After losing the bal on a fumble on their first possession and a punt on their second, the Panthers scored on their third possession and adding another TD on their next possession the Big Red jumped to a 14-0 lead at halftime and held the Pirates scoreless until late in the fourth period and adding a TD in the third period the Panthers shocked the Pirates for a 20-7 victory to thrill a large homecoming crowd.

The first scoring drive for the Panthers started on their own 27 and following a huge 37 yard scamper by B.J. The Big Red Defense then held off a flurry of passes and







STOPPING PERRIN RUNNER - Sergio Hipolito, Brandon Velasquez, and several other Panthers stop the runner in game action Friday night.



MORE CHILDREN ARE RIDING SAFELY IN EASTLAND COUNTY, FOLLOWING LOCAL SEAT CHECK EVENT,

SAYS BASTLAND COUNTY CHILD SAFETY PROGRAM

Gorman, Tx – Fewer Eastland County children are at risk of being killed or injured when traveling on our roadways as a result of Child Passenger Safety Week and "National Seat Check Saturday." Parents and caregivers answered the call for action and brought their child safety seats to be checked by a certified child passenger safety technician for proper use and installation.

"Nearly 3 out of 4 child safety seats are not used properly putting young children in unnecessary risk of being killed or injured," Wayne Dennis, EMTP said. "We're gratified that so many parents and caregivers took advantage of this event to help ensure that their children will be riding safely on every trip, every time."

Motor vehicle crashes are the leading cause of death for children 3 to 14 years old (based on 2006 figures from the National Center for Health Statistics). In 2008 alone, 875 passenger vehicle occupants 14 and younger were killed in crashes.

In 2008, among children under 5 in passenger vehicles, an estimated 244 lives were saved due to the use of child straints (child safety seats and adult safety belts). If all children under 5 had been restrained, an additional 79 lives would have been saved. From 1975 through 2008, an estimated 8,959 children's lives were saved by child restraints.

For maximum child passenger safety, parents and caregivers should visit their local inspection stations and refer to the following 4 Steps for Kids guidelines for determining which restraint system is best suited to protect children based on age and size:

1. For the best possible protection keep infants in the back seat, in rear-facing child safety seats, as long as possible up to the height or weight limit of the particular seat. At a minimum, keep infants rear-facing until a minimum of age 1 and at least 20 pounds.

2. When children outgrow their rear-facing seats (at a minimum age 1 and at least 20 pounds) they should ride in forward-facing child safety seats, in the back seat, until they reach the upper weight or height limit of the particular seat (usually around age 4 and 40 pounds).

3. Once children outgrow their forward-facing seats (usually around age 4 and 40 pounds), they should ride in booster seats, in the back seat, until the vehicle seat belts fit properly. Seat belts fit properly when the lap belt lays across the upper thighs and the shoulder belt fits across the chest (usually at age 8 or when they are 4'9" tall).

4. When children outgrow their booster seats, (usually at age 8 or when they are 4'9" tall) they can use the adult seat belt in the back seat, if it fits properly (lap belt lays across the upper thighs and the shoulder belt fits across the chest).

We gave out 17 seats total during this event. While this may not sound like a lot, it is. This is 17 more children that are now riding safer than what they were before coming to our event. We want to remind people that we still have some seats left, but have a limited number of boosters seats left for the older kids. If you need a seat or know someone that does, please call us at 254-243-0230 to set up an appointment for a fitting. Also, thanks to Wesley Warren for allowing us to use his place for our event.

The Mosaics – The last 7 semesters of my tenure as Associate Professor of Art at Howard Payne University in Brownwood, Texas, students were involved in creating mosaics about art history. This is an unusual approach to the last four weeks of the class.

Students would bring reports and websites they researched on the subject, and while working on the glass they shared their reports.

The students began with an old window and combined images from art to tell their own story of history in glass. The glass pieces are glued to the glass and grouted as a mosaic. They give the appearance of stained-glass.







City Minutes

SEPTEMBER 16, 2010 The Gorman City Commission met on the above date in a Regular meeting. Those present were Mayor Robert Ervin, Commissioners Durward Webb, Nathan Files, and Joe Casey. Absent was Commissioner David Stanley. Others present were Chief Barbara Fenley, Glenn Scitern, Ron Skiles, Jack Carter, and Robert Reed, and Randy Beyer. Others present were residents of the Desdemona community and area; Howard and Georgia Iley, Roy Johnson, Charlotte Johnson, Virginia Griffith, Nell Moore, Peggy Singleton, Carol Pell, Marie Patty, James Norris, Jim and Karen Burleson, Bobbie McKillip, D. Moore,

Durward led the opening prayer followed by the Pledge of Allegiance and the Texas Pledge. Mayor Ervin called the meeting to order @ 5:32 p.m. The meeting room then moved to the Community Center.

Due to the large number of attendees, item #12 was moved up on the agenda.

Randy Beyer was present as a representative from the Jacob and Martin Engineering firm. Randy expressed that Gorman had shown interest in extending the water line to the Desdemona residents. If the City does choose to apply for grant funding for this project, it would also include the line from the City water tower running down Highway 8 also known as N. Kent St. Eastland County would also aid in sponsoring this project. Randy explained that the City would have to match 5% of the grant funds. These funds can also be such as in kind labor and equipment. He also expressed that the amount of the grant would not include enough funds to have the project contracted out, so the City would have to put this line in. The line would extend from the City's existing line that currently ends adjacent from Peanut Park Baseball Field. It will be a 6" line. There is a small chance that other funds could be obtained for contracting the installation of this line.

The City has an urgent need for the line from the water tower down highway 8/N. Kent St. to be replaced, as this is a cast iron line. With the existing urgency of these communities, Nathan made the motion to move forward with submitting a grant application for this project, extending a 6" water line to the Desdemona community. Joe made a second to the motion. Motion carried 3-0.

The Commission meeting then moved back into the Regular meeting room to conduct action on the remaining agenda items. Joe made the motion to approve the minutes of the September 02, 2010 meeting, with a correction in paragraph 8:change edge to end, and add motion carried 4-0. Durward made a second to this motion. Motion carried 3-0.

Joe made the motion to approve the bills for payment. Nathan made a second. Motion carried 3-0.

Under Citizens In Put Ron Skiles was present. Mr. Skiles expressed his concern over numerous issues he had which concerned the City of Gorman. Mr. Skiles noted that this is a small town and that the "aint my job" pass the buck needed to stop. If it wasn't your job, whose job is it? He stated that the Commission needed to get back bone. Mr. Skiles went on to say that there was a sex offender living very close to the school. (This issue has been addressed by law personnel) He wanted to know why this was happening. And in regards to the 4Wheeler, ATV, Mule and Golf Cart issue he rides his Mule to Bob's to purchase water. He stated that he would continue to do this, and if he were given a citation he would fight it. He further stated that he had to buy water there because City water wasn't fit to drink.

Mr. Skiles also made mention of an incident he watched when a dog ran out onto Highway 8, nearly causing a traffic accident. He spoke with two other men and asked if the dog belonged to either of them, they stated no that it didn't. (This dog has been running in the area for a while) Mr. Skiles said that a sheriff's deputy was called to this scene where the dog had been shot, by Mr. Skiles. If the City is going to have an Animal Control Officer, he said we should definitely put them to work. Another concern was that when Mr. Bennett walks in the early mornings, he has dogs getting after him all of the time. If he needs to he has his concealed weapons license and he will walk with him and shoot the dogs that bother him.

Mr. Skiles stated if the City crew was going to flush lines, they really need to change the volume of how much was being flushed. Flush the lines and make a definite impression where they have fluently been flushed. He said a little oil spot doesn't indicate much of a flush of the line.

Curfew, Mr Skiles wanted to know if any citations had been given for violation of curfew. He stated that there were kids around all of the time. If we are going to have it, enforce it.

Mr. SKiles went on to say that there are drugs all over this town and all through out the county. And at the house on the hill(in Gorman) you can get girls and drugs, which ever you want. Mr. Skiles also said that there are drug labs all over our area, we need to have the canine unit brought in. Mr. Skiles went on to say that we (the City) need to get all of the trash carried out. We needed to get all of the Raineyville cleaned up and moved out of the city limits. He also went on to say that the City

needed to get Seaton to move his junk yard away from the funeral home. And there are piles of trash only getting larger in front of residential areas. Do something with them. Mr. Skiles shared that he enjoyed reading the article in which Mr. Keeping put in the paper, setting Mr Buchanan straight.

Mr. Skiles next told Tacy she needed to be more responsible and get the Judges, Chief's and Glenn's reports to the paper. And to stay at work until it is time to go home.

Mr. Skiles and Jack Carter have a problem with the pipes on their neighbor's pick up. They stated that they are too loud. They are also concerned with the children running and playing too close to the highway at the corner of Kent and Carter St.

While Mr. Skiles was still speaking with the Commission there was a strong discussion of the Animal Control Ordinance between Barbara and Durward. If this is our ordinance then it should therefore be enforced. Mr. Skiles turned the discussion back to the police working more traffic and on main street and the highway. He had noticed numerous vehicles while he sat at Tayors that were neither licensed or had a valid inspection sticker.

Legal advise will be sought on the Golf Cart issue.

Mr. Skiles told the Commission he appreciated the time they listened to him. Glenn informed the Commission that he was still making efforts to contact the company that rebuilds and repairs fire hydrants. They want to see if he can order a kit that will fix the fire hydrant on Roberts St. (behind Denver's building). Glenn told the Commission the ditch by Gorman Milling was pumped out today (Sept. 16), The limbs will have to be cut on the tree behind the office building before it can be cut

down and removed. At 7:05 p.m. Durward made the motion to go into Executive Session with a second from Nathan. Motion carried 3-0 At 7:33 p.m. Nathan made the motion to adjourn from Executive Session with a second from Joe. Motion carried 3-0.

Joe made a motion, Nathan made a second to remove as department heads Barbara Fenley and Glenn Scitern, no later than January 1, 2011. The Commission will discuss at a later date the job reassignments and /or reduction of hours of Barbara Fenley and Glenn Scitern. Motion carried 3-0. At this time the 2nd reading of Ordinance #2010-05 Atmos Energy Request was read. Nathan made the motion to pass approve and adopt this ordinance. Joe made a second. Motion carried 3-0.

Durward made the motion pass the \$1.05/\$100 value property tax rate for the City of Gorman. Nathan made a second. Motion carried 3-0.

Nathan made the motion to grant the Deed without Warranty to Larry and Joy Campbell. The Campbells had an attorney research the property and do the legal work. Joe made a second to the motion. Motion carried 3-0.

The Discounts item was tabled until the next regular meeting. There being no further business for discussion Joe made the motion to adjourn with a second from Durward. Motion carried, time was 8:10 p.m.



Thanks again to everyone. It was a wonderful experience and I feel privileged to have been a part.- Angela Clark


