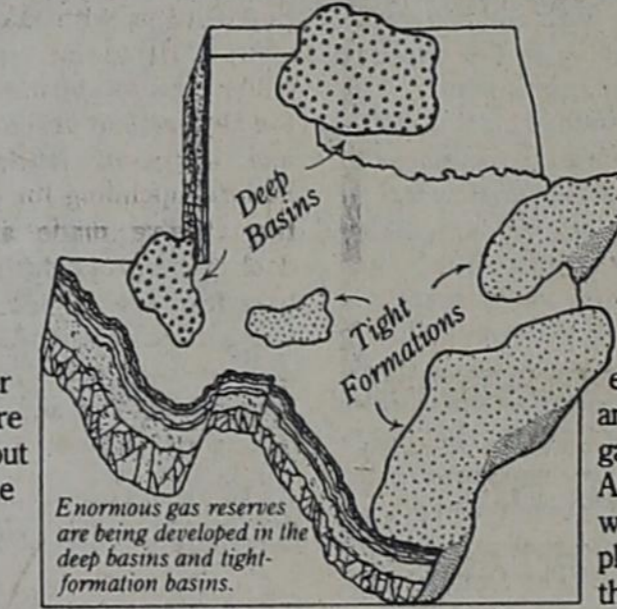

SCOTT CONGRATULATES WINNERS REAGAN AND BUSH.

AUSTIN, TEXAS: November 5, 1980 — Texas State Teachers Association President Dora Scott congratulated Republicans Ronald Reagan and George Bush on their victory in the November 4th election.

Scott said that in spite of TSTA's backing of the Carter/Mondale slate, through the Texas Educators Political Action Committee, she felt that the association could work with the Republican administration in bringing about better working conditions for teachers around the country and educational improvements to benefit students.

"We will continue to work for the things we believe in," Scott said. "Our four-point legislative program is still ready to go into full gear when the Texas legislative session starts."

She continued, "On the national level, we feel that President Reagan will see the necessity for maintaining the existence of a Cabinet-level Department of Education and the need to continue federal help programs to local school districts. It's just a matter of economic necessity."

She added, "I join with my fellow teachers in thanking the Carter administration for providing us with many advances. Of course, that includes the establishment of the Department of Education and increased levels of Federal spending for education. We've made a good deal of progress during the past four years. And we're going to maintain our level of activity towards the goal of helping teachers and education in our state and in the nation."





FARMERS AND RANCHERS ELIGIBLE FOR FmHA LOANS

Farmers in Eastland County are eligible to apply for emergency loans through the Farmers Home Administration for damage caused by drought and extreme temperatures.

Emergency loans are made to famers to cover losses resulting from designated major disasters. In order to qualify, a farmer must have suffered production losses or physical losses to buildings or other structures. Crop production must be 20 per cent or more below normal in order to qualify for production loss loans.

Loan applicants must be unable to obtain sufficient credit from local commercial sources in order to qualify.

Farmers who sustained losses may apply for assistance at the local office which is located in the Eastland National Bank, Room 312, Eastland, Texas.

SENIOR CITIZENS

Memories, Memories and more Memories that pass thru my mind on that "Happy Morn" November 11, 1918. The end of World War I. The war that was to end all wars. We were working in the Post Bakery, a brick building near the Guard House. Just a street between our buildings.

Shortly after 11:00 a.m. There was a terrible commotion at the Guard House. We rushed to the door expecting a prison break. They were yelling "The War is Over, we will be home for Christmas". Of course we had to yell too. We were just finishing our baking for the day. We went to the mess hall for dinner. We had to go about 1/4 mile for our meals.

There were ten of us in the Post Bakery, five Mexicans. Tho they never spoke a word of Spanish, Just young minor boys from N.M. They were Americans and rou proud of it. An Indian youth, a Zuni, a fine young man. The reason I was there, it was easier on me. I was called a Sealer. You were supposed to cut a piece of dough that would weigh two pounds when baked. After handling many thousands of loaves of dough I could tell when they were right.

That day at noon the Captain said all were free until the next day. So we went back to out building. All took baths and were going to take a nap. Tho some one would say what they would do at home at Christmas time. No sleep then.

Just six months and ten days later on May 21, 1919 I was discharged. In April I asked the Sarge why I was being kept on there. He said "You are a Volunteer, the draftees are going home." I told him I was goin to un volunteer.

The evening of 11th, we took up collection of 10 cents per man and two went to ice house and bought boneless steak at ten cents pound, two large cans milk, fried the steak. Got fresh loaf of our bread poured the milk over it, sugared it and toasted it.

A feast fit for a King. We went to Lawton on trolley about six miles away for a dime. It was wild and wooly. You could see men with two six shooters, one in hand and a bottle of whiskey in the other. He would take a drink and yell loud and shoot gun in the air.

The sidewalk would be blocked by Squares sitting on this happier and sounding like a gang of Geese.

I soon became as nervous as a cat on a hot tin roof and went home.

The Vietnam War lasted for years. So you see the War I casualties were heavier. All vets of all wars have drawn a pension previous to War I of which there were 550,000 War I Vets still alive.

Everyday the sun comes in view in the morning 5000

people become 65 years of age.

I wonder how many had to have aspirin here Tuesday night.

If the Unions were responsible for their deeds I would be for them. tho when they murder and destroy millions in property, I am against them. The president was with them in the coal strike. Do you wonder why so many of your members voted for a change. The debate finished him for sure.

Our sympathy goes out to the family of Mrs. Enda Kirk. May years of suffering finally ended for her. The Boyd Bledsoe family, his mother married Grand Dad Bennett. May you look to the Judge of all Judges in your time of sorrow.

Last night a man called me and asked me if I owned my own home. I told him that I lived in the biggest home in Gorman. He said that was the kind of people he was

Bullock was first elected the state's chief tax collector and financial officer in '74 with 70 percent of the vote in his first statewide race. He was reelected in '78 without opposition in either the pri-

"There are few tax deadbeats and delinquents who don't like it, but the vast majority of honest taxpayers and business people support our energetic and equal enforcement of tax laws," Bullock said. "The people realize that every delinquent dollar collected - both in Texas and from out-of-state is a dollar they don't have to make up in new taxes."

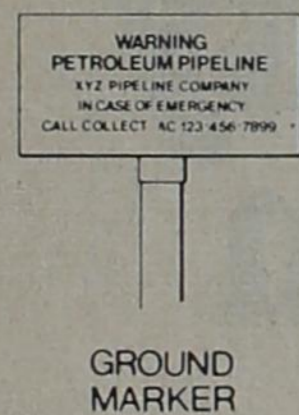

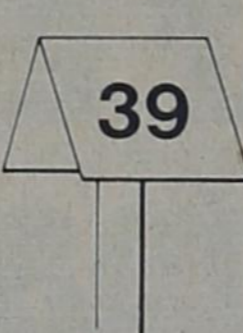

When you see signs like those shown above, they tell you that there's a pipeline nearby. If it's underground, you can't see it, of course. But it's there, working quietly to provide energy for you and other consumers throughout this nation.

Some of these signs list the commodity transported in the pipeline, the name of the operator, and a telephone number where the operator's representative can be reached at all times.

- Although pipelines have an exceptionally good safety record, once in a while a leak can occur. Indications of a leak might include:
- A strange or unusual odor in the vicinity of a pipeline.
 - A hissing or roaring sound (caused by petroleum or product escaping from a pipeline).
 - A dense white cloud or fog.
 - A spot of dead or discolored vegetation.
 - An accumulation of petroleum

- Avoid creating sparks or sources of heat which could cause the liquids or vapor to ignite and burn. If you find yourself in a suspected vapor area, do not light a match, start an engine or even switch on an electric light.
- Notify the pipeline operator as soon as you reach a safe area. Call collect. Give your name, a description of the leak and its location. If you do not know who the pipeline operator is, call your local fire, police or sheriff's department, or the state police. Advise them of the nature and location of the emergency.

If you see someone digging near a pipeline or doing other construction work... or if you plan to do such work near a pipeline yourself... please call the telephone number shown on the sign and let the pipeline company know so damage can be avoided. It's in your interest... and the nation's.
