Fort Worth, August 23 — Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association is one of a group of 29 farm, ranch and agricultural organizations, representing a combined membership of more than half a million people, that announced today the formation of a new property rights coalition—"Farmers and Ranchers for Property Rights"—to reaffirm the right of Texans to own and manage their own property.

The coalition stated that "the widening circle of state and federal

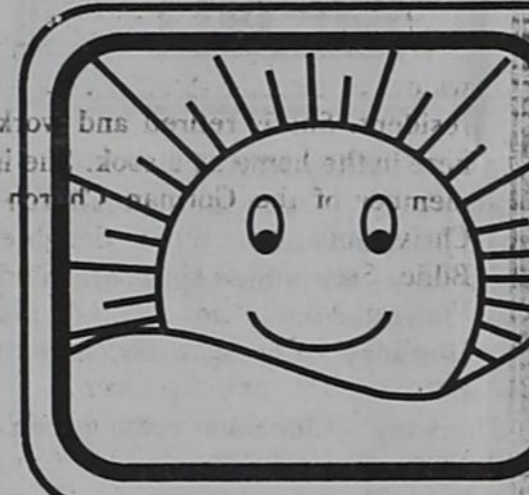
Mable R. Stockton Laid To Rest On Sunday in Dublin

regulation has put every landowner at risk, particularly those in the agriculture community who use their land to make a living."

Recently, the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service announced it was considering designation of parts of 33 Texas counties as critical habitat for the golden-cheeked warbler, a songbird listed as an endangered species under the Endangered Species Act (ESA). With this designation comes mandates that could impose financial hardship with compliance and curtail activities on private property. Currently, no provisions are made to compensate property owners for lost income or property value resulting from these government mandates.

There are other regulatory threats to private property rights besides the ESA, the coalition noted: Designation of federally protected wetlands, the Coastal Zone Management Plan, the outstanding Natural Resource Waters program, ecosystems management that often requires landowners to set aside some portion of their land to protect fish and wildlife resources.

TSCRA President Tom Beard, of Alpine, Texas, said, "Our new coalition wants to teach politicians and bureaucrats that they can't attack us, ignore our rights, or take our property. We are ready to fight back—in the political and legislative arenas, and in the courts."

"America's ranchers and farmers are, without a doubt, the world's best caretakers of the land and the water that the land depends on. Ranchers and farmers ARE the stewards of America's land, water and air. We must tell what we do and convince the politicians to let us do it," Beard said.

Farmers and Ranchers for Property Rights' efforts will include activity in this year's elections and support of passage of a private property rights law in next year's state legislative session.

HEAT WAVE MAKES CREEP FEEDING ESSENTIAL FOR PROFITABLE CALF GAINS
As temperatures soar, and the cattle market declines, creep feeding calves becomes all the more important to cattle producers bottomline, according to a Texas Agricultural Extension Service Livestock specialist.

percent) creep ration makes up for the inadequate protein provided by mature forages. In most Texas cow/calf operations, this intersection of a calf's need for protein and energy and inadequate pastures often comes during July and August droughts.

In addition to creep feeding recommendations, TEX-VAC includes a precise vaccination schedule, a post-weaning backgrounding plan, the latest research on mineral supplements, plus pointers on castration, dehorning, implanting and branding.

Producers who want more detailed information on vaccinations and the rest of the newly revised TEX-VAC program should contact their county Texas Agricultural Extension Agent. WASTE PESTICIDE DISPOSAL DATES SET FOR SEPTEMBER
Agricultural producers with stored pesticides are encouraged to take advantage of a free disposal program at four waste pesticide collection days in September.

Waste pesticides will be collected at the Valley Gin in Tornillo on Sept. 15; at the City Airport in Ballinger on Sept. 20; at the City Airport in Stephenville on Sept. 23; and at Consolidated Nurseries in Tyler on Sept. 27.

Daily collections will begin at 8 a. m. and end at 3 p. m. Proper care must be taken by cooperating farmers and ranchers to safely transport pesticides to each site, said Dr. Cliff Hoelscher, entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Triple-rinsed or pressure-rinsed clean pesticide containers also will be recycled. There will be no collection of tires, used batteries or used motor oil because of possible contamination of mixed loads.

A total of 340 tons of waste pesticides were collected in 1993 through these disposal days, Hoelscher said. In 1992, 197 tons were collected.

Waste pesticides are disposed of by a contractor licensed by the Environmental Protection Agency. Cooperating producers are not required to sign any documents regarding disposal, but may receive a receipt for

ASCS ACTIVITIES

MAINTENANCE OF ACR AND CU/PAY ACREAGE
Farm Program participants are reminded that haying or grazing of ACR and CU for pay acreage is prohibited through October 31, 1994. Participants are required to keep the acreage free from weeds, insects and rodents, and protected from wind and water erosion.

CONTRACTS FOR ADDITIONAL PEANUTS
Contracts for additional peanuts must be received in the ASCS county office not later than 5 p. m. on Thursday, Sept. 15. ACP PRACTICE MAINTENANCE

Practices that fail for reasons beyond a producers control can be relieved for the remainder of the maintenance requirement provided a request is made and the County Committee concurs that the failure of the practice is for reasons beyond the control of the producer. Producers violating maintenance requirements will be required to repay all or part of the cost-share payment.

'MOLE' Extends Biologist's Power Of Observation

(NU) - A tiny video robot is giving an environmental scientist at Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory a gentle view of animals that live underground.
Appropriately named MOLE

(Miniature Optical Lair Explorer), the five-inch-long device resembles a little all-terrain vehicle, with rubber treads, a camera the size of a roll of film and a remote-control cord.

MOLE was designed by lab engineer John Christensen to meet the needs of wildlife biologist Jim Woollett. Woollett's job is to find out whether three special-status animals — the American badger, the burrowing owl and the San Joaquin kit fox — are at the lab's Site 300. If they are, the California-based lab will follow environmental mitigation measures to make sure Site 300 operations, including high-explosives testing, don't unduly disturb the animals.

Since these elusive creatures are primarily nocturnal, one of the quickest ways to determine whether they are occupying burrows on the 7,000-acre explosives range is to use MOLE during the day.

"It's almost like going from being partially blind to seeing," Woollett said. "It has enhanced the accuracy of my work."

Woollett's surveys at Site 300 are part of environmental commitments under the lab's Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program.

Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory is managed by the University of California for the U.S. Department of Energy.

Stamford — "Welcome to Ericksdahl" will be the greeting on Saturday, September 10th as neighbors gather for their annual picnic honoring Charlie and Cindy Stenholm. Swedish immigrants first gathered here in 1906 on these eighty acres which belong to the Lutheran Church. Once a part of the S. M. Swenson ranches, this soil along the California Creek could relate many stories of the past. A publication of 1918 records:

"The land occupied by the Swedish and Danish people stretches from Stamford to Lueders with some of it lying in the western part of Shackelford County. Most of it is upland intersected by hills and valleys."

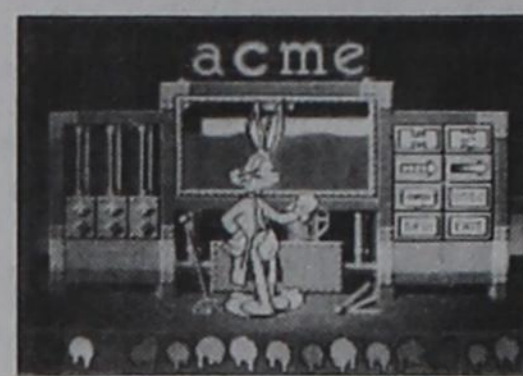
The first church building was a white frame structure completed in the summer of 1907 at a total cost of \$2520.00. A magnificent rock building dominates the area today. Men of the congregation began digging the rocks in 1932. It was completed in 1941.

Dr. Hugo B. Haterius had come to serve the church and the community in 1919. He dedicated his life to improving living conditions with emphasis on better farming practices. The California Creek Soil Conservation District was organized in 1938. One of the early officers of this group was Lambert Stenholm, father of Charlie.

On September 10, a western band will provide background music as friends reminisce and get in the line for barbecue and watermelon. This is the tradition and heritage from which Charlie Stenholm comes. He and Cindy have their farm home just two miles from the picnic area. The fun time will begin at 4:30 p. m.
