Panthers Shock Bearcats 47-0; Travel To Tolar Friday Night

The Panthers hosted the De Leon Bearcats in a District 12-A contest before sold out full house on Friday night and shocked the De Leon fans when they came away with a 47-0 score. The Panthers scored 14 points in the first quarter, then added 20 more points in the second for a comfortable invited to come and join in the 34-0 margin. They added 6 more in the third and another 7 in the final period as they coasted to a 47-0

Swanner added the point after and the Panthers led 14-0.

The teams exchanged possessions on 3 occasions before the Panthers got the ball on their own 9 and went the distance in just 3 plays for the score. Perez broke loose on a beautiful 27 yard scamper and Underwood added another run of 29 yards to set up the Big Red on the Bearcat 34 before Perez broke loose again and rambled 35 yards for the score with 11:63 left in the 2nd person. Swanner booted the point after and Gorman was up

After holding Bearcats and recovering a fumble by Clinton Oliver on the De Leon 12, the Panthers had a 5 yard penalty before a Perez run of 2 to set the Big Red up at the De Leon 15. Underwood again outraced the Bearcat defense on a fine run of 15 for the score with 10:15 left in the half. Swanner added the PAT and Gorman was up 28-0.

The Panthers overcame penalties of 5, 10 and 5 for the score. The drive featured runs of 11, -2, 5, 2, 6 and 2 by Perez and runs of 5, 9, 7, and 5 by Underwood and 2 by Swanner before Swanner hit Underwood with a wide open pass for the score. The try for point failed on a bad snap and the score rose to 40-0.

The Panthers added the final score with a great 48 yard pass from Underwood to Zack Fox with 10:09 left in the game. The Big Red Defense held the Bearcats and Gorman got the ball on the Bearcat 48. Swanner added the point after and the final score was 47-0.

Underwood led the Panthers with 173 yards on 17 carries and had a pass of 32 yards. Perez got 156 on 21 tries. Fox had 13 on 4. Valenzuela got 9 on 2 and Swanner had 2 on 1 keeper.

The Big Red Defense gets better with each performance and really shut down the Bearcat offense. They will need another steller defensive performance this week as the Panthers travel to Tolar in a game to decide the District 12A winner. STATE OF TEXAS COUNTY OF EASTLAND

ORDER RESTRICING OUTDOOR BURNING

WHERE AS, the Commissioners Court has determined that circumstances present in all or part of the unincorporated area of the county create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning;

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED by the Commissioners Court of Eastland County taht all outdoor burning is banned in the unincorporated area of the county until November 13, 2007, unless the restrictions are terminated earlier based on a determination made by the Texas Forest Service or this Court. This Order is adopted pursuant to Local Government Code 352.081, and other applicable statutues. This order does not prohibit outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Natural Resources Commission for (1) firefighter training; (2) public utility, natural gas pipeline or mining operations; or (3) planting or harvest of agricultural crops; or (4) burns that are conducted by a prescribed burn manager certified under Section 153.048, Natural Resources Code, and meet the standards of Section 153.047, Natural Resources Code.

Court Approved by a majority vote.

In accordance with Local Government Code 352.081, a violation of this Order is a Class C misdemeanor, punishable by fine not to exceed \$500.00.

ADOPTED this 31 day of October, 2007, by a vote of 4 ayes and 0 nays.


Congratulations Panthers!


