

Benjamin (Bennie) Escovedo, formerly of Cisco, is now an inmate awaiting transfer to state prison to serve a (25) twenty-five year sentences for Possession With Intent to Deliver a Controlled Substance, Methamphetamine, 4 grams or more but less than 200 grams and a (25) twenty-five year sentence for Tampering With Physical Evidence. Escovedo was arrested by a Deputy with the Eastland County Sheriff's Office on March 21, 2008 on Highway 6 North between Cisco and Eastland after a vehicle he was a passenger in was stopped for suspicious activity. The Deputy was also assisted by a Cisco Police Officer. Escovedo had in his possession seventeen plastic bags of methamphetamine that he attempted to conceal when he was arrested. Escovedo had three prior drug related felony convictions out of Parker, Tarrant and Eastland County.

91st District Judge Steven R. Herod sentenced Escovedo to prison in the 91st District Courtroom of Eastland County. Assistant Criminal District Attorney William C. Dowell prosecuted the case with John Saringer representing Escovedo. Criminal District Attorney Russ Thomason complemented the Eastland County Sheriff's Deputy and the Cisco Police Officer for shutting down another drug

WOMAN GETS 15 YEARS FOR POSSESSION OF METH WITH INTENT TO DELIVER

SHIRLEY SHERRI SHERRIN, 25, formerly a city of Eastland resident, is now an inmate awaiting transfer to state prison to serve a 15-year sentence for Possession of a Controlled Substance, Methamphetamine, 4 grams or more but less than 200 grams with the intent to deliver and a 10 year sentence for Tampering with Physical

A Ranger Police Officer stopped and detained Sherrin and the driver of a vehicle Jose Angel Ballesteros, in which she was a passenger on March 26, 2008 for failing to dim its headlights. Officers found approximately 15 grams of Methamphetamine in the vehicle and in both occupants' personal belongings.

The Honorable Judge Steven Herod sentenced Sherrin after hearing her plea of guilty to both charges in the 91st District Court. Defense Attorney Paul Lewallen represented Sherrin with Assistant Criminal District Attorney William C. Dowell and Criminal District Attorney Russ Thomason prosecuting.

Man Adjudicated Guilty And Sentenced to 15 years

Presiding Judge Steven R. Herod accepted the plea of True to allegations of probation violations by Eduardo Sanchez and sentenced him to 15 years confinement in the Institutional Division of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice on Wednesday afternoon, January 21, 2009 in the 91st District Courtroom. Sanchez, a former Memphis, Tennessee resident, had previously been placed on six years deferred probation on December 8, 2003 for Possession of a Controlled Sustance: Methamphetamine.

Sanchez received some consideration in his plea from the State for his cooperation as a witness for the Federal Government in a Money Laundering case filed in U.S. District Court.


Criminal District Attorney Russ Thomason stated: This sentence should send a strong message to those who are fortunate enough to receive deferred adjudication but don't take their terms and conditions of probation seriously.


Sammy Lee Hendrix, 61, formerly of Ranger, Texas, is now an inmate awaiting transfer to state prison to serve a (10) ten year sentence for the felony offense of Driving While Intoxicated. Hendrix was arrested on November 30, 2008 by a DPS Trooper after rolling his vehicle on County Road 156. Hendrix did not have a drivers license and had two passengers in the vehicle with him.

Hendrix had five prior DWI arrests in various Texas counties. Driving While Intoxicated is a Third Degree Felony and carries a punishment range of not less than 2 years confinement and not more than 10 years confinement with a fine up to \$10,000. Had Hendrix not entered a plea of guilty and chose to go to trial, the Criminal District Attorney's Office could have enhanced the charge to a second degree felony (2 to 20 years) due to Hendrix already having received a prior felony conviction.

Attorney Landon Thompson represented Hendrix at his hearing with Assistant Criminal District Attorney William C. Dowell prosecuting.



Eastland County Schools Could Receive \$2,481,600 In Funding Federal economic stimulus bill estimates show millions flowing to public schools in Texas

Public school districts in Eastland County could have an additional \$2,481,600 over a two-year period to spend, according to Strategic Partnerships, Inc., (SPI) an Austin-based research and procurement consulting firm. The totals quoted are part of the \$825 billion economic stimulus package currently being considered by the U.S. Congress. The House Appropriations Committee Wednesday reported its economic stimulus bill out of committee and the bill will now go to the House floor for debate.

"This is good news for schools, good news for the economy and good news for companies that sell to government," said Mary Scott Nabers, president and CEO of Strategic Partnerships, Inc. "Not only will the federal economic stimulus funding provide Texas schools with some much-needed additional funding for facilities, programs and technology, but it will also open up additional contracting opportunities for local businesses to sell their goods and services to school districts - providing a much-needed boost to local economies."

The funding is aimed at improving public school classrooms, laboratories and libraries for students across the nation and is part of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Plan aimed at providing increased educational opportunities for school students, creating jobs and moving the nation's economy forward. Toward that goal, an estimated \$41 billion in funds could be pushed to local school districts nationwide. That includes \$13 billion each for both Title I and IDEA (Individuals with Disabilities Education Act) programs, both of which are based on formula funding and address high poverty schools and special needs students respective-

Another \$14 billion is estimated to be allocated for school modernization and repairs and an esti-

mated \$1 billion could be allocated for education technology. "Although these figures are not yet firm," said Nabers, "President Obama has said he intends to move swiftly on the economic stimulus package, as every day it is delayed, thousands of Americans lose their jobs. These millions of dollars estimated to be headed to local school districts in Texas will not only supplement school coffers, but also provide contracting opportunities that can put local workers back to work.'

A breakdown of how much it is estimated that Eastland County public schools will receive over two

years from the House version of the Economic Recovery Package follows: Cisco Independent School District - \$815,000 Eastland Independent School District - \$804,100

Gorman Independent School District - \$278,400 Ranger Independent School District - \$363,600 Rising Star Independent School District - \$220,500

FOOD BANK OF WOT PARTICIPATES IN HUNGER STUDY 2009

Local food bank needs volunteers to conduct study

January 26, 2009 [ABILENE, TEXAS] - The Food Bank of West Central Texas will join Feeding America (formerly America's Second Harvest) and Mathematica Policy Research to conduct a study of hunger throughout the United States. In order to complete this study, Food Bank staff and volunteers will work as a team to conduct nearly 300 client interviews at 30 of our Partner Agencies throughout West Central Texas selected by Mathematica. The results of this national study, Hunger in America 2009, will be released in November/December 2009, and will be used by food banks, hunger advocates, policymakers and legislators across the nation.

Volunteers are required to attend one two-hour training session in early February at FBWCT to prepare for face-to-face interviews with low-income clients at soup kitchens, shelters, and food pantries. The client interviews will take place from the first of February through the end of April 2009

Volunteers will work in three or four person teams with a team leader assigned for each visit. Because this is a scientific survey, the interviewer will read from a written set of questions covering detailed information about the client's lives, needs, and reasons for needing the use of the emergency food assistance as well as their experiences while receiving services. Each interview typically takes 20 minutes to complete. Time Commitment:

- Each team may expect to be at a site for three to four hours in order to complete the required interviews. Volunteers should have some schedule flexibility because Mathematica Policy Research will assign the day and time of visits to the selected agencies.
- FBWCT will match volunteers according to their availability; some may be asked to do more than one visit depending on your willingness and the size of our volunteer pool.
 - Qualifications:
- · Volunteers must be 18 years of age or older.
- · Volunteers should have a positive attitude and professional manner.
- Volunteers should be non-judgmental and comfortable interacting with very diverse groups of low-income people, those in crisis of some kind who find themselves needing help to feed their families.
- Every interviewee is expected to be treated with dignity and respect at all times.
- All volunteers must attend one training:

Training will take place at the Food Bank of West Central Texas.
