Glenn Scitern and Joe Simpson gave reports.

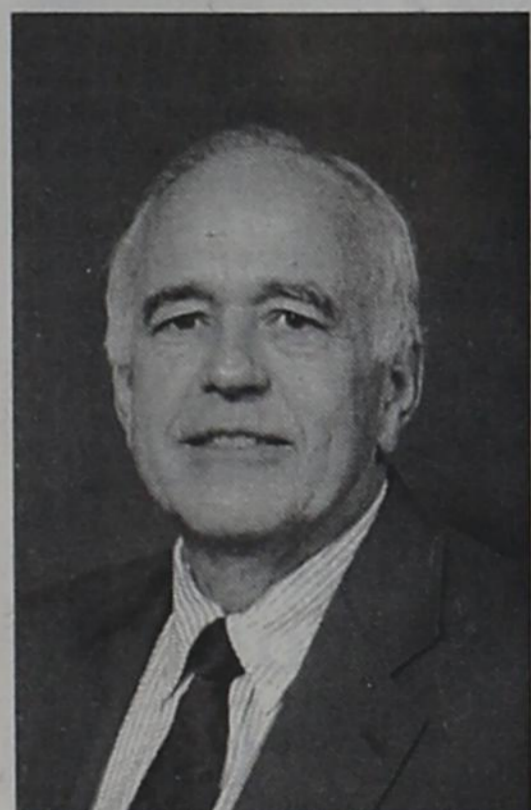

Leslie Vance Seeks Re-Election As District Attorney



Leslie B. Vance, the Criminal District Attorney of Eastland County has informed this newspaper of his intentions to seek re-election as your Criminal District Attorney.

Mr. Vance is a life-long Democrat and is a candidate in the Democratic primary on March 8, 1994. He was born in Vernon, Alabama in 1939, graduated from Bloomfield High School in Bloomfield, Mo. in 1957, attended Southeast Missouri State College and Texas Christian University in Fort Worth, before earning his law degree in 1965 from Baylor Law School in Waco.

He practiced law in Meridian, Clifton and Comanche, before moving to Eastland in 1982. Mr. Vance served as County Attorney in Bosque County from 1968 until 1970 and was appointed by Gov. Preston Smith to the office of District Attorney of the 52nd District of Texas in 1970 until 1972 and served as Assistant District Attorney of the 52nd District of Texas from 1975 until 1977 and was appointed by Gov. Dalph Briscoe as District Attorney of the 220th District in 1977, serving in such capacity until 1982. He moved to Eastland in 1982, engaging in the general practice of law until his election as

Criminal District Attorney in 1990 and began serving his term in January of 1991.

Vance and his wife, the former Milta Kincaid of Eastland, live at 724 South Ammerman St. in Eastland with son, Josh, 16 and friend Richie who is also 16. Two grown children complete the family. Kathryn, age 28, is a nurse in Fort Worth and son, Byron, age 25, is a graduate of Eastland High School and presently a lawyer in Dallas.

"I will be unable to campaign as vigorously as I intended to because of a recent back injury that will require surgical correction within the next couple of weeks. I have only limited ability to get around at this time and have elected to use whatever time I can work to do my job as Criminal District Attorney and fulfill my obligations to my church. My back problem is correctable by surgery and I expect a full recovery but have only limited ability to get around at this point.

"I have not and nor will I accept contributions from any person in regard to running for the office of Criminal District Attorney of Eastland County. It has been my experience in the political world that people who give you money expect something in return and the Criminal District Attorney's Office should not be subject to any such pressure. The office of Criminal District Attorney belongs to each and every citizen of Eastland County, regardless of wealth, position, race or creed.

"I have stayed within my budget as Criminal District Attorney during the time that I have been in office. I have cooperated with the Commissioner's Court in cutting back our budget requests and will continue to do so in the future. The records concerning office expenditures and budget are available as public records through the County Auditor's Office should you have any questions concerning them.

"The Criminal Justice System is a difficult one to learn and to understand and it takes many years of experience to properly handle the cases that come to you as Criminal District Attorney. The Criminal District Attorney has a duty to see that "justice is done" and to advise law enforcement officers as to what is

Richard Watson Seeks State Board Education Position

Richard Watson of Gorman has announced his candidacy in the March 8 Republican Primary for the Texas State Board of Education from District 14. Watson, a 1969 graduate of the University of Texas College of Pharmacy, is married to the former Connie Coan of Eastland. They have four children, Rachel, 23; Leah, 19; Stephen, 12; and Grace, 1.

Watson, in his formal statement, offered the following outline of issues that are of concern both to educators and to parents that should be addressed by the State Board.

"A major responsibility of the Board is that of textbook selection. This has become a volatile issue in recent years as is evidenced by the large public outcry against the health textbooks that the Board recently adopted. Textbook publishers continue to present materials for adoption that carry an anti-family bias and promote the acceptance of abnormal lifestyles.

"Curriculum materials should not undermine parents' values and the standards of societal behavior upon which this nation has thrived. The Board owes its allegiance to the parents and educators of Texas, not to the textbook publishers. The Board must demand accuracy and decency from publishers and accept nothing less.

"As more power has become concentrated in the central agency, less control of the education process has remained where it should be, in the hands of parents, local educators, and locally elected school boards.

"I have found a high frustration level among educators, both teachers and local administrators across the district. Much, if not most, of this frustration is directly traceable to oppressive policies of the state education agency. Classroom teachers need to be freed to do what they were trained to do—teach!

"From the centralized power centers continue to come ideas such as school based "clinics" which have been shown to be vehicles for contraceptive distribution without parental knowledge and consent. I have taken a strong position against our schools becoming cafeterias of social services. They are to be institutions of learning.

"Many factors enter into the education equation such as motivation to learn, classroom discipline, and development of character. Again philosophies emanating from the educational bureaucracies work against all of these common sense objectives.

"The latest fad, Outcome Based Education, is based on the false premise that every child can equally achieve certain "outcomes." It takes away incentive to achieve, rewards mediocrity rather than excellence, and substitutes certain values ad attributes for objective learning.

"These are the kinds of ideas that are alienating parents from the educational process and are adding

legal and permitted by statute. It is the duty of the Criminal District Attorney to dispose of the cases of those who are charged with crimes. I invite you to call the Judges of those Courts and ask them, not whether they like me or think I'm a nice guy, but rather when the cases are set by the courts, does my office professionally dispose of those cases.

"I have had thirteen years experience as County Attorney, Assistant District Attorney, District Attorney and Criminal District Attorney. Experience cannot be purchased, it can only be earned by a willingness to compete and to effectively try criminal cases, either before Juries or Judges.

"It is my belief that the man who occupies the Office of Criminal District Attorney is your attorney! He stands between the general public and people who violate the law. I made my decisions based upon my experience as a Criminal District Attorney and as a practicing attorney and, quite frankly, will not change the way that I make my decisions in the future. My decisions are based on my experience and expertise as an attorney specializing in criminal matters. If you want to have a Criminal District Attorney who is qualified by experience in representing you, the citizens of Eastland County and of Texas, then the choice is clear. I ask for your vote and support."
