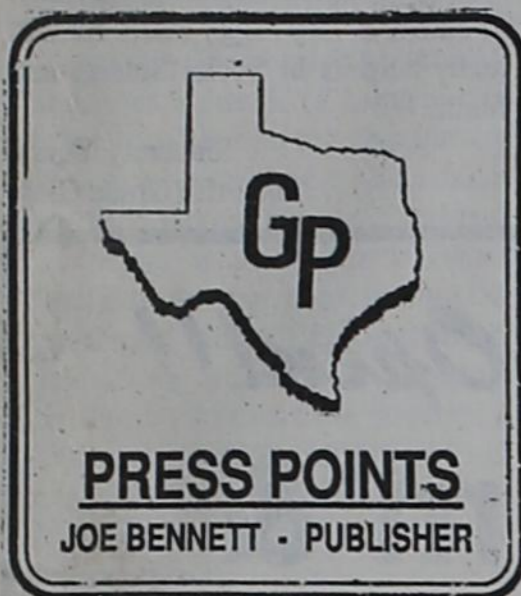
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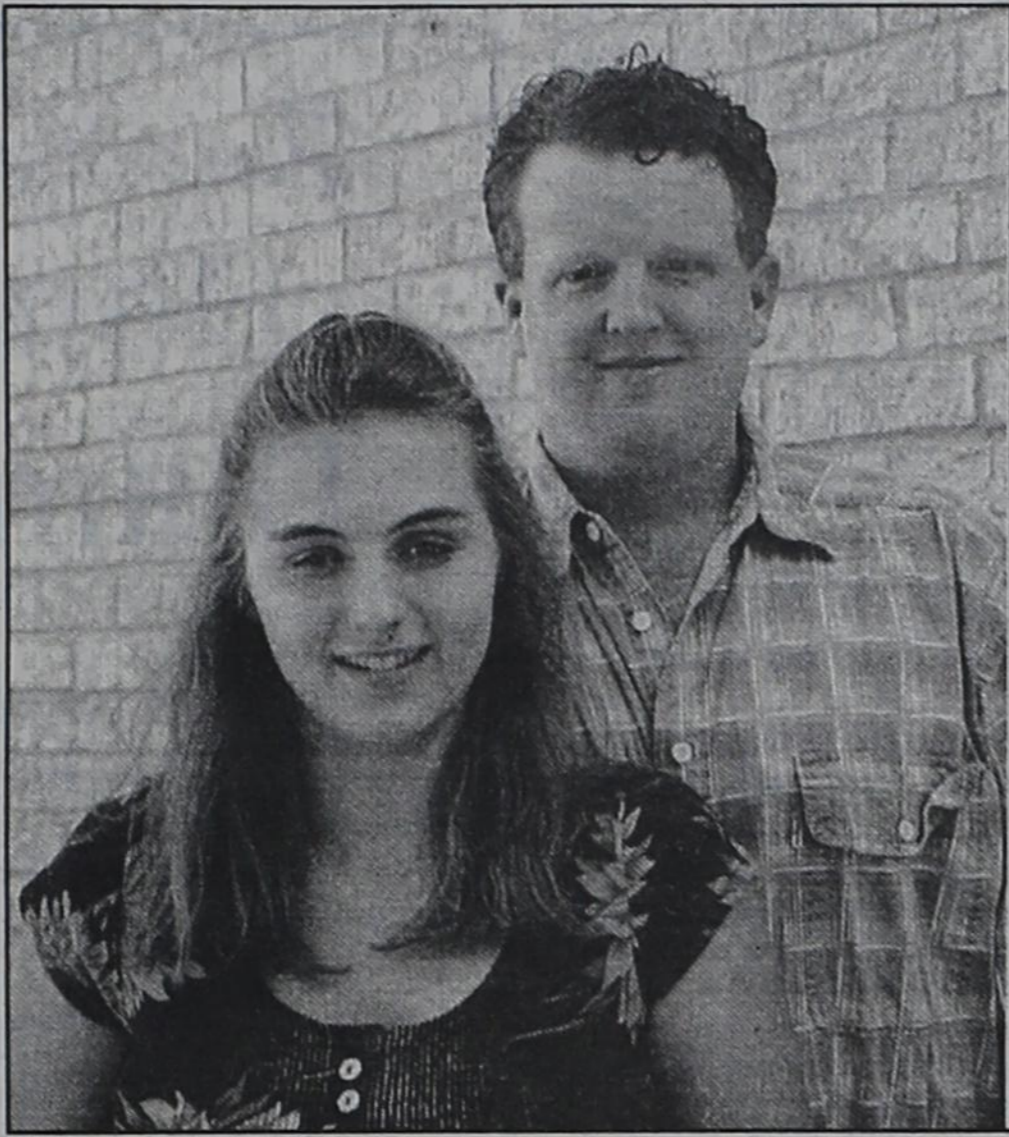

### PANTHERS DOWN EVANT 37-10 IN A HIGH WIND

The Gorman Panthers out-manned the Evant Elks in a windstorm on Friday night at Elk Stadium to remain undefeated in District 14A and the First Place playoff spot. The score was 37 to 10.

Gorman got on the scoreboard first with a 24 yard field goal by Justin Snider with 4:45 left in the first period. The drive started on the Gorman 24 and consisted of 6 runs and a 36 yard pass to Ronald Majors to set the ball up at the Elk 15 yard line before being stopped. Then Snider booted the field goal.

The Panthers held the Elks on their next possession and forced a punt at the Elk 14 yard line. The punt was blocked and recovered in the end zone by Shannon Mauney with 3:41 left in the first. Snider kicked the point after and Gorman was ahead to stay at 10-0.

On the next Elk possession Evant took the ball on their own 23 and in just 3 plays moved in for the score on a 70 yard pass play from Damien Bates to Jesse Jones with 1:46 left in the quarter. Kevin Smith booted the point after and the score was 10-7.

Then Gorman answered with Elk score with a 65 yard drive in six plays with Nick Guthery hitting on open

Marco Herrera with a pass from 5 yards out with 11:53 left in the second period. The drive featured a 25 yard pass to Paul Petree and a first down 10 yard run by Petree before Margarito Sanchez set the Panthers up at the Elk 5. Snider kicked the point after and Gorman was up 17-7.

The Elks added a field goal following a 55 yard drive before being stopped by the Big Red Defense at the Gorman 13. Kevin Smith booted the 23 yard field goal with 4:03 left in the half.

Gorman came back before halftime, going 52 yards in 9 plays with Petree getting the final 2 yards on a run with 44 seconds left. The drive featured a 21 yard run by Petree and also runs of 3, 8, 7, 7, 2 and 3. Snider kicked the point after and the Big Red led 24-10 at halftime.

The Panther Marching Band performed a unique routine at halftime showing numbers of 5-0 to represent a perfect record in District. It really pleased the Gorman crowd.

Then the Panthers took the second half kickoff and moved 63 yards in 9 plays with Petree getting the final 3 yards on a run with 8:04 left. The drive featured a 4 yard run for first down by Petree and Sanchez before Sanchez paced 33 yards to the Elk 3. The kick for point was wide and the score stood at 30-10.

Gorman got another drive going in the third period after recovering an Elk fumble at the Evant 30 by Kris Carlton. The drive featured a 20 yard run by Petree to set Gorman up at the 4 yard line. Then Guthery got the final 4 on a rollout to his left with 1:35 left in the third. Snider booted the point after and Gorman led 37-10 to end the scoring for the night.

Petree led the Panthers with 201 yards on 28 carries and also caught one pass for 25 yards. Sanchez had 117 yards on 18 tries. Adon Rodriguez got 45 yards on 5 carries. Marco Herrera had 12 yards on four tries and a pass for 5 yards. Jeremy Bryan carried one time for 3 yards and Guthery had a -13 on three keepers, losing 20 yards on a pass try. Ronald Majors led the Panthers on passing with 1 catch for 36 yards. Jason Warren had 1 catch for 12 yards.

The Big Red had a good season with a 6-4 mark and 5-0 in District. Let's all go to Breckenridge on Fri-

day night to back the Panthers on to victory.

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## Agriculture View Point

### LOVEGRASS PROVES VALUE FOR GRAZING

We have had a concern about weeping lovegrass as a year-around grazing forage, but cattle gains have been pretty good, even under continuous grazing that does not take a lot of animal management.

Those were the comments of New Mexico State University range scientist Gary Donart of Las Cruces of beef production on CRP grassland as part of a CRP grassland alternative landuse field day near Clovis.

"After 30 days of grass the performance of animals backgrounded on wheat and in the feedlot are all about the same -- no difference," Donart said during a grazing trial stop.

Donart is studying five different grazing regimes: 12-month continuous grazing, six-month grazing, frequent rotating among pastures, and stocking twice the usual rate in the spring and fall, both with and without fertilizers (nitrogen) applied to the weeping lovegrass.

"So far, we're finding that weeping lovegrass is very effective as a grass species for livestock in the spring, with animal gains approximating three to three and one-half pounds daily," Donart said.

"Weight gains have dropped off to around two pounds a day as the summer progresses." "Our heavy spring and then 'heavy fall' grazing with fertilizer is probably our best program overall."

The nitrogen rate is 38 pounds to the acre.

Heifers and steers have been successfully over-wintered on the lovegrass with only a protein supplement provided.

Donart said he sees retiring CRP land, including stands of weeping lovegrass, being utilized in conjunction with native rangeland grazing.

In the current 1995 weeping lovegrass grazing trail, the scientist reported these average animal daily gains (pounds) for the period May 9-September 20 for the various grazing sequences:

- Twelve month continuous grazing, 2.12 pounds daily; six-month continuous grazing, 2.12 pounds; heavy spring/fall grazing, 1.77 pounds; heavy spring/fall grazing with fertilizer, 2.20 pounds; and six pasture rotational grazing, 1.83 pounds daily.

Weight gain per acre in pounds for the same five grazing regimes were 51,104, 119, 171, and 131 pounds, respectively.

Donart said that as another part of the study 11 tracts of privately-owned CRP grass throughout eastern New Mexico was sampled and studied for seasonal production and nutritive value of the forage. Included were plantings of Blue and sideoats grama, Blue grama, weeping lovegrass, Kleingrass, yellow bluestem and what were called mixed species.

Forage data, he said, revealed dramatic location differences throughout the six-county study in 1994. Burning pre-treatment tended to reduce early-season forage yield, but appeared to increase late-season yields. Positive responses to applications of nitrogen fertilizer were observed in weeping lovegrass in both 1994 and 1995.

The multi-treatment lovegrass grass grazing study near the Clovis center is being carried out on a 1,204 acre tract of weeping lovegrass owned by Wayne Palla. The study land has been in the CRP since 1987.

### LADY BUG MASSES

#### BAD NEWS FOR APHIDS

Reports of ladybugs gathering in large masses on buildings and in attics is very good news for gardeners fighting aphids, say Texas A&M entomologists in both Dallas and College Station.

"This newly-arrived species, Harmonia axyridis, is a friendly insect that feeds on aphids in roses, crepe myrtles and other ornamental, as well as pecan trees, cotton and other field crops" said Dr. Allen Knutson, Dallas-based entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"This is the time of the year they gather in a cool, protected place for the winter," Knutson said, "We've had reports throughout the North and central Texas corridor from southern Texas and north into Oklahoma."

"There's no cause for alarm," said Bill Ree, Extension entomologist in College Station. "They don't bite, sting, eat wood or carry disease. In fact, one pecan farmer told me he'd cut a hole in his attic if that would assure they'd stay over and eat aphids in his trees next spring."

The Harmonias are similar in size to other common ladybugs but distinctive in appearance because of white markings around the eyes that look

like goggles. Their color varies from light orange to the familiar deep red and there may be no spots or as many as 18.

Knutson says, "They'll hibernate in an attic or other protected place until spring and then depart to feed on aphids. Their leaving won't be nearly as dramatic as their arrival. We believe the benefits in controlling aphids and other insect pests far outweigh any nuisance factor in their overwintering habits."

To prevent their becoming a nuisance inside the house, Knutson advised caulking cracks around eaves and windows, and should they intrude into your home, using a vacuum to remove them.

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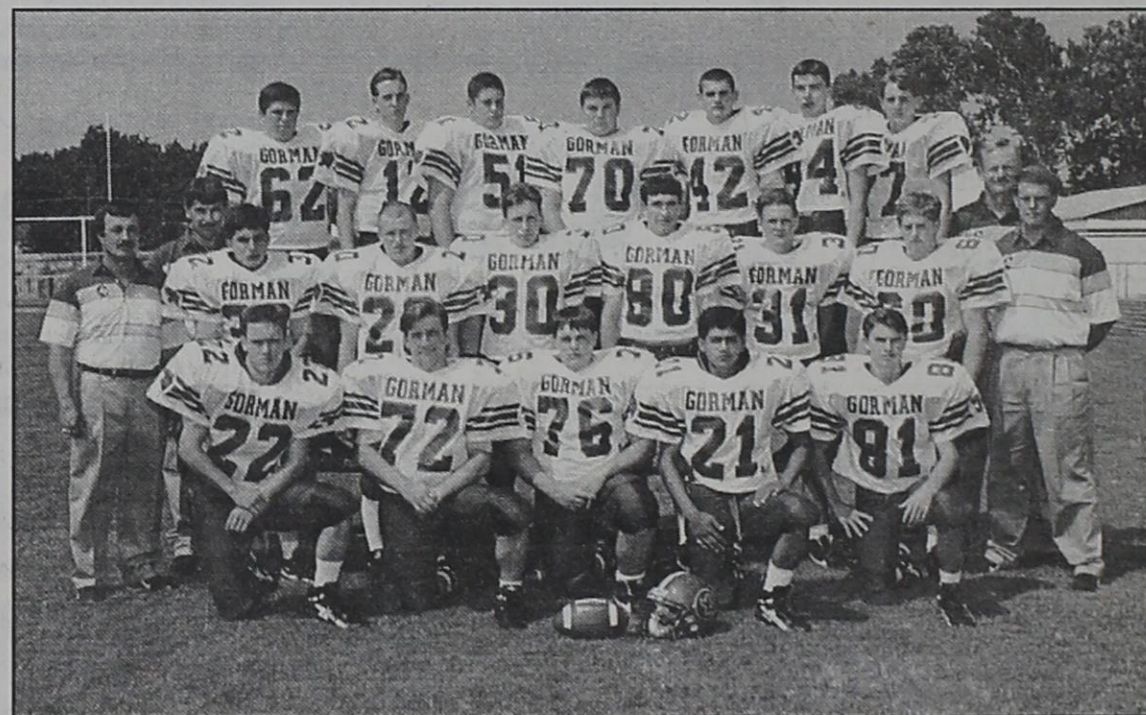

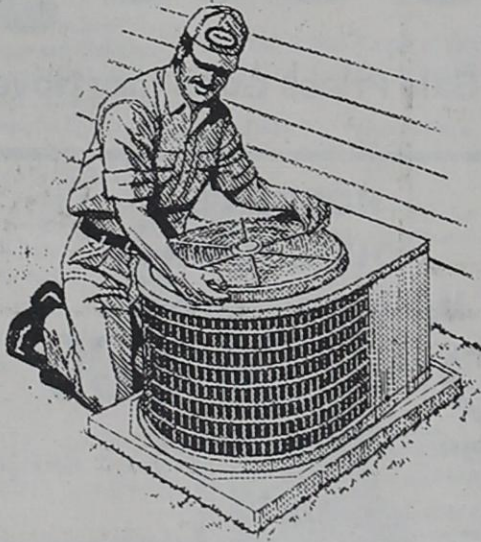

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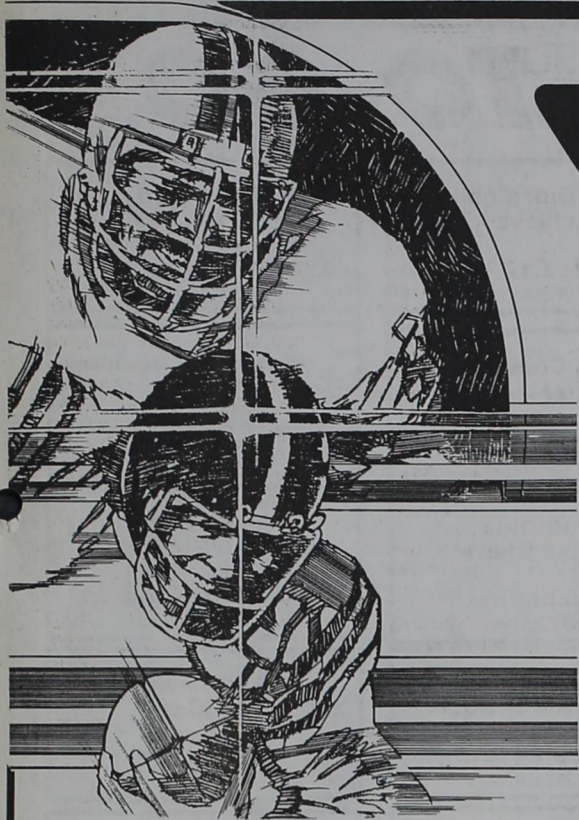
