Extension Service Cotton Tips Given

Robert B. Metzger, area agronomist for the Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University, District Two Office in Lubbock, has prepared a guideline for farmers who are trying to decide whether to replant hail and rain damaged cotton.

The cotton release reads as follows: "Due to recent hails, farmers have some difficult decisions to make regarding replanting. There are some guidelines that need to be considered in deciding whether cotton should be replanted or not. There are several points that need to be considered carefully.

"If leaves or traces of leaves are still attached, the chances are good for recovery. However, there should be at least one plant per foot remaining. The farmer would be well ahead to leave this cotton. However, if all the leaves are destroyed, a closer look at stems and buds should be made before a final decision is made.

"Although recovery is slow, cotton can recover when all the leaves are destroyed provided the bark and stem is free of bruises and breaks below the point of the first leaves. Recovery is very doubtful if the stem is broken below the first leaves because no buds are left for renewed growth. Also, recovery is unlikely if the stem was shattered and the bark was loosened and broken to points below the first leaves.

"Remember the cut-off date for planting cotton north of Lubbock is upon us. Depending on when you can get back into the fields, replanting to soybeans may be advisable in northern counties. However, in the Lubbock area southward, cotton is still the best bet. It should be pointed out that soybeans will require irrigation in September, while it is most likely that replanted cotton planted this date will require

Pesky Mosquito No Immediate Area Problem

Pesky, biting mosquitos pose no immediate danger in the Muleshoe area said City Manager Albert Field.

He stated that due to the present cloudy, damp weather, no spraying has been or will be attempted by the city as the spray would only be washed off immediately in the almost daily rains.

The city manager said that constant checks reveal only a relatively small number of the insects in the city, and that perhaps because of the first, early spraying, mosquitos are under control fairly well at this time.

Although some areas have reported great infestations of mosquitos, Muleshoe probably will have no great problem for some time.

Citing several breeding places to be checked by homeowners and businessmen, Field said favorite mosquito breeding places include cool damp places, such as stagnant water in cans, old tires, at the edge of bushes and even in air conditioners where water is not constantly re-circulating.

Field assured spraying as soon as the need arises and as the unsettled weather permits.

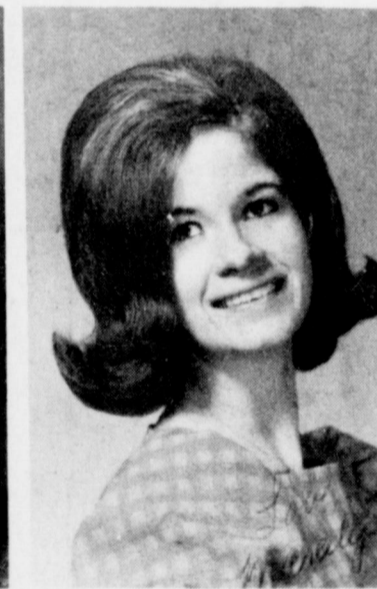

the mineral quality of water held underneath the Texas High Plains.

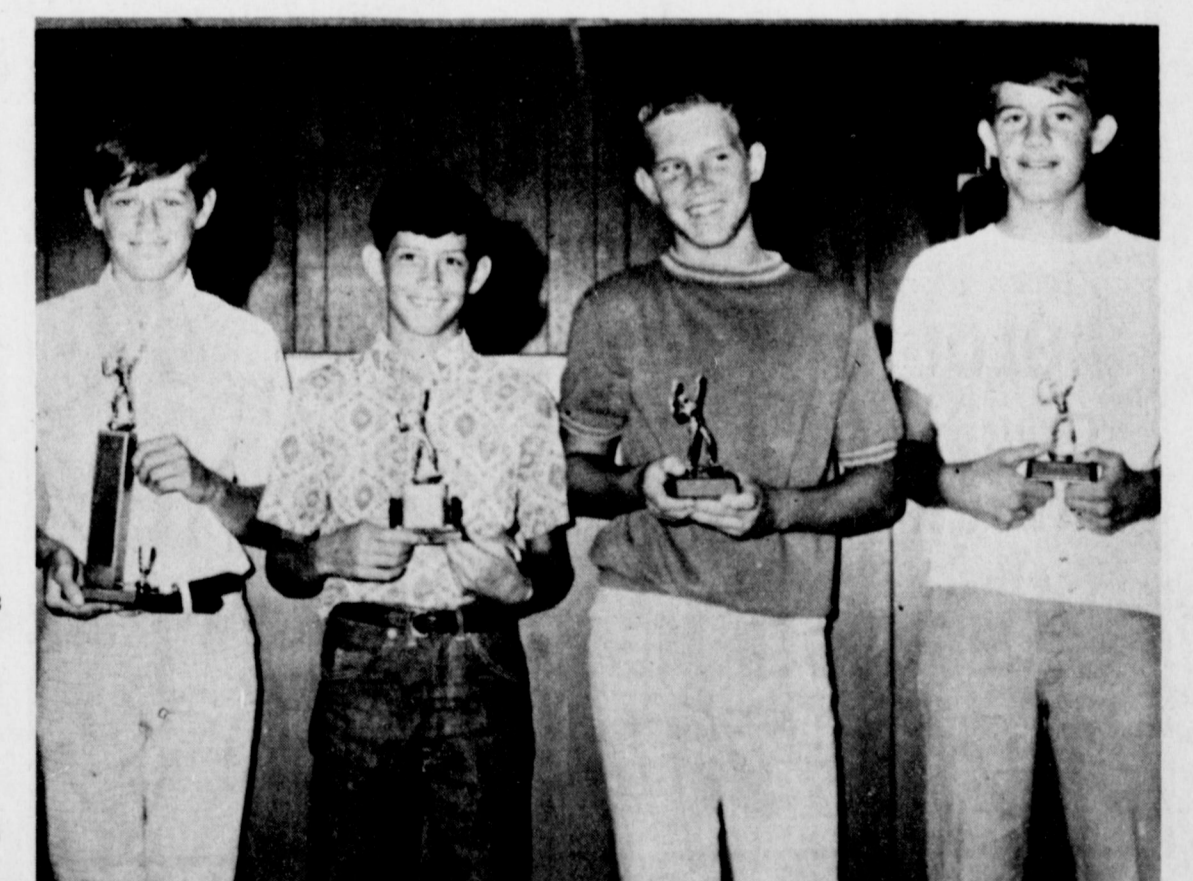
The team led by Prof. John J. Dowling spent last year testing equipment, a computer program for analyzing data and the method for the study.

By measuring the electrical properties of rocks in the underlying Ogallala Formation, the team can make an interpretation of the water quality.

"There are several techniques for measuring the electrical properties of rocks near the surface of the earth," Dowling said, "but none of these had been applied successfully before to a semi-arid region where electrical conductivity of soils presents a special problem.

"Now we can get meaningful data on dissolved solids which pollute the Ogallala Formation," he said.

Salt and nitrates are of particular interest to the team which includes graduate students Russell Blumentritt, who helped develop the equipment and program, and Bruce Allen, Geosciences Prof. W.D. Miller is a consultant for the research to be done this summer.

little if any additional irrigation.

"Each year too many acres of hail-damaged cotton are plowed up when they could have recovered and made the farmer more money than replanting. Remember hail-damaged cotton has a good ability to recover, so make certain you have given it every chance to recover before you decide to replant."

Loss of cotton acreage to hail storms last weekend is expected to top the 20,000 mark in Bailey County while neighboring Lamb County reports a cotton loss of at least 75,000 acres.

Jo Blackwell reported at prestime 12 entries had been received in the Little Miss Muleshoe contest. The Little Miss Muleshoe contest will be held during intermission of the Miss Muleshoe Pageant.

The House of Representatives voting 224 to 142 in favor of limiting to \$20,000 the total payments an individual farmer can receive under 1970 farm programs is "almost unbelievable."

This was the observation of Donnell Echols, Dawson County farmer and Vice President of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., who was in Washington for the House debate and vote on the issue.

Also on hand for the House action and concurring in the opinions expressed by Echols on their return, was J.D. Smith, PCG Board Chairman, of Littlefield.

"For those of us on the farm and in Congress who understand farm programs and can see the full implications of a payment limit," Echols said, "there seem to be no logical reasons at all, other political reasons, for the House making such a move."

The House vote came on an amendment to the Agricultural Appropriations Bill by Representative Silvio Conte (R-Mass). The amendment provides: "That no part of the funds appropriated by this act shall be used to formulate or carry out any price support program (other than sugar) under which payments aggregating more than \$20,000 under all such programs are made to any producer on any crops planted in the fiscal year 1970."

The fiscal year 1970 begins July 1, 1969 and ends June 30, 1970, but Secretary of Agriculture Clifford Hardin is of the opinion that the limitation would apply to all 1970 production.

Echols and Smith noted that every argument advanced in favor of the limitations amendment on the House floor was "shot down" by Congressmen George Mahon (D-Tex.), Jamie Whitten (D-Miss.), House

Minority Leader Gerald Ford of Michigan, and others.

In the statements made in opposition to the amendment that was repeatedly shown that, because of the "snap-back" clause for cotton, limiting payments in 1970 would increase, not decrease, the cost of farm programs.

It was also shown that driving large farmers out of the programs would disrupt the supply-demand balance which is the prime objective of farm programs.

It was proven that every dollar received by a farmer, whether \$100 or \$20,000, was a dollar the farmer has earned by either (1) producing the country's requirements for food and fiber at a market price below the cost of production or (2) idling acres of productive land from which he must have an income to pay his bills and continue to feed and clothe the nation.

"These people seem not to understand what agriculture means to the total economy of the nation and that a limit on payments will destroy the farm programs that keep agriculture going. And they don't seem to want to understand."

There is still hope that limitations on payments under 1970 farm programs can be avoided.

The Appropriations Bill now goes to the Senate, and strong efforts are being made among influential senators of both parties to have the limitations amendment taken out by that body.

If that move is successful it is thought the House-Senate Conference Committee will be "friendly" -- that is to say it will uphold the Senate version, without the limitations amendment. But it will still be necessary to get House approval of the Conference Committee report.

"And while it would again be almost unbelievable for the House to vote down the entire Agricultural Appropriations Bill because it came back without an item on payments," Echols said, "the climate that now prevails in the House makes it impossible to discount that possibility."

The Senate Agricultural Appropriations subcommittee has already held hearings and word has come down to PCG that they will begin "marking-up" the Bill about June 23. So it is unlikely that the measure will reach the Senate floor before about July 3, according to Donald Johnson, PCG Executive Vice President.

Melvin Evans Carolina Refuge New Manager

Melvin R. Evans, former Refuge Manager of the Muleshoe National Wildlife Refuge, has been named Refuge Manager of Santee National Wildlife Refuge, Summerton, So. Carolina.

This announcement was made recently by C. Edward Carlson, Regional Director of the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife's Southeastern Region. Evans' career with the Bureau began in the summer of 1960 when he worked as a biological aide at Monte Vista National Wildlife Refuge, Monte Vista, Colo., while still a college student. He received his B.S. degree in Wildlife Management from Colorado State University, Fort Collins, Colo. in December of that same year. Shortly thereafter, he accepted a position as Assistant Refuge Manager of the Bear River Migratory Bird Refuge, Brigham, Utah. Later that same year he transferred to Kirwin National Wildlife Refuge, Kirwin, Kan. as Assistant Refuge Manager of the Muleshoe National Wildlife Refuge, Muleshoe.

A native of Aurora, Colo., Evans comes to the Southeast from Cache, Okla. where he was Assistant Refuge Manager of the Wichita Mountains National Wildlife Refuge for the past three years. While in this position he received a Unit Award for Excellence of Service.

As administrator of Santee National Wildlife Refuge, Evans will manage the refuge pri-

marily for waterfowl. This refuge winters the southern-most major Canada goose flock. Santee Refuge is situated on the Santee-Cooper Project, which is famous for its landlocked striped bass fishing. Fishing, picnicking and birdwatching are available to visitors. Evans and his wife will live in Summerton.

THP Investigate Four Accidents During May

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated four accidents on rural highways in Bailey County during the month of May, according to Sergeant Thurman Ketter, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

Three crashes resulted in three persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$3,350.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first five months of 1969 shows a total of 19 accidents in Bailey County resulting in no persons killed, seven persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$25,765.

Tax Man Sam Sez

The Service Centers--like Austin for our area--send magnetic tapes with miles of tax information by air mail to the National Computer in Martinsburg. Only 257 people work at the Center, an around-the-clock, seven-days-a-week, operation. Only Christmas and Thanksgiving are holidays, and then skeleton crews are on duty. The world's fastest input and output computers are used. Data sent by Service Centers is put on master tapes at the rate of 680,000 characters per second. If you don't think that's fast, just imagine standing in the middle of Plainview and making a 360 degree turn, and unless it was a pretty fast turn, the computer could have checked most of the taxpayers within view--and that is quite a few.

Water Rights Final Notice Was Given

The Texas Water Rights Commission announced today that final notice of the recording deadline under the Water Rights Adjudication Act of 1967 has been given. Everyone who is using water from a public stream who does not claim under a certified filing or a permit from the State must record his claim by September 1, 1969. Users of water for domestic and livestock watering purposes are exempt from this requirement.

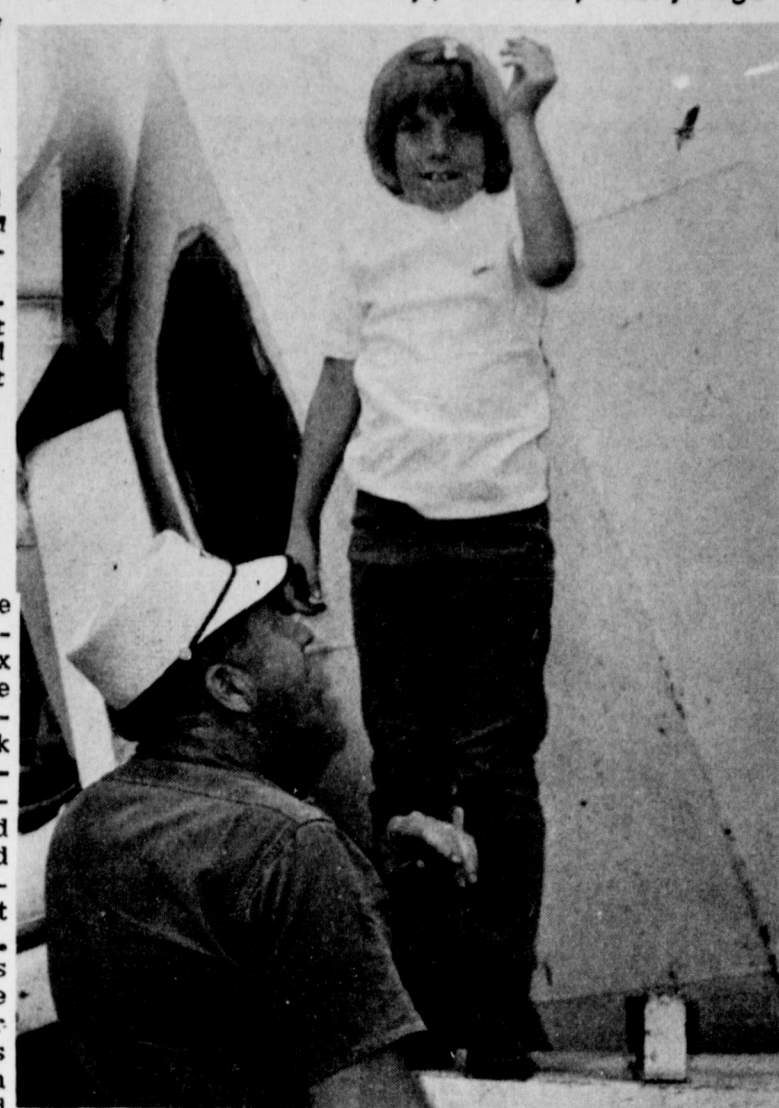
Failure to timely record the claim will "extinguish and bar" the claim of water right according to Section 4 of the Adjudication Act. All affected water users who have not already filed their claim are urged by the

Commission to do so as soon as possible.

Valid claims will be recognized to the extent of maximum use of water without waste during any year between 1963 and 1967. Where the user was in the process of constructing a

system or had facilities to use a larger amount of water on the effective date of the Act than he had actually used, use from 1968 to 1970 may be recognized.

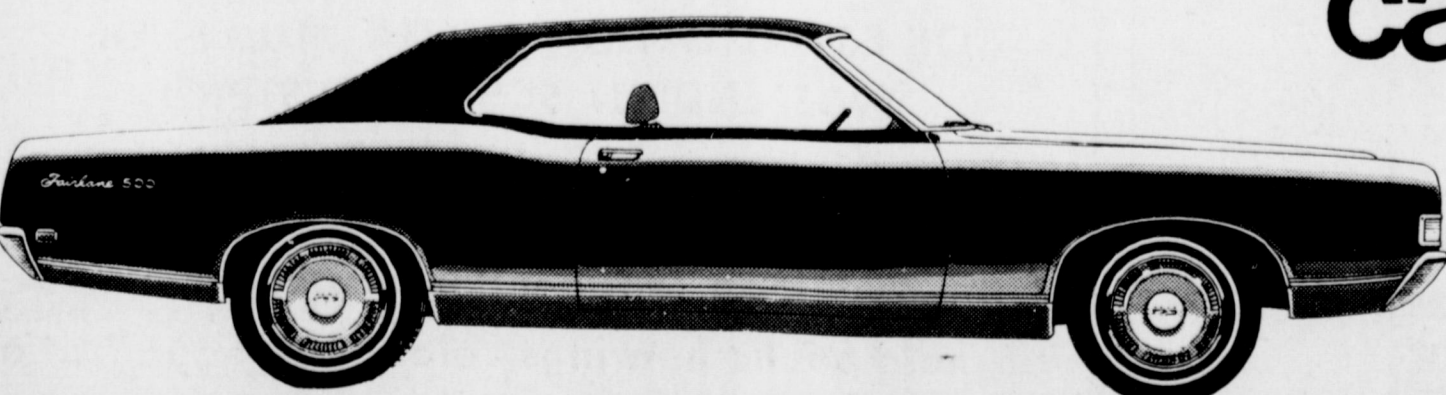

what the cooking groups of Bailey County have accomplished the past year.

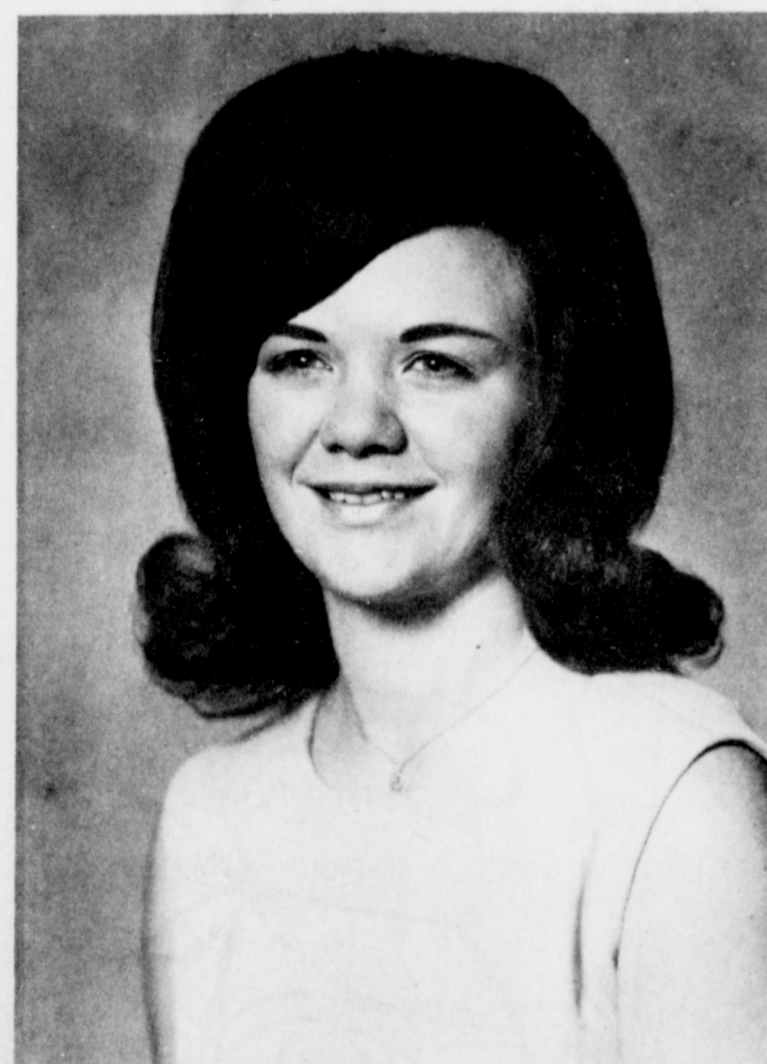
