

ST. LOUIS, March 20.—Dawn today saw storm-swept "Little Egypt" beginning to squirm out of the mass of destruction left by Wednesday's cyclone. The casualty list in the stricken area showed 577 known dead this morning, 736 reported dead and more than 2 500 reported dead and more than 2,500 injured.

Where on Wednesday there were dozens of little cities and towns, this morning there were tented villages. Overnight thousands of homeless facing starvation were cared for in relief tents. Today the wholesale work of burial was started along with taking stock of what is left in the district. Eighty bodies were buried last night in Murphysboro and more were being buried today in the various stricken towns.

The first steps in reconstruction were under way this morning, with Governor Len Small of Illinois here devising ways to spend the \$500,000 which the state legislature is expected to appropriate to relieve the pected to appropriate to relieve the suffering. Red Cross, Medical Profession and Military gave birth to the reign of horror through the night. The storm itself Heroically Pursue Rescue Labors

With the National Red Cross organization, working with the various state branches of affected and nearby states, thousands of doctors and nurses, augumented in each locality by volunteer relief committees, the military and a vast army of others simplified but in the first hours furiously laboring to rescue the dying, succor the famished and heal the broken bodies left in the 240-mile wake of Wednesday evening's storm fury, the total death toll, number injured and serious property damage are as yet mere conjecture, although Red Cross officials and military authorities estimate the number of deaths checked on indicate that the total has already reached more than 850 and will probably go over 1200.

It is conservatively estimated that the injured will total between 3000 and 4000, that more than 30,000 are now home- HERE'S ANSWER less and the property damage early estimated around \$150,-

000,000 will far outstretch that amount.

While Thursday evening's reports mentioned upward of 27 large towns in the wake of the cyclone, many fairly large towns and scores of villages are being discovered suffering from the tornado as telephone, telegraph, railroad and highway connections are reopened into the stormswept area.

Cloudbursts and conflagrations added to the horrors of the violent winds, and the pitiable suffering of maimed and dying all but taxes the reason of trained workers. Many crazed by their harrowing experiences, together with death of loved ones and the terrible uncertainty of the fate of others, have be-

Eleven are reported dead at Biehle, 14 at Cape Grardean and two at Altenburg, the only Missouri towns in the path of the storm that so far have managed to make known their plight.

The twister lifted at Annapolis and descended again near the 14-linois border, crossing the Mississippi river and smashing with greater intensity through southwestern Illinois, and here it again lifted, only to descend once more near the Indiana line at Carmi.

Apple Sauce Cake

Mrs. Chitwood who was in charge of the Cooking School conducted by the Times, gives below a recipe for an unusual cake.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. - Trade nions must give attention to the cossibilities of radio broadcasting if they are not to lose pace with the times, according to James M. Lynch, president of the International Typographical union. Mr. Lynch has advanced the suggestion that a broadcasting station should be established and maintained either by the American Federation of Labor or by a co-operating group of large

"Opponents of unionism are losing no time about utilizing this tremendous new medium for propaganda spread," said Mr. Lynch. "The Il-linois Manufacturers' association is making a sustained publicity drive using radio. 'Tell your home folks to tune in on the factory noon-hour programs,' says a message issued by industrial plants, members of the as-

"Here are some of the topics dis-"Here are some of the topics discussed in these noon-hour programs:
'The Shop Agitator,' 'The Easiest Way for a Factory Employe to Own His Own Home,' 'The Popular Man in the Pactory,' 'Americanization,' 'Interest of Employes in Total Manufacturing Output,' 'Sports and Exercise.' Heavily freighted with poison gas against the labor movement are these little talks to the workers. Many factories have installed radio sets with loud speakers n lunch rooms and rest rooms to facilitated union hatred into the

ears of employes. "There are more than 5,000,000 radio listeners in the country and the publicity power of broadcasting is only excelled by that of the press. Unionism certainly cannot afford to leave this field to its insidious and sleepless foes. Concerning the factory noon-hour programs the Manufacturers' News of Chicago

says:
"'Leading business men, financiers and industrialists are being called upon to present thoughts ar-plicable to the workers' welfare. Many employers are making the factory noon-hour each Tuesday, a weekly better relations event.'

"That kind of 'educational' effort is not new to organized labor. It is the same old wolf in sheep's cloth-ing.
