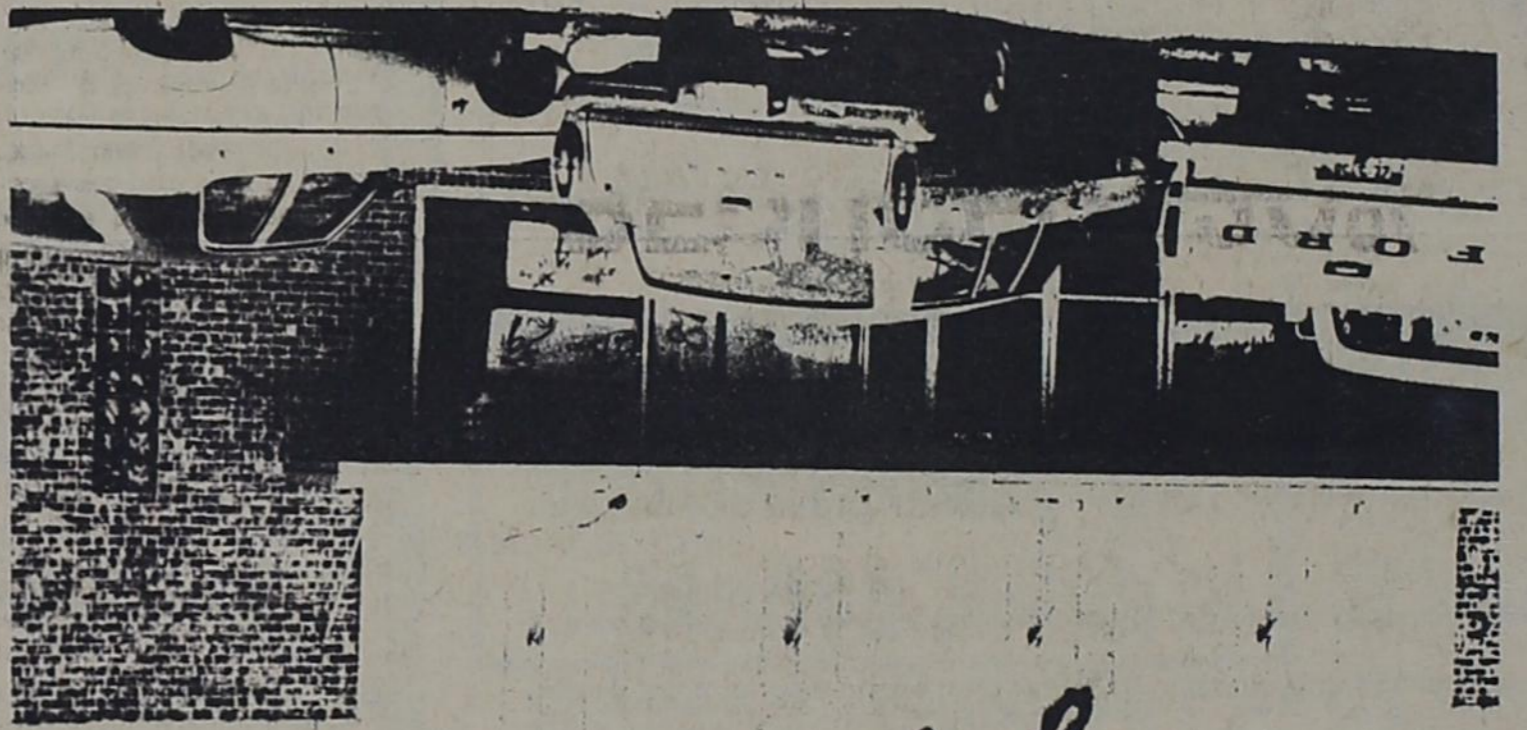

This is the time of year when we begin finding that our tomatoes are rotting on the blossom end. Blossom-end-rot in tomatoes may be blamed on several conditions but the resulting breakdown is due to water being withdrawn from cells on the blossom end of the fruit.

The withdrawal results when the water uptake by the plants roots is insufficient to make up for that loss in plant growth processes.

The breakdown of the fruit begins as a green water-soaked area which rapidly turns gray to dark brown in color, followed by shrinking and collapsing.

Insufficient water uptake occurs when the soil is too dry. Also, poor aeration resulting from excessive soil moisture can prevent water uptake by the roots. In addition, when hot winds and low humidity occurs, many plants cannot take up enough water to counteract the moisture lost from transpiration.

One of the best ways to maintain an adequate supply of moisture under tomatoes is by using a mulch over the root area and water when the soil becomes dry. Since a calcium deficiency affects the plants transpiration rate, the addition of gypsum to the soil sometimes help to prevent blossom-end-rot.

There have been some reports that spider mites are causing damage to vegetables. Spider mites are red in color and extremely small in size. They are usually found on the underside of leaves. The tiny insect pests cause damage by sucking juices from the plant. The infested leaves turn whitish in color and fine webs can be seen on the leaves.

Insecticides registered for use on spider mites are Kelthane, Diazinon, and Ethion. Sulphur will help repel spider mites. As with any pesticide, be sure to read the label and follow all directions.

AUSTIN—Eastland County produced 25,000 bushels of peaches in 1979 to make it seventh in production statewide, Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown has announced. Gillespie County with 143,000 bushels, was first.

According to the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service 1979 Texas Fruit and Pecan Statistics, approximately 750,000 bushels valued at \$6.8 million were grown statewide.

Texas tied with Arkansas for seventh place among peach-growing states. California was first, South Carolina second and Georgia third.
