ECLRA Announces Rule Changes For 2008 Stock Show

Effective for the 2007-2008 school year and the 2008 Eastland County Livestock Show to be held January 16-19, all breeding animals - with the exception of rabbits - are subject to county validation. All market animals - with the exception of rabbits and chickens - will continue to be subject to validation.

All market lambs, breedmeat goats, dairy goats, angora goats, breeding beef cattle and dairy cattle must be validated Tuesday, October 23, 2007, from 4:00 – 6:00 pm at the Eastland County Showgrounds. All market and breeding swine must be validated Tuesday, November 20, 2007, from 3:00 -Showgrounds. Animals not preswill not be validated and will not tal. be eligible to show.

Entries for the 2008 Eastland County Livestock Show must be turned into a supervising agriscience teacher, 4-H leader or the county extension agent by December 1, 2007. There will be a \$50 per head late entry fee for cards 2007, are not exempt from county validation, and any animal not validated will be ineligible to show.

In addition, the board of weight for market hogs to 175 pounds and eliminated the minimum weight for pens of chickens. Superintendents will continue to have the option of dividing breeds into weight classes in the market division; however, no one class may have less than three animals.

The kick try failed and Gorman was up 6-0. The drive featured runs of 9, 2 and 6 by Tony Perez; a 4 yarder by Matt Underwood and an 11 yarder by Orlando Valenzuela.

Then the Big Red Defense got the ball back when they recovered an Eagle fumble on the 32 and Valenzuela raced into the end zone with 8:27 left to make it 12-0. The run of 2 points failed.

Then after holding the Eagles the Panthers got the ball on their own 25 and scored in just 2 plays with Underwood breaking up the middle and racing 80 yards for the score with 5:09 left in the first. Perez added the 2 pointer on a run and Gorman was up 20-0.

After holding the Eagles the Big Red got the ball on their own 48 following a 1 yard run by Zack Fox, Underwood again broke loose and rambled for 51 and the score with 2:19 left in the first. Again the kick failed and Gorman led 26-0.

The Gorman City Commission met in a Regular meeting on the above date. Those present were Mayor Robert Ervin, Commissioners Nathan Files, and Joe Casey. Absent were Don Underwood and Charlie Torrez. Others present were Emmett Lasater and Ron Skiles.

Joe led the opening prayer followed by the Pledge of Allegiance and the Texas Pledge.

Mayor Ervin called the meeting to order @ 5:30 p.m.

Joe made the motion to approve the minutes. Nathan made a second. Motion carried.

Nathan made the motion to approve the bills for payment. Joe made a second. Motion carried.

Ron Skiles wants to see the state put school zone speed limit signs up on Fisher, Lexington, (highway 8) and Crescent (FM679) streets, Citizens also need to be reminded that all streets, or highways that lead to the school are "school zone" streets, and the speed limit is 20

Ron wants the "boom box" stereo systems to be monitored by our decibel reader. Officers can issue citations for the noise level. He also mentioned that police officers should not have any problems telling citizens to move commercial vehicles off of the residential streets. There is a state transportation code that prohibits parking commercial vehicles on residential streets. (Section 545.307)

Mr. Skiles stated that the officers have the authority to patrol and get control of our streets and what happens to them. The officers should ask the owner/drivers to move their commercial vehicle and if they do not comply, they should be given a citation. And he said that officers might want to pay more attention to numerous cars or vehicles in town that do not have valid inspection stickers or liability insurance. Gorman really needs some clean up issues addressed.


