PROPERTY TAX NEWS

Louise Rankin, the tax assessor-collector for the Gorman Independent School District, today announced the availability of a new 12-page pamphlet which may help district residents save on their property taxes.

According to Louise Rankin, the pamphlet explains how the property tax system in Texas operates, and highlights possible tax savings available to citizens.

The publication was developed by the State Property Tax Board in accordance with the provisions of Senate Bill 621, passed by the Texas Legislature in 1979.

Louise Rankin noted that homeowners are eligible for a \$5,000 school homestead exemption, and that certain diasbled persons and those aged 65 or older may qualify for additional exemptions from the value of their prop-

Also, farmers and ranchers have the option of having their agricultural land taxed at its productive rather than market value.

To quality for exemptions and productivity valuation, however, application must be made to the school tax office before the district's rendition period ends on April 30.

'District residents are encouraged to review the pamphlet and make application for all tax relief to which they are entitled before the rendition period ends," Louise Rankin said.





RYE PRODUCTION HIGH IN EASTLAND COUNTY

GORMAN

AUSTIN -- Rye production in Texas was up more than 25 percent in 1979, with Eastland County fourth in the state's total production, Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown has announced.

Eastland County trailed only Dallam, Collingsworth and Comanche counties in total rye production. Eastland County reported a yield of 27,100 bushels from 1,300 harvested acres.

Statewide, rye production totaled 513,000 bushels, up considerably from the 1978 yield of 406,000 bushels. Harvested bushels per acre were up from 14 bushels in 1978, to 19 bushels in 1979.
