



TSU FIELD DAY **DEMONSTRATION SET**

JUNE 27 STEPHENVILLE, TX--- A field day to demonstrate the use of anaerobic digestion for the production of energy and management of animal waste will be held here June 27 at Tarleton State University. The program will start at 10 a.m. in the auditorium of the agriculture building on the Tarleton campus with a discussion of the construction and economics of anaerobic digesters.

Following lunch, the demonstration will continue at the University Agriculture Center with an inspection of a 7,500 gallon digester and a 30,000 gallon digester.

Dr. Ed Fulton, professor of agriculture at Tarleton, designed and built the two digesters under grants totaling approximately \$200,000 from the Department of Energy and the Energy and Mineral Advisory Council of

Fulton started the project in March, 1976, with a metal drum as a small anaerobic

years he has develop an automated system with a 7,500 gallon tank. The new system is capable of producing approximately 5,000 feet of bio-gas a day.

Fulton has also expanded the utilization of the project from poultry manure to the use of waste from swine and dairy cattle.

At the June 27 seminar, Fulton will demonstrate the

use of gas produced by the anaerobic digester system for heating, cooling and fuel for motors.

The day-long demonstration is free and open to the public.
