate their annual income from state and local funds. We were given an opportunity to ask questions and to enter our data into the template to assure us we had done it properly. I am pleased to say the calculations we had made previously, on which we built our budget were within \$50.00 of the template figure. That's great since we had to do our budget in August and the supposedly final changes in the template were made last month. Also, that's \$50.00 more that we are going to get, not less.

I also received legal training from Schwartz and Eichelbaum, P.C. (our school lawyers) in the following areas: Religious Viewpoints Antidiscrimination Act, Do's and Don'ts of Campaigning, and Ethics.

We had several speakers that spoke on the subject of school finance, all of who indicated that the financial problems of schools in Texas were not solved during the last session, they only made the problem more complicated. The state cannot fund the schools in Texas at the present rate for the next four years without having a budget surplus from which to borrow. We heard from: Wayne Pierce, the director of the Equity Center (of which we are a member); Ken McCraw, the director of the Texas Association of Community Schools (of which we are a member); Johnny Veselka, (Director of the Texas Association of School Administrators), The Honorable Donna Howard, State Representative HD 48; The Honorable Dr. Diane Patrick, State Representative HD 9; The Honorable Dan Branch, Chairman of the House Select Committee on Higher and Public Education Finance; and Scott Hochberg, Vice-Chair of the House Select Committee on Higher and Public Education Finance. This was a very good conference and the information I received will help me better serve you. It is not too early for all of you to contact Representative Keffer or whoever your representative is and request that equity in school finance across the state be an important issue as well as increased funding for all schools in Texas. Teachers and all school employees in every school in Texas should be making above the national average. A move toward the national average is no sufficient and including funds for just teacher raises is not realistic. It takes all of the employees of a school district to be able to operate, not just teachers.

I know the coaches are submitting information on basketball so I won't. I would probably not get it right anyway. There were so many tournaments going on last week. I do know we ran into some stiff competition that will only help us be better when we get to district play. Our boys and girls play a fast, exciting game of basketball. Please come out and support them!

The Christmas Concert will be in the auditorium at 3:00 on Sunday, December 16th. Please be there and support these young musicians. If you are the parent of one of these musicians, please encourage them to remain in band throughout school. Music is a gift that everyone can enjoy their entire life.

We are hosting the Junior High and Elementary U.I.L. Academic contests this week on Tuesday and Thursday. As a result, school is letting out early those two days so that we may facilitate the contests. We will publish the results in the paper as soon as all calculations are complete.
