Add green pepper, pineapple and reserved almonds. Blend egg yolk and cream. Gradually blend 1/2 cup sauce into egg mixture. Return to sauce and cook, stirring, until thickened and smooth; do not boil. Serve over rice. Makes 4 to 6
