CITY CHIT CHAT

The City Commission met in regular session on August 21 with the Mayor and all commissioners present except Mr. Cordell. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The renewal of the contract with McCreary & Huey for the collection of delinquent taxes was discussed and tabled until the next meeting.

Plans were made to top coat main street possibly all the way from the traffic light to the stop sign in the front of the school. We may do others if we can get the right price and have time before cold weather sets in. We have hauled crushed rock and have put it on two streets at this time and will be continuing to haul more and do some other streets with rock and/or gravel. We hope to begin to get out streets in better condition as fast as possible. We have had some requests to have some streets completely paved. If citizens along any unpaved streets are interested in paving and helping to pay for the paving along their frontage, contact the City Office and leave your name and we will get back to you.

We had four to meet with the Equalization Board to ask about the tax increase. We appreciate them coming and I want you to know that any citizen is always welcome to attend any meeting of the Commission, and if they have some item they wish to have on the agenda to be discussed, if they will notify the secretary by closing time on Friday prior to the first and third Thursday, it will be put on the agenda and discussed.

There have been some questions raised about the audit report that appeared in the paper about a reported unappropriated surplus of \$301,682.41. This item shows excess of revenue over expenditures plus the assets from the last years report. During the year we did take in \$26,976.65 more than we had expected to take in and did have a surplus of \$55,576 on hand at the close of the year, but since that time we have bought a landfill machine for \$35,000.00. I know that the story has been told that we have "Broke the City" in the building of the Senior Citizens building, which is not true, as you can see from the above figures. Yes we have spent some

PANTHERS TO TEST NEWCASTLE FRIDAY

The Gorman Panthers of 1980 will travel to Newcastle this Friday night for a 7 p.m. scrimmage game. This will be a good test for the Panthers in preparation for the upcoming tough schedule they face this season.

The Big Red dominated the scrimmage with Tolar last Friday evening as the Panther defense completely shut down the Tolar offense. Also the Panther offense looked good at times and great at others. The costly fumble bug bit the Panthers on a couple of occasions and stalled long drives.

The Big Red scored on two drives and one pass interception while on defense. They also looked good against the Tolar goal line defense and scored a few times at this point in the scrimmage.

The Big Red defense is anchored up front with a heavier line than last year and the entire team is a little larger also compared to last season. In a poll received this week the Panthers are picked no less than fourth in the State and are predicted to go as far as the semi-finals. This sure sounds good, but lets not jump too high off the

ground until we see what the Panthers can do in their first three or four games. Then we can start to see how good the Big Red really are.

We think that the Panther team will be a real fine club this year and if a couple of positions can be filled the Big Red could be a top contender in Class A.

A few more players have reported for workouts this week and this will help the Panthers as far as depth is concerned, and will be a great benefit if it will allow some of the players to rest some during the course of the game.

The season will get underway on Friday, September 5 when the Panthers travel to Hico to take on the Tigers. It has been a long while since the Panthers have played the Tigers and they have always had a good rivalry with the Panthers. So we look for a fine, tough opening game which could be a good yardstick for measuring the toughness of the Panthers for this season.

Don't forget the scrimmage date is Friday at 7 p.m. at Newcastle.

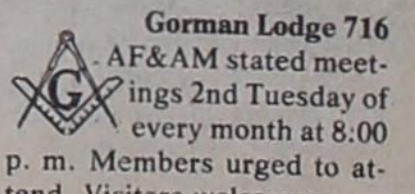
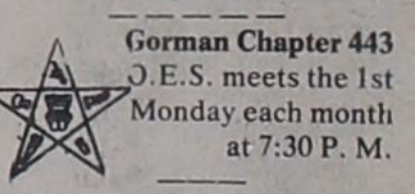

EASTLAND — Litton Oil Corp. of Albany has staked location for a test eight miles southeast of Eastland in Eastland County.

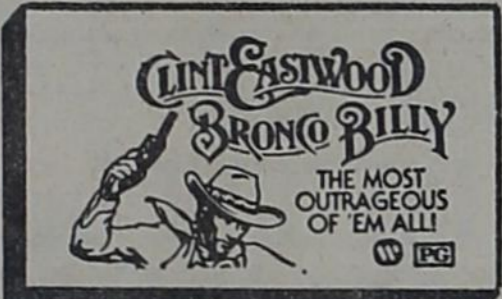
