A well lighted and paved city shows enterprise and prosperity. The public can't depend upon the lightning bug to furnish sufficient illumination to guide the belated pedestrian home and keep him from falling in the ditch. All the leading residential and business streets should be paved.

Ranger should have more lights. The residential portion needs street lights and paving. Electric power is cheap in West Texas. A well lighted ity attracts the new-comer and keeps down hijacking. The hijacker, thug and crook steers clear of lighted thoroughfares. The weary auto traveler is usually attracted to a town where the lights illumine the sky for miles around. Ranger sits on a hill and there should be enough lights to attract the caravans that daily pass this way on the Bankhead highway.

It is not necessary to use brick, cement, bitulithic or rock asphalt to paye the residential streets. Right at the door of the city, within the corporate limits may be found good paving material. It has been tested. Gravel in ample supplies are here. In addition to gravel there is excellent stone. Good macadam streets are better than no streets at all. Gravel and crushed rock may be put down and thoroughly rolled and then later tarviaized. Paving and lights go a long ways to make a town. These two things should be taken up by the various civic and luncheon clubs and something done. It ought to be done this summer.

The best roads in the state radiate from here. The streets should be equally as good as the highways, if not equally as good, almost as good. They should not be muddy in rainy weather. Good lights and good streets are the best advertisement a city can have.

AUSTIN, Feb. 13. — John M. ### MOTORS CAUSE HEAVY LOSSES TO RAILROADS

After a period of rather marked fluctuation the balance between mo-tor and railway passenger transport stability, according to A. B. Barber, manager of the department of trans-rortation and communication of the Chamber of Commerce of the United

States.
"There was a marked decline in railroad passenger traffic," he said in an address to the Washington Passenger Traffic Association, "from 1920 to 1924. But the figures for 1925 were only a fraction of 1 per cent under those for 1924.

"The loss in pasenger business"

due to motor competition, chiefly in the short-haul business, appears to have almost reached an equilibrium with the long-haul service.

"There is a growing recognition of the logical division of the field be-tween rail and motor transportation Many of the railroads are gladly giv-ing up their non-profitable short-haul passenger business to the mocor carriers or are installing bus zerv ices of their own, either feeders or in some cases paralleling their own lines for short hauls. Other railroads have met the short-haul or branch line passenger traffic problem by the use of gasoline rail cars or mixed reight and passenger trains for local service in light traffic areas."
