The American Association of Newspaper Editors composed of executives of daily papers in cities of over 100,000 inhabitants, appointed a committee to investigate alleged editorial participation in the Tea Pot Dome deals, with the view of applying disciplinary measures to the point of expulsion of any member found guilty of prostituting the code of ethical standards adopted a year ago.

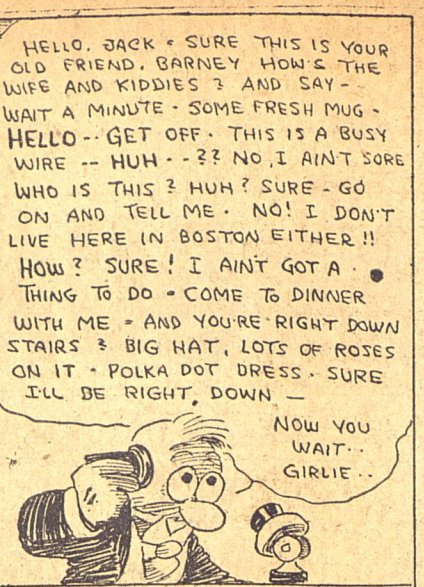
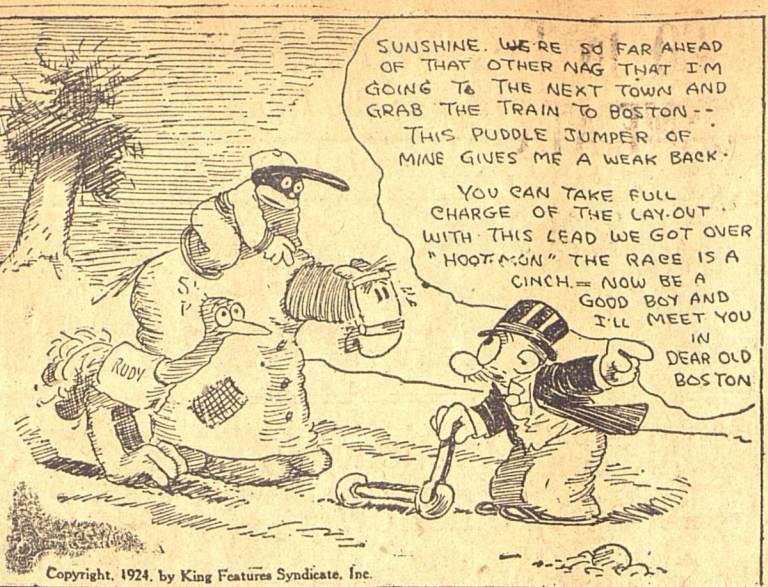

**SIMPLIFICATION OF SPARK PLUGS URGED**

That the present wide diversity in size and dimensions of automobile spark plugs is the cause of much waste in production and distribution of these commodities has been brought out by several spark plug manufacturers, who have suggested the desirability of reduced variety of the division of simplified practice of the department of commerce.  
 The consensus of opinion shown by their letters is that the present variety could be appreciably reduced with resulting benefit to the spark plug manufacturer, the car builder, the accessory and supply dealer, and also to the car owner. Plugs, though now made in many different designs, are furnishing in four principal diameters, no one of which is interchangeable with another. In addition to this diversity, each diameter is made in a number of different lengths, also in different sizes of "hex." The majority of those replying to the inquiry favor reduction, not only in these features, but also in the diameters. Some go so far as to recommend spark plugs be simplified to one size thread, one size of threaded shank, one length of plug body, and one size of hexagon. It is claimed this can be done without destroying the individuality of the different makes of spark plugs.  
 Several of the manufacturers say one such plug could be adopted by all engineers. Adoption of the S. A. E. standard 7/8-inch spark plug, with its 18 threads per inch (U. S. fine thread series), is recommended above all others. Some are of the opinion that this plug need be made in only three lengths, known as "regular," "medium extension," and "full extension," to serve all motor cars.

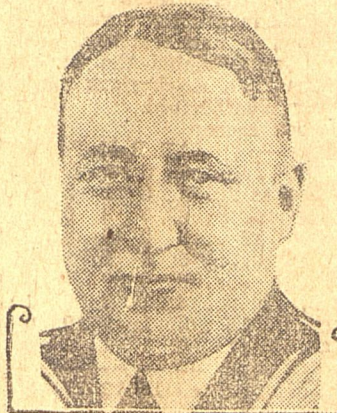
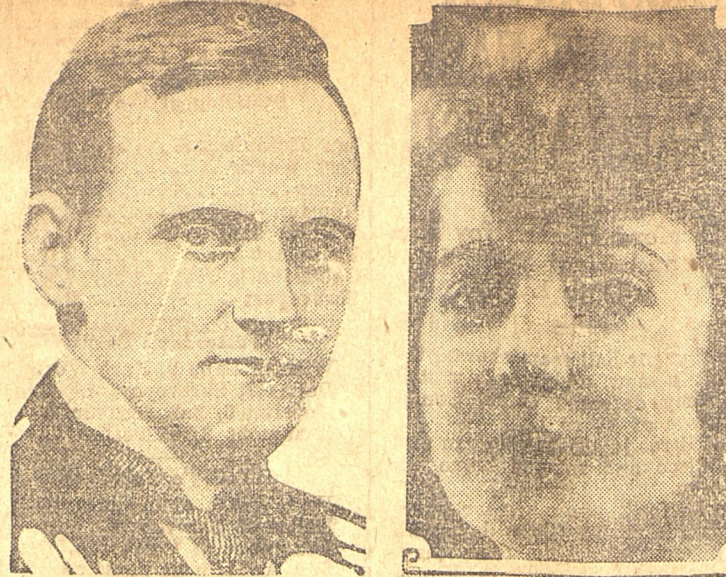

Pett, son of Milwaukee's "salt ring," answered the divorce decree he secured in Milwaukee by filing suit in New York for separation, and by suing her ex-father-in-law for alleged alienation of affections.

### FAST CRUISERS AMERICAN NAVY EYES AND EARS

PHILADELPHIA—The U. S. cruiser Memphis, recently launched at the Cramp yard here, is the last of five swift cruisers to take "the dip" in the Delaware from the local yards. Work toward her completion is going on rapidly. Designed for either peace or war service, the contract requirement for the Memphis in the way of tremendous speed, powerful battery and extensive cruising radius, adapt her both as a pathfinder and a protector of America's foreign trade. Experts declare her to be the most versatile and desirable type of ship in the navy today.

Measuring 555 feet 6 inches in length and 55 feet in breadth, the cruiser is modeled like a United States destroyer. She is seven times as big and just as fast, her speed being greater than 35 knots, or more than 40 statute miles per hour. The propelling machinery, while of much higher power, is of the same general type as that used for destroyers, and has won all the important points of reliability, speed, and economy of the destroyer flotilla steaming competition.

At maximum power, the main turbines are capable of developing 100,000 horse power, which will drive the vessel at such a speed that in a race with a ship like the Leviathan, pride of the American merchant marine, this cruiser would quickly pass the giant commercial liner. She is entirely an oil burner.

The battery will consist of 12 six-inch rapid fire guns. The secondary battery consists of two three-inch anti-aircraft guns and two three-inch anti-aircraft triple and two above-water torpedo mounts are also provided.

The functions of this type of cruiser are varied. Primarily the ship is to serve as the scouting vessel and is therefore fitted with the most powerful radio apparatus. In addition to scout cruiser duty, the vessel is outfitted for carrying and launching airplanes and is fully equipped with mine-laying apparatus. She is also fitted for use as a flotilla leader for destroyer squadrons. The vessel as designed combines the duties of scout cruiser, flotilla leader, mine-layer and airplane carrier.

The United States will have 10 vessels of this type when all now under construction in ship yards throughout the country are completed. They are expected to become the eyes and ears of the fleet.

### SCOTS RESENT CHARGES OF BAD DRINKING HABITS

LONDON, May 5.—The Scot, a mighty man is he—and proud.

To accuse him of drinking alcoholics might in many cases be indiscreet, though it would not always be offensive. But to accuse him of drinking methylated spirits instead of whisky is altogether provocative. The feelings aroused are not exactly like those of a bull led into a communist flag shop, nor hardly the same as those of a barber who receives a safety razor as a gift, but much the same as a combination of the two.

And so, there is loud gnashing of teeth these days in the "bonnie heilands" to the north. Local authorities and social reformers have actually and openly declared serious problems are arising through the extent to which methylated spirit drinking is being indulged in by the poorer classes of Scottish workers.

The secretary for Scotland told a deputation that a new material had been discovered which, after May 1, will be inserted in all methylated spirit, except that used for furniture

polishing, and which will make the spirit absolutely undrinkable. The Scot resents the imputation that he has deserted whisky more than he does the plan to nullify methylated spirit as a beverage. It is reported that in one year there have been more convictions in Edinburgh arising out of the drinking of the spirit than in the whole of England and Wales.

The public debt has been cut more than \$4,800,000,000 in the four and a half years since the great war indebtedness was at its peak, Aug. 31, 1919. Figures made public by the treasury show that the national debt is \$21,781,966,852. It has been reduced \$933,000,000 in the last year. Prohibition did not increase the national debt.
