



LETTER TO THE EDITOR - Gorman ISD Decides To Reduce Teaching Staff

On Tuesday March 29th the Gorman ISD School Board voted to lay off a number of teachers in order to reduce their budget deficit for the next school year. In keeping with the Texas Open Meetings act the Board President made it clear that there would be no discussion held with attending members of the community and they would not respond to any questions posed by those who requested to address the Board

Five community members were in attendance and requested to address the Board. Several comments in your life? Recognize the goodness and give God the and questions were presented surrounding the layoffs and the manner in which the decision was made. While no one wants to see any one lose their job in these times, the business of the School Board is the education of the community's children. Obviously with that the focus surrounded finding other areas such as administration and support staff, as well as looking at facilities to make cuts have ended. Since all discussions and justifications were made behind closed doors no one but the involved parties can say. If they were to now justify their positions can we be assured it is an impartial and neutral view they are giving or one slanted to support their ultimate decision.

> While there were a few votes where it seemed some individuals on the Board were willing to explore other avenues, in the end all but one member fell into step with the Superintendent and voted to release the teachers. It is this writer's opinion that they in one vote denied the one advantage Gorman ISD had over other schools, smaller class sizes. The reality is we do not keep coaching staff long enough to establish traditions because the programs change with coaches. We do not have the financial ability to provide the after school programs and clubs that improve the school experience and widen the student's educational exposure and learning experience.

> The smaller class sizes and the certified teachers we are losing take away the opportunity for teachers to give more one on one time with struggling students. Those struggling now will fall further behind. They have struck another blow to a wounded community that is in a state of deterioration. There will be many who will be offended by that but look around; vacant businesses and buildings in collapse is not a good sign. We need our children to hold the highest levels of eduction as they are the future of our community. We are simply the trustees.

> Our schools stock has been devalued and as in other businesses it may be time to considering divesting and putting our investments into another account. Other educational opportunities exist and I think it is in our children's best interest to investigate other opportunities.

> The time is not too late. The course can be reversed. Can the older two story building be closed, divide the classes up between the other three school buildings and save the energy and operating costs? Can we move from night games to Saturday games to save the cost of lighting? Are there other administration costs that can be reviewed? I also understand that new administrative positions to include an elementary grade counselor position were created, is that wise in these times of cut backs?



FSA Accepting Emergency Farm Loans Applications

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by Drought, March 1, 2010 thru December 31, 2010 are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency (FSA) office located in Anson, Texas, Richard G. Young said today.

Callahan, Coleman, Eastland, Jones and Shackelford Counties are five of 84 counties in Texas recently named by <u>Secretary of Agriculture</u>, Tom Vilsack eligible for loans to cover part of <u>production loss</u> resulting from the Drought, March 1, 2010 thru December 31, 2010 Richard G. Young, said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 100% of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue the agricultural business, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 3.75 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FSA emergency loan", Richard G. Young, said. Farmers participating in the Federal Crop Insurance Program will have to consider proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until November 28, 2011, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing, with possible delays into the new farming season", Richard G. Young said.

FSA is a credit agency of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of thier living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who meet U.S. citizenship requirements and to farming partnerships, corporations, or cooperatives in which U.S. citizenship reqirements are met by individuals holding a majority interest.
